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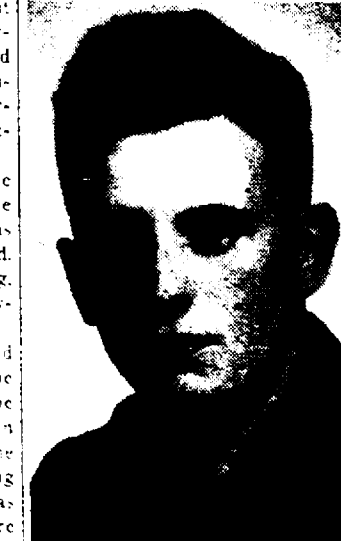

Service Club's Paper Bows Out After Three Years

The special service edition issued by the Service club of St. Paul's church bowed out of existence last week after relaying the news to the servicemen and women of that parish for three years.

On April 11, 1943, sanctioned by Fr. Albert Melvin, the St. Vincent de Paul society, under the guidance of Father Zinger, undertook the task under the name of the St. Paul Service club, to issue the first special service edition for those in service.

At that time there were 201 in the service of their country from the parish, many of whom were writing the parish priests to such an extent that it was an almost impossible task to answer the letters.

The Service club promised at that time that the special service edition would be issued periodically in periods of every three weeks. The club has been faithful to its promise and in the course of three years and two months are now publishing this last issue number 50.

The Service club recognizes that there are boys still in service and that more may go. It is hoped that they will continue the practice of writing the parish priest or the Service club. Their letters will continue to be answered.

It is safe to say that no paper regularly published in the world ever obtained a wider distribution than the St. Paul Service issue. Almost every country in the world is mentioned in some issue or other, in a letter from one in the parish away from home. The service issue had been delivered late of course but it got there.

U. of M. Begins Building Program

Permission has been given to the University of Michigan by the Civilian Production Administration to begin construction immediately on a General Service building and a building for the school of business administration.

Completed arrangements in Washington with the CPA for the building permits. He announced that a priority had been given for the General Service building with a provision that two floors be used for classrooms during the veterans' education emergency. Ultimately all of the university's administrative offices will be housed in the structure.

The site for the General Service building had been cleared just before the building restrictions went into effect. Money for this structure was appropriated by the 1945 legislature. The appropriation for a school of business administration building was made by the special session of the legislature early this year.

Work has already started on additions to the chemistry and engineering buildings, three housing projects and a food service building.

Avoid Inflation—Invest in Bonds

"Inflation is our Number One domestic problem." That statement was made by Fred M. Vinson, secretary of the treasury, on the eve of his nomination to be chief justice of the U. S. supreme court.

"The people of America," Mr. Vinson continued, "have developed a tremendous demand for consumer goods, backed up by many billions of dollars in savings. Although we are well on our way into peacetime production, we cannot produce enough tomorrow or the next day to meet this accumulated demand. Here lies the danger of spiraling prices or inflation."

"A bad case of inflation would be a national catastrophe, affecting each and every one of us. It would distort every economic value, private and public. And so I say to you: One of the best ways to combat inflation is to take as few of our dollars as possible to market until production shall match demand."

"If you desire to help your country and yourself to win the economic phase of World War II, you will not only hold every war bond that you have, but you will continue to buy as many U. S. Savings Bonds as you can. Thus you will help yourself and help to control inflation."

Robert C. Douglass, state director for the U. S. savings bonds division of the treasury, points out that in 1946 American consumers will have at least \$20 billions of income over and above what they can spend at legitimate prices on all the consumer goods and services available this year.

To get as much as possible of this surplus money out of the market for scarce goods and into savings bonds is the aim of a publicity campaign launched by the U. S. savings bonds division of the treasury, Mr. Douglass explained. This will run through July Fourth. It is not a bond drive in the wartime sense, with quotas and patriotic appeals to "back the attack." This time the appeal is to "back your own future" by putting away every possible spare dollar in U. S. savings bonds.

"Spending money recklessly, buying scarce goods at inflated prices," Mr. Douglass concluded, "is like cutting down the tree to get a few green apples. The thing to do is wait until the apples are ripe before you eat them. Leave the tree to bear fruit in years to come. Any child can see the sense of that, yet a lot of grown folks don't apply it to their money."

Sales of all U. S. Savings bonds in the first five months of 1946 in the nation totalled almost \$3½ billions; nationally, sales exceeded redemptions by \$629,000,000.

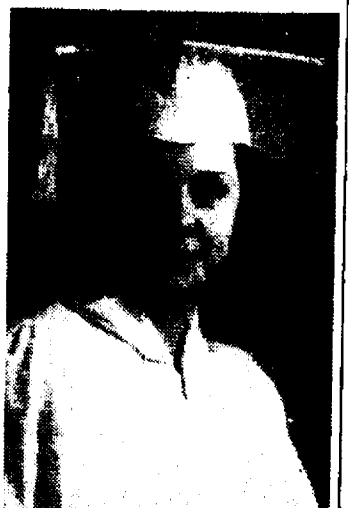

European Emergency Food Collection Draws to Close

School children were given the bulk of credit for the results to date in the Emergency Food Collection, which draws to a close this weekend. Percival Dodge, vice-chairman of the Detroit area committee, this week made a last-minute appeal to individuals and organizations to equal the splendid response to the drive that was evidenced by the youngsters.

Cash contributions, preferred over donations of canned foods, since more cans can be purchased in wholesale quantities at seaboard shipping points and at a saving of packing and shipping time and costs, have been disappointingly meager so far in the drive, Dodge said. He pointed out that, since the June 2 beginning of the collection of money for food for starving millions in war-torn lands, less than \$7,000 has been contributed in the Detroit area.

"There are over eight hundred million persons suffering from acute malnutrition in Europe and Asia," he said, "and many of them are going to die a horrible death unless more food from the United States and others of the more fortunate countries reaches them quickly. In many sections, storms and widespread drought have greatly reduced the 1946 crops in countries which emerged from the war with no food reserves whatever. They are face to face with the worst catastrophe ever to visit the world in recorded history. It is almost impossible to realize that more than a third of the entire world's population is actually facing death or permanent physical and mental damage through lack of a minimum diet. The other two-thirds of us must do all we can to alleviate this condition.

Grosse Ile Naval Base to Hold Open House June 30

Formally commemorating the activation of the navy's solution to the problem of providing a "ready" peacetime fleet air arm, a mammoth open house will be held at the naval air station at Grosse Ile from noon to 5 p.m., on Sunday, June 30, to officially launch the naval air reserve program, the commanding officer of the base announced Sunday.
Virtually the entire station will be available to the public. Flights will be in progress, many of the 85 combat-type aircraft assigned to the base will be on display, and colorful exhibitions of survival equipment will contribute to the festive occasion. Other attractions will be announced.

Open house will be held simultaneously at 22 naval air stations throughout the country. They stretch from coast to coast and have been assigned to conduct the reserve program. The open house marks the formal commissioning of the 10 naval air squadrons and one Marine air squadron which will operate from Grosse Ile. They will be manned entirely by navy and Marine Corps veterans who are members of the organized reserve, and who will be voluntarily serving with pay on active duty approximately two week-ends each month.

The navy's air reserve program is being created to achieve two main objectives: One, to afford former navy and Marine Corps aviation personnel the opportunity of maintaining the aeronautical proficiency gained during the wartime training period and; two, to supply the nation with an air force that can move quickly to supplement the regular navy carrier forces in event of a national emergency.
The importance this program holds in the minds of the men who fought World War II is attested to by the number of them who have already shown an interest in the naval air reserve. Over eleven hundred former navy and Marine pilots and almost 400 other aviation personnel are included in the group from this area who have enrolled or shown an intention of enrolling in the air reserve at Grosse Ile. This number is especially impressive in view of the fact that the program has not yet been officially activated.
Capt. G. R. Fairbank, Jr., commanding officer of the base, stressed the advantages to many veterans in taking part in the program in that they will protect their ratings and longevity in case they are ordered to duty in a future emergency. However, members of the navy reserve they cannot be ordered to active duty until they have completed their training period except upon their own request.

Inducements Offered to Navy Enlistees

The navy department has recently authorized special inducements to men enlisting for electronic technician's mate training, according to Cmdr. George M. Winne, officer in charge of navy recruiting in lower Michigan. "The reason for these inducements is the navy's urgent need for replacements in this highly-technical rating," says Commander Winne. "Seldom does an opportunity like this present itself to men who desire experience and advanced training in such a specialized and scientific field as electronics."

The special inducements offered by the navy to men interested in electronics is 48 weeks training in radio electronics, consisting of instruction in elementary electricity and elementary and advanced radio material. In addition, enlistees may be advanced in rating to petty officer, first class during the period of training.

Duties of electronics technician's mates are the maintenance and repair of radio transmitters and receivers, radar, underwater sound and aircraft bombing apparatus, and radio beacons.

Included with the special inducements are other attractive features

such as 20 per cent additional pay for sea or foreign duty, 30 days annual leave with pay, liberal dependents benefits, clothing allowance, free medical and dental care, income tax exemption until official termination of the war and all the benefits of the G.I. Bill of Rights.

Enlistment terms are for two, three, four or six years for men 18 to 30 years of age. Seventeen-year-olds may enlist for two or three years or until 21st birthday. Parental consent is required for men 17 to 21 years of age.

Detailed information on navy enlistments is available at the navy recruiting station, third floor of the Federal building, Detroit, or at recruiting stations in Flint, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Jackson, Grand Rapids and Saginaw.

The cost to the home owners has been enormous, but an even more serious concern is the threat of disease resulting from such an unsanitary condition.

The Association intends to make the strongest protest possible against the repetition of such an occurrence. There will be a mass meeting at the Parkside Housing project community center building, 12075 Frankfort, on Tuesday night, July 2, at eight o'clock. 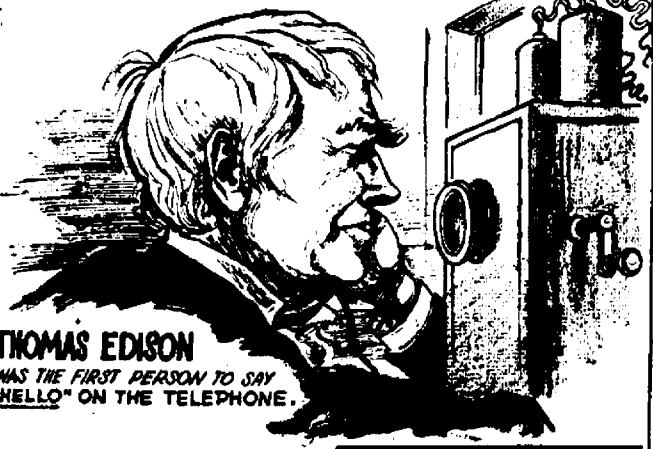

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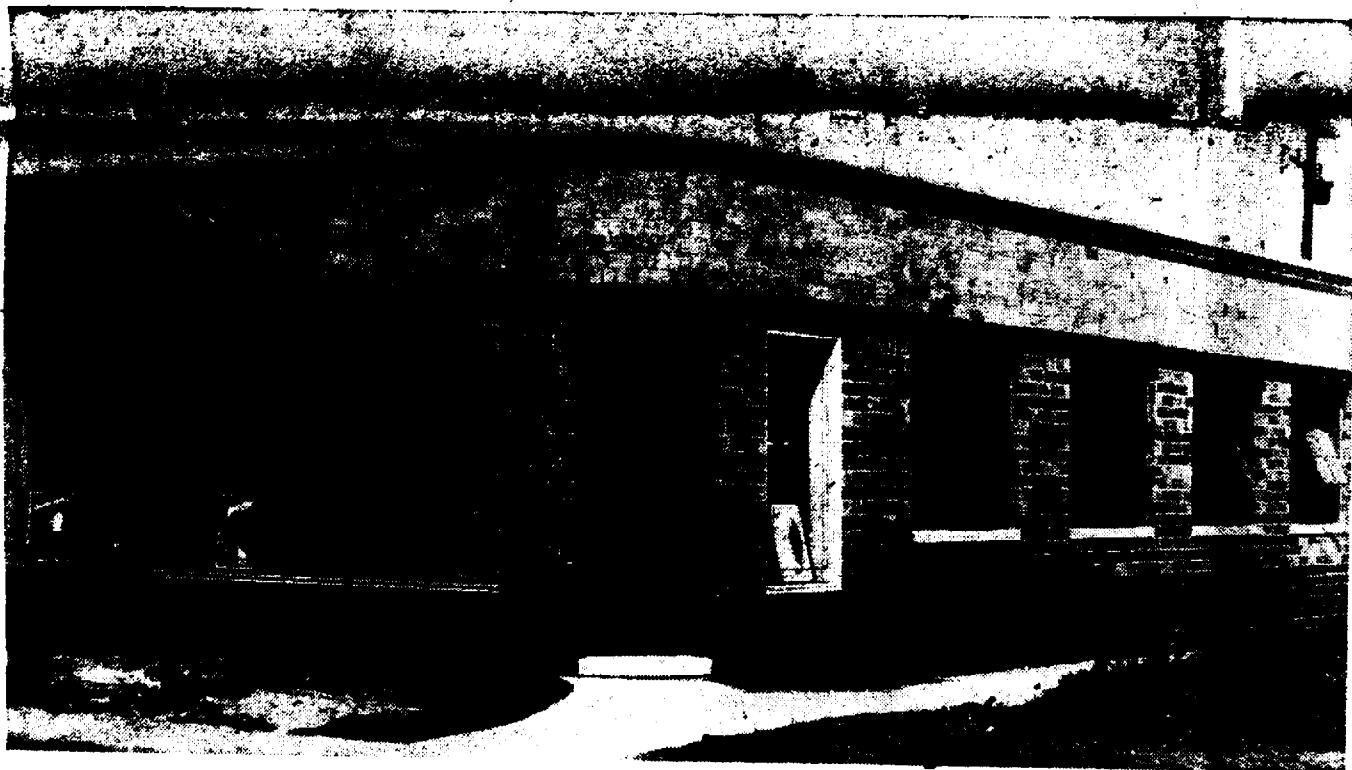

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Select Musicians to Appear in Series

Yves Tinayre, celebrated authority on vocal and religious music of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance, and Lee Pattison, well-known pianist, and former member of the famous two-piano team of Maier and Pattison, are two of the distinguished musicians who will participate in a series of six lecture-recital and chamber music programs to be presented in Detroit this summer by the University of Michigan extension service. Both Tinayre and Pattison are guest faculty members for the summer session of the university's school of music and the other artists participating are also either guest or regular faculty members of the school. Programs will be presented at 8:00 p.m. on consecutive Tuesday nights, beginning July 9, in the main auditorium of the Rackham Educational Memorial.

Offered as an experiment this year, it is hoped that similar series will become a regular part of the Detroit summer program of the extension service. First two programs in this year's series will be piano lecture-recitals by Pattison on Tuesday, July 9, and Tuesday, July 16.

On July 23, Tinayre, who is recognized as a great concert artist as well as an outstanding scholar, will present Vocal Music of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance and on July 30 he will give a program on Religious Music of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance.

The last two programs, Aug. 6 and 13, will be chamber music for piano and strings. Pianist for the first of these will be Pattison. Joseph Brinkman, faculty member of the university's school of music, will be the pianist for the second. The other artists for these two programs are Louise Rood, violist, faculty member of Smith college; Oliver Edel, cellist, former member of the Roth quartette; and Gilbert Ross, violinist, faculty member of the university's school of music.
