Veteran Council Sets Closing Date

At a meeting of the executive board of the Grosse Pointe Council of Veterans' Affairs held last Thursday, a resolution was passed terminating as of Oct. 31, 1946 the functions of the Veterans' Information Center at the quonset hut, Kercheval avenue at Cadieux road.

Although the board had planned to operate the center until the middle of 1947, its decision to terminate it on Oct. 31 was influenced by the fact that its headquarters must be moved from its present site by Nov. 1, 1946 to make way for new construction on the property. Also, at the present time the council has already served more than 75 per cent of the men and women returning from service in this area and only a relatively few remain to be discharged.

Wrigley Market Safe Looted Over Week-end

Thieves broke into the Wrigley super market, 19275 Mack avenue, Grosse Pointe Woods, and escaped with \$8,859.52 some time last Saturday night or Sunday.

They scaled a 20 foot wall, bored a hole through the roof and rewired the burglar alarm to escape detection.

After gaining entrance the thugs moved the heavy safe with a small hand truck into the refrigerator where they proceeded to break it.

Nicholas J. Krier, store manager, told police that the safe was not the conventional type used by the company, but was a substitute forced into use because of scarcities. The usual type of safe could not have been blown open. The wrecked safe was opened with simple tools.

The burglar alarm had been installed Aug. 14. Delay in installation was due to the scarcity of materials. The thieves seemed to be familiar with the alarm as they were able to work without its working.

Police found a rope hanging at the rear of the store which was tied to a pipe on the roof. The rope aided the burglars in their getaway. No other clues were found.

Storm Causes Light Failure

Portions of Grosse Pointe Park were blacked out Sunday night when lightning struck a high tension wire at Somerset and Mack avenue.

As a precautionary measure the village officials turned off the street lights to avoid further damage to electrical apparatus by lightning.

Government Seeks Testimony From Former Jap Prisoners for War Trials

Sergeant John E. Pomniety, USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Pomniety, 640 Neff road is among the former Michigan prisoners of war being contacted for testimony concerning additional information on Japanese treatment and atrocities to American prisoners.

The financing of the center has been satisfactorily arranged for the period of the new budget from July 1, 1946 to Oct. 31, 1946 by regular appropriations of public tax funds which have been received from the villages of Grosse Pointe Park, Farms, Shores, Woods and Grosse Pointe township. An offer of voluntary contributions from individuals in the City of Grosse Pointe in place of

civil affairs division, war department, will act as the coordinating agency for the project. Eight officers from the legal section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Tokyo, have returned to the United States to supervise the over-all plan. These officers will set up headquarters to the war crimes branch in Washington, where they will be collected and then sent on to Tokyo.

Letters have been sent to each former PW from whom a deposition is desired, urging him to visit either a federal district attorney's office or a VA office. Local addresses of these offices are included in the letter.

Originally an attempt was made to contact every former PW immediately on his release from confinement and have him fill out a questionnaire, the answers to which would reflect his personal knowledge of war crimes, and its potential value as trial evidence. It was hoped that this would provide an adequate basis for the presentation of war crimes evidence.

If a questionnaire indicated that the PW had information which would be of value, he was questioned further by trained investigators and his testimony reduced to writing.

However, as the trials progressed, it became increasingly apparent that the statements available for use represented only a small percentage of the total number of Americans who were held prisoner by the Japanese and, further, that particular points needing coverage often were not included in statements that were possessed by the prosecuting teams.

The present plan was devised to avoid the necessity of having the prosecuting teams request statements or additional information from former PWs as each individual case arose and, also, to complete the record of the war crimes trials in Japan for historical purposes.

Grosse Pointe Liquor Store Re-opened After Closing Saturday by MLCC

A Michigan liquor control commission store at Beaconsfield and Kercheval was closed by the auditor last Saturday after discovery was made that choice brands including Scotch and other liquors were being sold by the case.

The commission took speedy action and Gen. L. A. Kainig, commission business manager issued an order for the firing of three employees.

Those alleged to have taken the liquor and who were fired are Cyril E. Green, 160 W. Montclair, manager; Mrs. Laura Rohde, 11783 Longview, clerk; and Mrs. Sand, 12441 Beaconsfield, cashier. The three missed employees and four other persons were operating at the Park municipal building, 1000 High, and sold liquor to the community.

Dr. Paul Essert Announces School Opening Schedule

According to an announcement by Dr. Paul L. Essert, superintendent of the Grosse Pointe public schools, the regular fall term of the schools will open Monday, Sept. 9, when all classes begin. The postponement from the earlier scheduled opening on Sept. 5 has been due to the cooperation of the Grosse Pointe area with metropolitan boards of health in attempting to reduce the polio epidemic.

Residents Shocked by Sudden Death of William Beaupre

William Beaupre well known resident of Grosse Pointe and a member of the family of early settlers died suddenly, Tuesday morning, after a short illness at the age of 70.

The Beaupre family is synonymous with the history of Grosse Pointe, and the annual family golf tournaments have drawn enthusiastic followers from the Pointe, Detroit and other neighboring communities. This year's golf tournament was played off just a few weeks ago with the Beaupre clan and friends in attendance. At that time the deceased was in good health.

Surviving are the widow Mathilda; five sons, Ormond, Francis, Russell, William, Eugene; three daughters, Mrs. M. D. Price and Mrs. Theo Trefzer; brother, Albert.

Funeral services from the Verheyden Funeral Home, Mack avenue at Outer Drive at 9:15 tomorrow morning. Requiem Mass at St. Paul's Roman Catholic church at ten.

A PROBLEM OF WAIST VS. WASTE

The half finished dinner plates on the restaurant tables speak of anything but charity or thrift on the part of Americans. While thousands of our allies and former enemies are suffering from malnutrition and are expected to die because of the lack of proper food Americans continue unconcerned to order large dinners and then leave half the food on their plates.

If these same people are so concerned about their waist lines then may we suggest they try exercising and smaller portions of the starch and sugar laden foods. It's a disgusting fact that many of these men and women order full course meals and after "dabbling" with the food announce, "I don't want to make a pig of myself," and shove the plate away. Strange that they suddenly find a dessert just the thing to round out the meal! Ten to one the dessert will be the richest on the menu.

Some people seem to think that their duty goes only as far as paying taxes and obeying laws. What happens to their neighbor, within the block or the world is no concern of theirs, and yet these same people would be the first to deride any action of our government or any other government eliminating aid to these suffering thousands. What they can't see is that taxes alone won't help. Money can't buy food if it's not available — and it can't be available if it's in American garbage cans.

We have had to make comparably few sacrifices compared to those who suffered first hand the ravages of war, and now when we could offer food in compensation for what we have been spared we shrug our shoulders and with a toss of our heads order our favorite cake. After all we have the money to pay for it — so why should anyone complain, is the general attitude. What we've forgotten is the fact that we wouldn't have the money to buy the food if it hadn't been their country instead of ours directly hit by the war.

Next time you sit down to a meal, how about giving a little thought to those who haven't had a "square" meal to sit down to for the past five years and take only what you can eat. You won't feel underfed and with several million other Americans doing the same thing there will be some Europeans who will feel fed for the first time after that first meal of food from America.

Neighbor Accused of Beating Tyson's Son With a Bat

Emil O. Dauch, 729 Bedford road, charged with beating William Tyson, 12, of 815 Grand Marais, son of Ty Tyson WWJ's sports announcer, was released on \$100 personal bond after his arraignment in justice court. Trial has been set for tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock before Justice James McNally. Dauch is charged with beating the youngster with a souvenir baseball bat after erroneously accusing the youth of persistently ringing his doorbell. Tyson's denial was corroborated by a playmate, George Fox, 14, 832 Grand Marais. Young Tyson sustained bruises on his back, hip and leg.

Beh's Killer Given Life Sentence

Robert F. Smith, 21, an army deserter of Blue Island, Ill., started a life sentence yesterday for the hitch hike killing of Roy Gordon Beh of Grosse Pointe. Smith was sentenced last Tuesday by Judge Fred T. Miles on his plea of guilty. He admitted killing Beh on Dec. 20, 1945 after the murdered man had picked him up on the highway in Ottawa county.

Detroit Commission Furthers Plans for New Playgrounds

Recreation facilities proposed by the city plan commission and the department of parks and recreation for the Detroit of the future will include a large playground and four junior playgrounds in each mile-square neighborhood in the city. The larger playground will be located in the middle of each neighborhood, thus permitting all children to visit it without crossing busy thoroughfares. The junior playgrounds are seen as supplementary to the large ones and are proposed to take care of needs of younger children.

According to experts in the field, small children should not have to walk more than a quarter of a mile to reach recreation facilities. The proposals are contained in a report on recreation soon to be issued by the plan commission as part of the master plan for Detroit.

Fined for Speeding Joseph Roberts, 438 Allard, was fined \$45 and \$10 court costs when he appeared before Justice Joseph Uvick in city court last Monday night. He was charged by City police with speeding 47 miles per hour. Justice Uvick fined Alex Patrick, 3107 Kercheval, \$20 and \$5 court costs on a charge of reckless driving.

Fenske, president of the league's Michigan district, was made a member of the group's national board of governors. The league has some thirty thousand members and sponsors lay activities of the church, including the Lutheran Hour, a nation wide broadcast. The convention voted to continue the radio program through 1947, and its present 908 transmitting stations will be increased to more than one thousand, Wilson said.

At the Tuesday night meeting letters were read by Jules Berns, acting clerk, from Edward Brown, village clerk of St. Clair Shores and another from a representative of school District No. 3, located in St. Clair Shores stating they strongly opposed the Woods' action of purchasing property located within their boundaries. Another letter that was read was from Norbert Neff, city clerk, and commended the commission on their proposed action.

Improved Electric Service Guaranteed Woods' Residents

Failure in the electrical system in Grosse Pointe Woods will become just a memory shortly. Action was taken at the commission meeting this week that will insure the inauguration of work on underground cable in the near future.

Members unanimously approved a proposal of W. B. Hurley of the Detroit Edison company that will give the Woods' a throw over line and two underground feeds, one to each of the pumping stations. Edison company upon receipt of a signed agreement from Woods' officials for payment of \$25,000 will immediately begin work to complete the proposed project before Jan. 1, 1947. The Edison company will do the work for that figure and should it cost more than that the company will make up the difference. More good news came with Hurley's announcement that the Edison company has allocated \$44,000 in its 1947 budget for underground cable from the Grosse Pointe substation to the Torrey road station. Added finances will be met out in 1948 to insure the completion of laying all underground cable along Mack avenue. After the completion of the project the Woods' lighting system will be protected 100 per cent from any electrical or wind storms. The Torrey road and Marter road stations will have underground feeds. There will be a throw over line for emergency use and all lines along Mack avenue will be under ground.

Michigan Peach Crop Exceeds Previous Years

The recent rains gave an additional boost to the peach crop in most of the peach growing areas of Michigan and, more than likely, will help Michigan break all peach production records this season. Charles Figy, director of the state department of agriculture states that according to the federal-state crop reporting service, last year's record peach crop of 4,400,000 bushels, which broke all previous records, is expected to be exceeded this year. His estimates as of Aug. 1 shows 4,428,000 bushels. If this record production materializes, it will be 70 per cent over the 10-year average.

This year's crop will be of especially good quality. New methods have been developed which have aided materially in the control of brown rot of peaches, and the dry weather has helped control insect pests and diseases.

The early peaches are now being harvested. The harvest of the major portion of the crop in southwestern Michigan usually starts this week, with the peak of the season around Labor Day. Now is the time for consumers to be making plans to secure their supply of quality Michigan peaches.

Veterans Institute Approved by Local Board; Await State Approval

At the regular August meeting of the board of education complete and detailed plans were approved by the board for the establishment of a Veterans Institute provided for under the laws of the state, to be supported from fees or tuition charged to veterans which the veteran can receive as a part of his GI benefits. The plan is subject to the approval of the state department of public instruction but it is believed that approval will be given to the local institute.

Under the plan veterans who did not complete their high school education before entering service may enroll in the institute which will open probably about the middle of September and continue their work on an accelerated tutoring plan. Tutoring classes for the veterans will be held either in the Grosse Pointe high school building or in the Cadieux building between the hours of 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. daily and 7 to 10 p.m. The instructors will be drawn from certified teachers of secondary schools. The Veterans Institute will be open to any veteran eligible for benefits under Public Law 346. The fee for the classes will be 50c per hour or \$14.70 per week for a full week's work of 25 hours per veteran which it is assumed will be sufficient to keep the institute on a self-sustaining basis and will therefore be of no additional cost to local taxpayers.

Other communities in the state have had veterans institutes in operation for some time. It has not been necessary since the war closed

to set up such an institute in Grosse Pointe since provisions had been made for the tutoring of veterans who wished to complete their high school education by arranging individual tutoring hours with Charles Saltzer, who himself had returned from service for duty in the schools during the middle of the year and was assigned to the tutoring work until the close of the school year. Mr. Saltzer will now, however, resume his regular duties as assistant principal of the Grosse Pointe high school and Vincent Peterson who had been temporarily filling his place will return to his former duties as field counselor in guidance in the Grosse Pointe schools.

The Veterans Institute program will be administered directly by the principal of Grosse Pointe high school with Mr. Peterson in direct charge. Veterans who wish to enroll for the institute can do so by contacting Mr. Peterson in the high school offices any time after Aug. 26. The veteran can expedite matters by being sure he has filed application form 1950 with the VA in Dearborn, and may enroll in the institute on the date on which the application form 1950 is filed.

Recording the baby's first words may become as commonplace as photographing his first steps with a new magnetic paper tape soon to reach the market, it is announced by the Midwest Research Institute, which works on projects sponsored by various factories.

Crisp, Cool Salads Please Family for Summertime Meals

The wise homemaker, on finding the family in an August eating slump, will resort to cool, colorful and refreshing salads to lure the eye and whet the appetite. Roberta Hershey, extension foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State college, says the housewife will find it much easier to make pleasing salads than to cook foods that will please on hot August days.

To make salads attractive, take more care in arrangement. Consider the rim of the salad plate the frame of the picture. Place the lettuce so that the outer edges are just within the rim—never hanging over the edge. Foods of harmonizing color should be used. Don't forget a few garnishes to complete the salad picture.

To preserve the crisp, fresh appearance of garden vegetables have them thoroughly chilled. Prepare the foods for salads a day in advance, and keep them in the refrigerator overnight, Miss Hershey suggests. For a texture contrast—use something crisp with something soft. For example, use celery in fish, egg and vegetable salads; use shredded cabbage or lettuce in shrimp, vegetable or fruit salads.

Tomato slices or wedges, parsley, watercress, sliced cucumber, lemon, grapes, pickles or ripe or green olives are excellent for garnishes in fish salads. Fruit salads become more colorful with halves of strawberries, cherries, fresh mint, cubes of red jelly, grapes or nuts as a garnish. Pep up vegetable salads with aspic, cheese or a sprig of parsley.

Mayonnaise and French dressing are made with salad oil and will have to be used sparingly this summer. A good homemade boiled dressing is fine with meat and vegetable salads. Tart fruit juices give excellent contrasts in flavor with naturally sweet fruit salads.

Clothing Stored Damp May Mildew

Clothes stored slightly damp, where air cannot circulate through them on hot summer days, may mildew according to Lola Belle Green, extension specialist in clothing at Michigan State college.

Clothing put away in air-tight bags should be thoroughly cleaned, sunned and aired to make certain it is dry. If stored in a dry place, or in a moisture-proof container, garments properly prepared are out of danger, Miss Green relates.

Mildew is not a simple stain, as many believe, but is a fungous growth which eventually "eats" into the fibers of the cloth causing serious and permanent damage. It thrives in a damp, warm, dark and unventilated place.

Unless proper precautions were taken to make certain clothes were dry when stored, it might prove profitable to make a midsummer

examination to see if any mildew has started. If so, Miss Green suggests they should be removed, brushed, sunned and dried outdoors. Sponging will remove a light surface growth on wool. Soap and water will remove very fresh mildew from washable material. Mild bleaches, such as lemon juice and salt, may be used on white fabrics. If mildew has been left too long, however, there is no way of erasing its damage.

A chance to glorify summer fruits is fruit mousse. Ingredients are:

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups any fruit pulp
- 1 cup heavy cream or evaporated milk (thoroughly chilled)
- 1/2 teaspoon gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water

Mix the sugar and fruit pulp, add the gelatin dissolved in water. Let stand until sugar is dissolved, then chill. When cold, fold in whipped cream, pour into tray and freeze.

Orange sherbert is a favorite dessert of many. This recipe calls for:

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups orange juice
- 1 cup evaporated milk (chilled)
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Add sugar to orange juice and stir thoroughly. Place in refrigerator to chill and to finish dissolving sugar. When dissolved, whip milk until very stiff. Fold in lemon juice, then orange-sugar mixture. Pour at once into cold freezing trays. Makes three pints.

New Recipes Make Burbot a Tasty Dish

Burbot — another of Michigan's seldom used fish — can be made into appetizing meals according to a recent folder prepared jointly by the agricultural experiment station of Michigan State college and the Michigan department of conservation.

More common names for the burbot are lawyer or ling. It has not been generally utilized in the Great Lakes region because of its somewhat unattractive appearance and the fact that it does not withstand long distance shipping unless dressed or filleted and promptly iced or frozen for shipment as it comes from the lake.

It provides a high-protein food that is low in fats and greatly resembles the New England codfish in that it is surprisingly free from bones.

The new folder — experiment station folder 6 — gives tested recipes for pan fried, oven cooked, broiled, and sandwich and salad mixtures using burbot. They were tested by the foods and nutrition section of the Michigan State college experiment station.

The folder may be obtained from county extension offices, from the Bulletin Office, Department of Public Relations, Michigan State College, East Lansing, or from the Michigan Department of Conservation, Lansing.

An Open Letter To the Infantile Paralysis Committee

I have made several offers to give my services without charge in the treatment of polio victims without success. It appears that my being a Chiropractor bars me from contact with sufferers of this dreadful disease, even though we have a very effective method of combating this disease.

Here is how a Chiropractor would go about administering to a case of acute polio:

In the first few days after the first spasm the patient is maintained in a horizontal position in a comfortable well-ventilated room. His paralyzed parts are kept at an even, warm temperature to aid circulation, since the areas subjected to paralysis have poor circulation of both blood and lymph and become cold and clammy.

The average case is given spinal adjustments four times daily and deep tissue manipulation over the affected areas, especially the groin or along the lymphatic vessels.

If paralysis occurs in the lower extremities, adjustments are indicated for subluxations (displacements of the sacroiliac and lumbar vertebrae). If the upper extremities are affected then specific adjustments are made in corresponding spinal areas.

Water is given the patient until his temperature has subsided, then only fruit juices until the doctor is satisfied with the progress made. This is followed by a light diet which is increased in accordance with recovery.

Careful attention is given to elimination as the bowels and kidneys are usually affected to some extent and sometimes totally paralyzed.

Adjusting of the spine is paramount in polio, as in other diseases.

I am willing to take and handle any case of polio without charge where the parents are unable to pay for this service.

VETERAN NEWS

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

The Armed Forces Leave act of 1946 has been passed by the congress and signed by the President.

It now appears definite that all application blanks will be distributed through local post offices and that, when completely filled out, will be mailed to the finance officers at the stations where discharge was effected (separation centers, for the most part). Payment in cash and/or bonds will be sent the veteran from the same place.

The original discharge certificate will undoubtedly be required as an attachment to the application form. It is inevitable that some will be lost. Veterans should send them by registered mail.

If the veteran does not know how much unused furlough time he should be paid for, he may leave this space blank and the finance officer will compute it for him.

Sums under \$50 will be paid in cash. Larger sums will be paid in \$25 bonds or multiples thereof, with odd balances in cash. (A veteran having \$136 due him would receive five \$25 bonds and \$11 in cash). Bonds will be dated 30 days after date of discharge; thus the longer a veteran has been out of service, the sooner he can cash in his bonds.

Bonds are non-transferable and non-negotiable, except as regards G.I. insurance. They may be used to pay premiums or conversion costs. Furlough time accumulates at the rate of 2 1/2 days per month for all former enlisted personnel starting from 8 September 1939. Number of days of furlough actually taken (not to exceed 120 days) should be de-

ducted and the balance multiplied by the daily pay rate (base pay plus longevity pay). To this should be added 70c per day for subsistence and, in the case of the top three enlisted grades (Mr. Sgt., Tech. Sgt., and Staff Sgt. in the army and CPO, PO 1st class and PO 2nd class in navy) an additional \$1.25 per day should be added for allowance in lieu of quarters.

Veterans are urged to consult with local veteran's counselors who will be possessed with full and complete information currently and will assist veterans in filing claims for terminal leave pay.

Unemployment Insurance Increases Its Subscribers

As late as 1934, there were less than one hundred thousand workers in the United States covered by any form of unemployment insurance. These workers were covered mostly by voluntary agreements sponsored by international unions and local unions.

Today, through the Michigan Unemployment Compensation act, close to two million workers in Michigan alone, are covered and guaranteed protection against lay-offs.

The industries of Michigan in times of peace are particularly seasonal in operation and employment. The production of automobiles, the lumbering industry, resort business, sugar beet farming, all have peak seasons of heavy employment and corresponding valleys of low employment.

For this reason, unemployment compensation in Michigan is vital to economic stabilization. If you work in one of these industries and reach the seasonal lay-off period, you should go immediately to your nearest MUC office and register for unemployment benefits.

Foster Parents Aid Children War Victims

For the past two years, Mrs. Henry Bourne Joy, 290 Lakeshore road, Grosse Pointe Farms, has been one of the staunchest friends of children overseas through the Foster Parents' Plan for War Children. Mrs. Joy cared for three children, in Europe through this plan — a British boy, Walter Tower, 12; a British girl, Freda Peacock, 10; and a Dutch girl living in England, Rietje Roselle, age 10.

The plan operates 56 children's projects in France, England, Malta, Belgium, Italy and Holland, caring for children of 14 nationalities.

On the receipt of an application by the Foster Parents' Plan, the foster parent receives as soon as possible, a photograph and a brief history of the child and pays \$15 per month for the support of the child.

More than forty-four thousand children of all nationalities have been helped by the Foster Parents' Plan since its inception nine years ago.

Foster parents include Mrs. James Couzens, Kate Smith, Dr. John Haynes Holmes, Allan Jones, Tallulah Bankhead, Cornelia Otis Skinner, Fred Allen, Jack Benny, Mark Van Doren and Clifton Fadiman.

Navy Seeking Nurses in Recruiting Drive

Nurses meeting the necessary qualifications will be commissioned as ensigns, nurse corps, U. S. Navy, the navy department has announced. An authorization has been made for the appointment of 1,005 qualified applicants.

To be qualified for appointment, the applicant must be a graduate of a school of nursing, a citizen of the United States, not less than 22 nor more than 30 years of age, a registered nurse, be a high school graduate with at least 15 units of credit, and establish mental, moral and professional fitness as well as an aptitude for the naval service.

Applications are being accepted at the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 321 South Plymouth Ct., Chicago 4, Ill.

Editor's Note: The following unsigned letter was received by The Review and we feel that it is self explanatory.

Dear Sir:

The phrase, "The mail must go through," is no doubt familiar to millions of Americans but no doubt is in the minds of many of the residents of Grosse Pointe Woods who are still served by the rural and primitive method of Rural Free Delivery, which is none too good at its best.

Realizing the shortage of manpower we have uncomplainingly accepted this type of service and will continue to do so until door-to-door service can be made available.

In the meantime, however, we have checked with the postal authorities and find that the mail carrier is not required to leave mail unless he can conveniently and with no trouble on his part pull up in front of your mail box, otherwise you receive your mail at a later date when parking space is available, irrespective of whether or not the mail is of an important nature.

In addition the mail carrier, according to rules may not pick up any mail unless he has some to deliver. In view of the fact that our nearest mail box is the best part of a mile away, how are we to post our mail if it does not suit government regulations to pick it up?

It is apparent that we are getting a special type of mail service, not as complete as other parts of the village where they have door to door deliveries and yet not as good as the rural resident on Rural Free Delivery who gets his mail irrespective as to whether someone is parked in front of his mail box or not.

Navy Reopens Wave Enlistments

Sixteen hundred former enlisted personnel in the Women's Reserve, USNR, may re-enlist provided they hold certain ratings upon their discharge.

The ratings in which such re-enlistments can be made are:

Seamen, telegraphers, parachute riggers, aerographers' mates, aviation machinist's mates (instrument), aviation storekeepers, hospital ap-

prentices, pharmacists' mates; specialists, teachers (link trainer instructors and link celestial navigation trainers); specialists, transport airmen; and specialists, control tower operators.

Re-enlistment will be made in the rating and pay grade held at discharge. As the required number of Waves in each rating is secured that particular rating will be closed

to re-enlistment. Waves who served during the war on active duty and who have been honorably discharged are eligible for re-enlistment if they are under 35 years, not married to a naval officer, have no children under 18 years of age, and meet certain physical standards.

Re-enlistments are being accepted at the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 321 S. Plymouth Ct., Chicago 4, Ill.

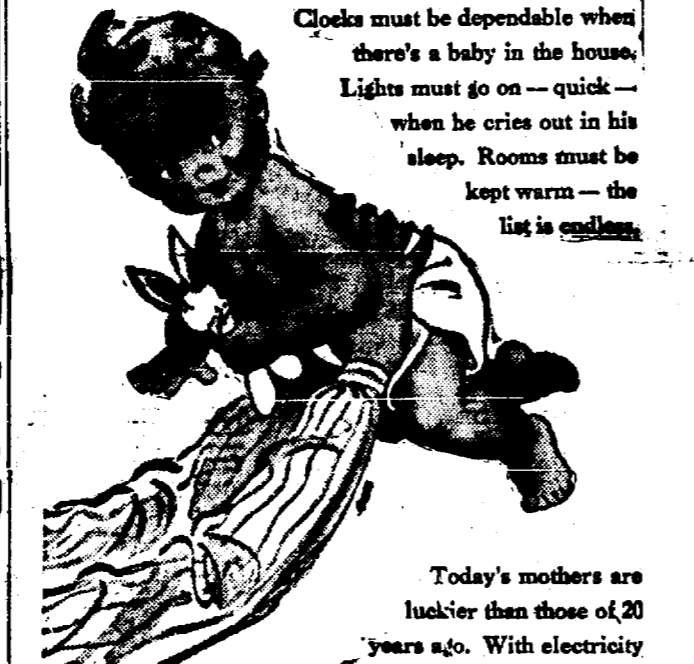

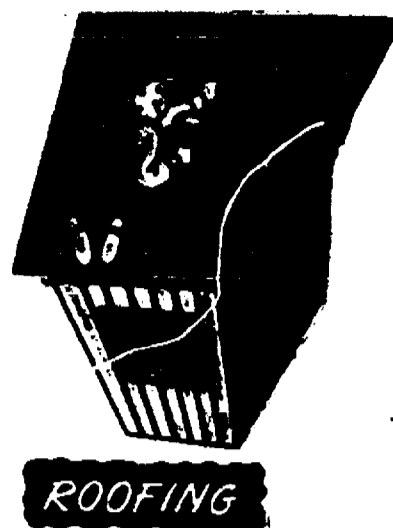

AAF Announces Fields Open for Rated Re-Enlistees

Former Army Air Forces officer-specialists may request recall to active duty, the Army Air Forces Military Personnel Division said today, since demobilization has progressed so far that the Army Air Forces does not have sufficient volunteers to fill its requirements in certain specialized and technical fields.

The announcement said new shortages had arisen in the following military occupational specialties: Chaplain, aviation ordnance officer, passenger and freight transportation officer, weather officer pilot, sanitary engineer, cryptographic security officer, military intelligence officer, and intelligence staff officers.

The Army Air Forces has previously announced vacancies in the following general fields: engineering, medical, finance, legal, weather, communications, radar, statistical control, ordnance, armament, aircraft warning, foods service, photo mapping and interpretation, automotive maintenance and repair, and chemical.

To be accepted former officers must have an efficiency index of 40.0 (excellent) and higher, be physically qualified for overseas duty, and be within these age limits: Lieutenants and captains, 38 years or less; major, 40 or less; lieutenant colonel, 43 or less; and colonel, 46 or less.

Accepted applicants will be recalled in a grade not higher than that in which the officer served immediately prior to processing for relief from active duty. Reserve and National Guard officers desiring active duty may obtain WD AGO Form 160 (Application for Extended Active Duty) from any Army or Army Air Forces Installation, and Army Recruiting Office, or from The Adjutant General, War Department, Washington 25, D.C.

In the event an officer on inactive status, desiring active duty, does not have a Reserve or National Guard commission, he may apply for active duty provided he has applied for a Reserve commission. Qualified applicants may be recalled pending action on appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps, when tendered, will be cause for relief from active duty. WD AGO Form 170-1 is the application form for appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps and may be obtained in the same manner as that stated for application for extended active duty forms.

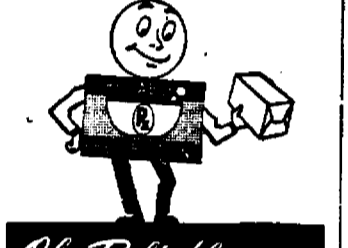

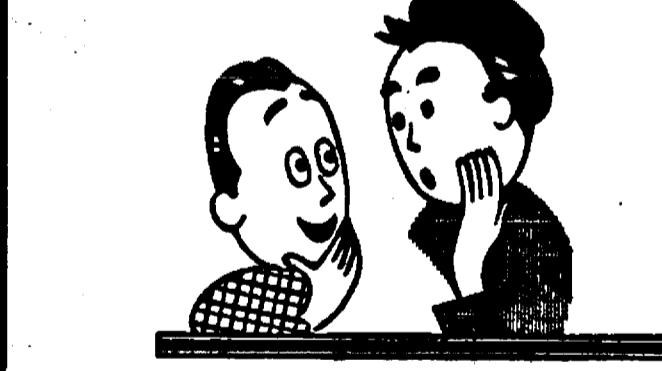

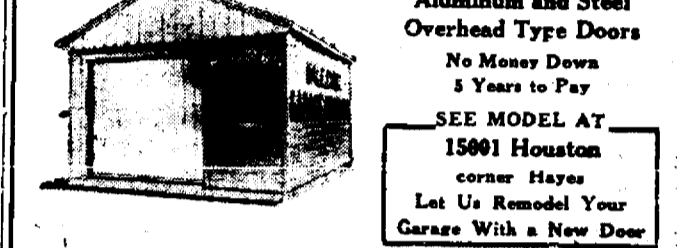
