According to his statement to the police, Gordon said that Robert and himself climbed to the roof, and that Robert, while on the roof, disappeared over the side.

The cat which bit 12-year-old Otto Glenard, of 130 Wayburn, last Monday afternoon, died two hours later. Receiving this report, Park police took the head of the animal to Herman Kiefer hospital for examination.

### Officials to Make Study to Regulate Taxicab Companies

The village commission of Grosse Pointe Park will take into consideration the question of how many taxicabs and taxicab companies should be permitted in the village.

Although the temporary ordinance becomes effective 30 days after passage of the ordinance, on May 29, the members decided that they would hold a request for a license by a taxicab driver to the commission.

### Induction Takes Seven This Morning

Seven new members were inducted into the Grosse Pointe Park Optimist Club this morning at a luncheon held at the Whittier Hotel.

At the second organizational luncheon meeting of the newly-formed Grosse Pointe Optimist club, which was held Tuesday, final plans were completed for the charter night program and entertainment to take place Saturday night at the Whittier.

### Louwers Officially Declared Chief of Park Police Monday

President Howard Parrshall of the Grosse Pointe Park village commission formally appointed Arthur E. Louwers as Park chief of police Monday night at the commission meeting.

Reappointed E. B. Lane, village manager, William Johnson, comptroller, Charles Heise, treasurer, and Edmond S. Ruppel, assessor; Pierre J. St. Pierre, and Edward Recchini, were also elected presiding officers of the commission.

### Woods Employees Given 10% Wage Increase

At a special meeting of the Grosse Pointe Woods village commission Tuesday night, the commissioners granted a 10% raise in salaries and wages to all village employees, with a few minor exceptions.

A. A. Ghesquiere, village president, said that the action was in keeping with the policy of the commission to meet a situation before trouble arises.

### Roof Fire Causes Damage

Considerable damage was done to the Fred Auch residence, 1246 Buckingham last Sunday afternoon due to a roof fire. The cause is undetermined.

### Park Needs Office Space; May Request Township to Move

A committee made up of two Grosse Pointe Park commissioners and the village manager will study the over-all picture of remodeling the municipal building at Maryland and Jefferson.

E. B. Lane, village manager, reported to the commission that a preliminary plan was drawn up to relocate the area over the village garage municipal offices.

### Farms Employees Strike For More Wages

The residents of Grosse Pointe Farms are burning their rubbish and burying their garbage.

This procedure began Monday morning when the men of the public works and park departments went on strike for more wages.

The annual village wage survey, announced on April 8, showed that the village employees are entitled to a 10% wage increase.

### Remaining War Plants Ordered to Move by Commission

Upon the recommendation of the planning commission, the village commission of Grosse Pointe Park determined that they would not change the zoning ordinance to permit small industrial plants.

The present laws and agreement require that the war plants which were established and permitted in the village during the emergency, must be evicted.

## Chiefs of Police Score Activities Of Local Youths

Vandalism has struck a new note in Grosse Pointe during the past few weeks.

According to Thomas Trombly, chief of police, City of Grosse Pointe, and Eugene Bolo, acting police chief in the Farms, the malicious destruction of public and private property has reached hundreds of dollars because of the activities of the teen age group of the community.

For the past three or four weeks, groups of these youths have congregated in the two communities on Friday nights, on foot or in cars. They go about smashing windows in automobiles and homes, ride over lawns, shoot out street lights and in general raise havoc in the Pointe.

## Recreation Program Suggested

Do the children of Grosse Pointe Park need additional recreational facilities?

According to the planning commission of Grosse Pointe Park, the boys and girls do; but the village commission wants to "think this over."

A report was read to the commissioners Monday night by E. B. Lane, village manager, from the planning group which cited the need of the children, especially those living in the northern part of the village.

- 1. A recreation and instruction program two times each week for the young teen agers at Defer and Trombly schools;
- 2. A dancing class for boys and girls in Grosse Pointe Park and in Grosse Pointe Woods;
- 3. A teen age center which would include a snack bar, game room, craft room and juke box;
- 4. Additional skating rinks;
- 5. A ski jump;
- 6. More playgrounds for the smaller children in the area north of Kercheval.

To maintain such a program, the planning commission recommended that the village appropriate \$3,000. The report stated that the facilities of the board of education could be used, and stipulated that proper supervision be mandatory.

After the report was read, President Howard Parrshall thought it advisable to turn the suggestions over to Commissioner Joel Sage, for further study. The former said that the suggestion, in general, seemed agreeable to him although he "wondered about the dancing class."

**WANTED—A GUIDING HAND**

Perhaps some people are right, after all. How many times have you had to defend the actions of the boys and girls of Grosse Pointe after they came to the attention of the public?

It looks as though the people of Grosse Pointe are going to have "to go to bat" for the youths of the community again, very soon, if something isn't done about the wave of youthful lawlessness which is spreading in the community.

The time of these activities appears to be Friday nights between 10 o'clock and midnight, when the 14-16 and 18-year-olds are found racing up and down Pointe streets, or "roaming" the streets, leaving behind them a string of broken windows, street lights, soft tires and general unlawful acts which cannot be termed pranks.

Is it fair for these young people to carry on in such a manner that the term "wild animals" has been applied to them? Is it fair for the parents of the community to shrug their shoulders, say "My son wouldn't do that," and turn away from such disagreeable facts? Is it fair for the police departments to turn into disciplinary officers who try to keep such activities in check?

A remedy of this situation lies within the scope of the parents of the teen agers who are carrying on in such a manner. It is up to you to find out what your son, and your daughter, too, is doing on Friday nights — who his companions are — and what his activities include.

Friday nights are stressed in this instance because such goings-on take place in the majority of cases at this time; on Saturday and Sunday nights the younger generation appear to behave themselves.

We find very little quarrel with the young people of Grosse Pointe as a whole, but once in awhile when their young natures want to assert themselves, they need guidance — away from this destruction — to the finer things more in keeping with their youthful ambition.

It is up to the parents to extend the guiding hand and eliminate these disgraceful activities.

**Corporal Milz Assigned to Naples**

LEGHORN, Italy—Cpl. Theodore E. Milz Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore E. Milz Sr., of 1238 Beaconsfield, Grosse Pointe, arrived safely in Naples and has been assigned to the 312th Army Postal Unit, here, a unit of the Peninsular Base Section, the Army Service Force in Italy.

PBS served and supplied Fifth Army and the ground crews of the U.S. Air Force and Navy during the entire Italian campaign. The Base is commanded by Brigadier General Francis H. Oxx.

After arrival in Naples Port, Cpl. Milz was transported to the 7th Replacement Depot for processing according to Army skill and civilian specialty. At the depot, he was provided with bed and mattress, adequate blankets and Post Exchange supplies in buildings of the "college" area in Bagnoli. Within thirty-six hours he boarded coach trains to Leghorn. Enroute here, the train stopped at Rome where a hot meal was served. At Grosseto, almost mid-way between Rome and Leghorn, coffee and doughnuts were provided in a railroad station club of the American Red Cross. Upon arrival at Leghorn, the soldier went to the 1st Staging Area to be transported to his assigned unit in the near vicinity.

PBS rehabilitated the ports of Naples, Auzio, Civitavecchio, Piombino and Leghorn in support of Fifth Army's drive up the Italian peninsula. PBS also played a major part in the mounting of the Southern France invasion.

Cpl. Milz worked for the Continental Motors Corp. before entering the Army on June 19, 1945. He took training at Camp Wolters, Texas, before coming overseas.

**USES to Assist Veterans in "On the Job Training"**

The United States Employment Service is cooperating with the State Department of Public Instruction, Public School Vocational Coordinators, The Office of Veterans Affairs, and the Veterans Administration, in setting up "on the job" training for veterans. Mr. Evans, manager of U.S.E.S. at 14421 E. Jefferson said today.

The U.S.E.S. in collaboration with the agencies listed above is this week deeply engaged in a state-wide campaign to develop openings for "on the job" training. Through this training the government subsidizes the learning veteran to the extent of \$65 to \$90 per month supplementing the starting or training rate received from the training employer.

The employer who wishes to set up an "on the job" training program need only file a "form 388" application with the State Department of Public Instruction. This form is procurable from the office of the U.S.E.S., the O.V.A. or the School Coordinator, Mr. Evans said.

The Department of Public Instruction will examine the application to check the statements, determine whether suitable personnel are available for effective training, and to assist the employer in setting up a suitable program. Programs must meet certain tests of effectiveness such as, detail of training, proper training personnel, wages and increases and availability of classroom study which should be 162 hours a year.

Any veteran who is interested in "on the job" training should file a "form 950" with the Veterans Administration, to establish his eligibility for training, and for receiving the subsistence allowance.

Under any circumstances, the veteran should apply to the U.S.E.S. for job counseling, and information regarding his aptitudes and capacities, for knowledge of what opportunities exist, and for referral to training opportunities. Mr. Evans pointed out, "Like referrals to jobs, referrals to these training opportunities are not binding upon either veteran or employer."

**U. S. Commissioner of Education Awarded Treasurer's Distinguished Service Medal**

As the representative of a million teachers in 225,000 American schools with 30,000,000 pupils, John W. Studebaker, U. S. commissioner of education, was awarded last Wednesday the Treasury department's silver medal for distinguished service in war finance.

In presenting the medal at Commissioner Studebaker's office, Vernon L. Clark, national director of the U. S. savings bond division of the Treasury department, said:

"During the war the schools of the nation sold more than two billion dollars (\$2,000,000,000) worth of U.S. savings stamps and bonds, at the same time teaching thrift and forming habits of regular saving and wise money management. We are gratified that schools in all states are continuing this program in peacetime, for its value to the nation has been too great to measure only in dollars. Through you we are honoring the million teachers who made it possible."

In accepting the medal, Commissioner Studebaker said: "On behalf of the nation's schools I accept with thanks this token awarded by the

Treasury department in recognition of the splendid patriotic contribution made by the teachers and pupils of our country. I, too, pay tribute to them. The lesson of thrift learned in wartime by the children and youth of America will stand them in good stead in time of peace. It is my earnest hope that the schools will continue with unabated enthusiasm their participation in the school savings program, sponsored by the Treasury department with the cooperation of this office."

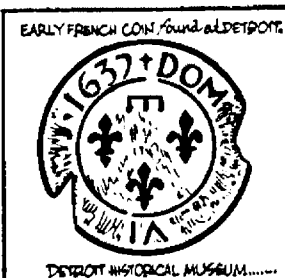

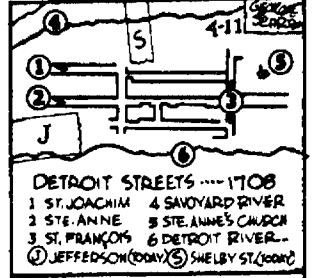

Representative Rabaut Makes Check of Surplus Property for Veterans

WASHINGTON — Congressman Louis C. Rabaut, Democrat of Michigan, brought to the attention of the House of Representatives the situation regarding the endeavors of veterans to obtain surplus property.

Lt. General Edmund B. Gregory, Administrator of the War Assets Administration commented on the situation and Rabaut also included his letter in the Record "in order," as he said, "that the House, the country, and the veterans may be informed as to the progress made in the veterans' behalf during recent months."

Gregory gives a clear picture of the situation as he points out that under the law, Federal, State, and local government agencies, in need of goods which can be found in surplus, cannot legally purchase such goods elsewhere; nor can the War Assets legally sell to any other claimant first.

Administrator Gregory concludes by stating that every effort is being made to improve service to the veteran in helping him acquire the things that are available. A new Veterans Division, staffed by veterans, dedicated solely to the service of veterans, has been established in each regional office blanketing the country, and will follow through to final disposition every application filed by a veteran for surplus property.

On Palm Sunday, April 14, a class of children, as well as a class of adults will be confirmed and will thus be received into communicant membership with the church: the time of the confirmation service is 10:30 a.m. The early service will, as usual, take place at eight o'clock. Sunday school will meet at 9:15 a.m.

On Good Friday, April 18, a service appropriate to the day will be held at 1:15 p.m.; it will close at 2:30 o'clock, thus giving workers a half hour to return to their place of business. "Saved to Serve" will be the theme of the sermon.

**UNRRA Supply Truck Pinch Hits As Ambulance**  
Athens, — When 25 children in a remote Greek mountain village were bitten by a violently rabid dog, they were quickly loaded on an UNRRA truck and sped by the shortest route to the nearest city with a Pasteur Institute.

The truck which pinch-hit as an ambulance had arrived a few hours earlier and just finished unloading emergency supplies for the village.

**U. of M. Museum Display Features Evidence Found of Prehistoric Life**

Evidence of prehistoric life in the Great Lakes area within 50 miles of the retreating ice cap has been uncovered by a University of Michigan survey group headed by Dr. F. Greenman, curator of the division of the Great Lakes at the university museum of anthropology.

Findings of the survey of the Manitoulin region in Ontario, Can., are now being featured in an exhibit in the rotunda of the museum on the university campus, which will continue until June 1. The University of Michigan group has been discovering evidence each summer since 1938 near Killarney, Ont., where abandoned beaches at three levels give evidence of the occupation of those sites by prehistoric people.

Formation of the beaches, which were at water level some thousands of years ago, and are now at various heights above the present Great Lakes level, was due to the tilting upward of the basin of these lakes in a north and south direction since the glacier left this part of the country, Dr. Greenman says.

The lowest beach on which evidence of man has been found at this location is 28 feet above the present lake level, the next highest is 50 feet, and the highest 297 feet above lake level. All are inland from the present shore. Determining the age of a beach from its elevation above the present lake level, Dr. George Stanley associate professor of geology, estimates that the people who made the implements found on the highest beach lived there from 10,000 to 15,000 years ago at a time when the glacier was only 50 miles to the north. He places life on the middle beach at about 2,500 years ago and his estimate for the lowest beach is 1,400 years ago.

Examination of the implements, says Dr. Greenman, shows that a close correlation existed between the development of the industries and the antiquity of the beaches. The lowest beach, which is also the highest industry. Here clay vessels were found, as well as flint projectile points and ornaments ground out of slate. From the middle beach, pottery was totally absent, and on the highest beach flint and pottery were absent and there were no evidences.
