Salvation Army Head Views World's Needs

An appeal to women everywhere to "restore the sacred sweetness of family life" and thus help in marching forward to a better world has just been issued by Gen. Albert W. T. Orsborn, newly-elected commander of The Salvation Army.

"The world requires a better home-life, builded upon God," says General Orsborn in a message to the Salvation Army here, from his headquarters in London.

"We need to restore the sanctities of life's intimate relationships. We have to do everything in our power to restore the sacred sweetness of family life.

"A nation's true prosperity is determined by the quality of the personal and private lives of its citizens.

"The war has defaced or destroyed the lovely homes in many lands. The toil and thrif of years has too often perished under the stroke of ruthless destroyers. Many of the builders of and makers of humble homes have themselves perished beneath their ruined dwellings. But all these desperate hurts will not take from humble and believing hearts the love of home and family.

"In these alarming days you will conserve the spiritual bulwarks of your dear land by maintaining the highest Christian standards.

"Keep the true ideals of home-life ever before your eyes, and devote yourselves to them."

General Orsborn, tall, vital 59-year-old widower considers The Salvation Army the "bulldozer" of religion and plans to "put the Army on wheels and on wings if necessary." He will come to the United States in late September and early October for a tour of inspection of Salvation Army work in this country, Canada, West Indies and South America. On Oct. 9 and 10 General Orsborn will visit Detroit.

**\$122,000,000<sup>00</sup> FOR THE "GENERAL WELFARE"**

Through the ten years ending with 1945, The Detroit Edison Company paid taxes totaling more than \$122,000,000. Those taxes were collected from us, under the authority of the Constitution, to "provide for the common defence and promote the general welfare."
