





Special reference should be made to a method of food adulteration that is injurious to health. The use of mineral oil in food products, which is a non-edible oil, has become prevalent because of the shortage of the more expensive edible oils. In spite of repeated warnings by this department, inspectors continue to find various lots of food products that contain mineral oil being offered for sale or served in food stores and eating establishments. Many of the latter have used mineral oil in salad dressings. Mineral oil has also been used for seasoning popcorn. Generafly artificial coloring has been added to make the popcorn appear to have been fresh buttered. Mineral oil is a non-nutritive product and is illegal for use in common articles of food regardless of labelling. The sale of ordinary articles of food containing mineral oil, including the serving of mineral oil salad dressings in cating establishments, is also prohibited

Another form of adulteration that is on the increase and should be discontinued is the substitution of saccharin in the place of sugar. Saccharin is non-nutritive; therefore, it is not a food product and is illegal in food, drink or beverage except when the same is intended for special dietary products and the labelling conforms to the specific regulations,





Food Collection Draws to Close School children were given the

oulk of credit for the results to date the Emergency Food Collection, which draws to a close this weekend. Percival Dodge, vice-chairman of the Detroit area committee, this week made a last-minute appeal to individuals and organizations to equal the splendid response to the drive that was evidenced by the youngsters. Cash contributions, preferred over

donations of canned foods, since more cans can be purchased in wholesale quantities at seaboard shipping points and at a saving of packing and shipping time and costs, have been disappointingly meager so far in the drive, Dodge said. He pointed out that, since the June 2 beginning of the collection of money for food for starving millions in wartorn lands, less than \$7,000 has been contributed in the Detroit area. "There are over eight hundred mil-

ion persons suffering from acute malnutrition in Europe and Asia," he said, "and many of them are going to die a horrible death unless more food from the United States and others of the more fortunate countries reaches them quickly. In many sections, storms and widespread drouth nave greatly reduced the 1946 crops in countries which emerged from the war with no food reserves whatever. They are face to face with the worst catastrophe ever to visit the world in recorded history. It is almost impossible to realize that more than a third of the entire world's population is actually facing death or permanent physical and mental damage through lack of a minimum diet. The other two-thirds of us must do all we can to alleviate this condition.

"Detroit's school children contributed nearly one hundred seventyfive thousand cans of food during the past few weeks, in spite of the fact | that they were busily engaged in graduation, examinations, and plans for their summer holiday period. Some of the schools gave up to \$250 in addition to the food, although the children were not asked to donate

"If this city's adult population is The newlyweds left immediately going to do anywhere nearly as well, there is no time to be lost," Dodge reminded. The campaign ends June 30. The need for money for food is desperately great. There can be no lasting peace in a hungry world,

"I am appealing to everyone in check to the Emergency Food Collection, and send it immediately to Room 601, 153 E. Elizabeth street, Detroit 1, Mich. The money is being converted to food as soon as it is forwarded to national headquarters, and is being shipped overseas immediately for distribution to the needy through the facilities of the UNRRA. ## **READING & WRITING** BY Edwin Seaver and Robin M'Kown

In my long career with the United States Army I've made a hobby of cultivating the very best people in it. And for some strange reason the very best people usually turn out to work in the kitchen."

You might say that Ernie Pyle expressed his philosophy of life in those lines, taken from his posthumous book, "Last Chapter." He never did think of the war in terms of official communiques and generals' strategy. It was guys like Sgt. Thomas Hill of St. Louis and Corp. Mickey Rovinsky of Edwardsville, Pa., who served in the mess hall, and it was thousands of others whom he knew personally, and whose joys and sorrows he sincerely shared. In "Here Is Your War" and "Brave Men," a Book-of-the-Month Club selection,

Ernie Pyle talked about the GI's war in Europe and Africa. He could have taken a rest after D-Day, but there was still the Pacific to win, and where the fighting was he felt he had to go. In the Marianas first and then living with the boys who flew the B-29s over the Japanese homeland, he saw a different kind of war. Next he joined an aircraft carrier on the invasion of Okinawa. He made the landing with the Marines and saw Okinawa secured. Then his luck ran out. A Japanese bullet killed Ernie Pyle on April 17, 1945, on Ie Shima. "Last Chapter" is the record

he has left us of his Pacific experiences, up until the time of his death. Even six months after we had the Marianas, there were still several hundred Japs in hiding. Ernie Pyle tells of one who, unlike his fellows, didn't take to the hills, but stayed for weeks right in the most thickly American-populated section of the island.

He hid in the bushes just a few feet from a path where hundreds of Americans walked daily. They found out later that he even used the officers' outdoor shower bath after they got through and raided their

kitchens at night. There was a Jap prison enclosure nearby, and peering out of the bushes he studied the fare of his fellow soldiers. Then one day he came out and gave himself up. He said he had convinced himself they were being treated all right, so he was ready to surrender.






