MUCC Report

The Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission paid \$701,908 less in unemployment benefits and readjustment allowances during the week ending August 17 than during the preceding week, Eugene T. Dorner, Executive Director of the Commission, announced today.

The number of unemployed receiving benefits dropped 5,872 during the week and all but 500 of this decrease was in the Detroit metropolitan area.

The Commission paid 59,196 industrial claimants a total of \$1,274,532 from the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund. A total of 49,122 World War II veterans received \$1,274,805 in readjustment allowances under the G.I. Bill of Rights, bringing the total paid during the week to Michigan's unemployed to \$2,549,337.

Figures show a sharp drop in initial claims, with 2,630 less people filing than during the preceding week. The total of initial claims number 5,793, of which number, 2,466 claims were filed by women.

In the Detroit metropolitan area, the Commission paid a total of \$1,477,938 to 66,990 claimants. Of those filing claims, 27,787 were veterans and 24,188 were women.

The Veterans Administration now lists 15,884,000 veterans on its rolls. Of this total, 11,904,000 saw service in World War II.

Parcel Insurance At Low Rates

Patrons of the Post Office are not taking advantage of the extremely low insurance rates available through postal insurance on packages in the domestic mails, Postmaster Huston said today.

The 3 cent minimum fee will insure a parcel up to five dollars. Fees for higher values are correspondingly low. A parcel may be insured up to \$200.00 for a fee of 25 cents. A return receipt from the addressee may be obtained if requested at the time of mailing and upon the payment of a 4 cent fee.

It is to the advantage of patrons to insure all parcels. If damaged in transit indemnity will be paid or if a parcel is lost it can be more easily traced by means of the insurance number.

Most articles when properly packed are insurable.

With the existing low fees, everyone should protect their parcels with postal insurance.

VETERANS NEWS

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

Available to Veterans
Any veteran, except those discharged or dismissed by a general court-martial may request a review of discharge or dismissal at any time within 15 years after separation by applying to special boards of review set up by the separate branches of the services to take care of such cases.

A veteran who wants his discharge status revised or modified to a more favorable one should secure necessary application forms by writing directly to the review board of his branch of service, fill them in, and return them. Hearings are held in Washington and testimony of the petitioner and his witnesses may be presented in person or by affidavits. The veteran is not required to appear though he may present his case in person with or without counsel or by counsel alone. Addresses of the discharge review boards of the services are:

ARMY—The Secretary of War's Discharge Review Board, The Adjutant General's Office, War Department, Washington 25, D. C.

NAVY AND MARINE CORPS—The Secretary of the Navy Department, Washington 25, D. C., attention: Board of Review, Discharges and Dismissals

COAST GUARD—Board of Review, Discharge and Dismissals, U. S. Coast Guard Headquarters, 1306 E Street N. W., Washington 25 D. C.

It should be noted that veterans who have clerical errors only on their certificates may have these corrected by writing to the Discharge Section of the service concerned. In this case, consultation to the board is not necessary.

Any veterans' counselor or service officer will assist a veteran in filing a request for review of discharge.

Terminal Leave Pay
All local counselors at community counseling centers have applications for unused leave pay and will assist veterans in filing a claim for settlement.

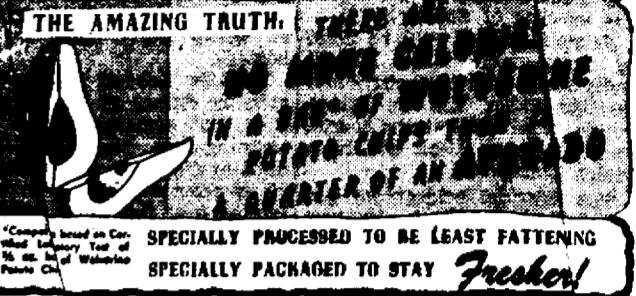

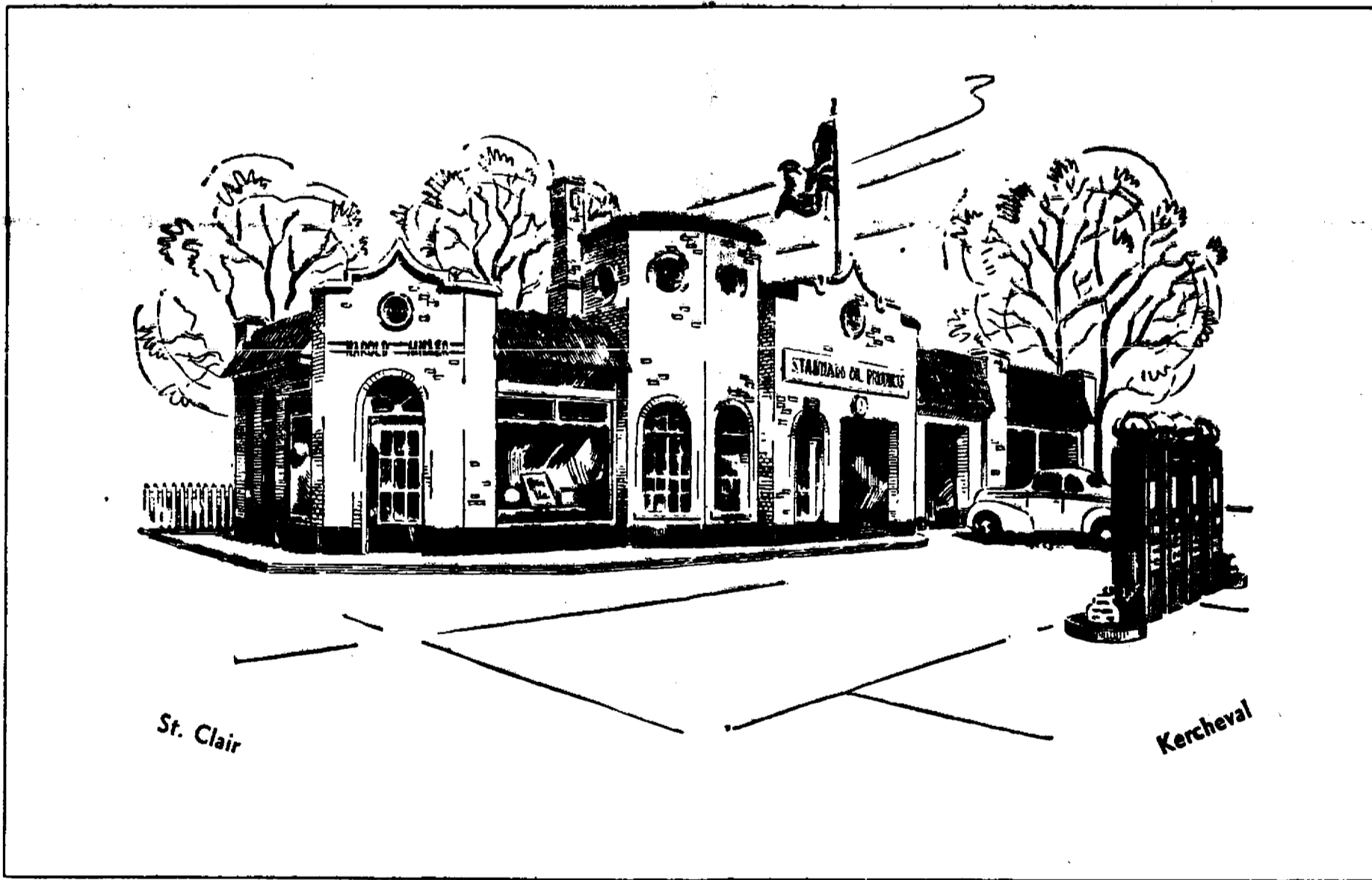

Causes of Deaths In Michigan

What are the principal causes of death in Michigan?

In studying the reports of the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County finds that accidents kill the most people in the one to 25 age group. Tuberculosis is the leading killer of Michigan people aged 25 to 35, while beyond 35 heart diseases account for a majority of the deaths.

By age groups, the 1945 figures for the leading causes of death are:

- Age 1-4: Accidents 209; pneumonia 106; congenital diseases 67; tuberculosis 46
- Age 5-14: Accidents 287; pneumonia 34; tuberculosis 31; rheumatic diseases 28
- Age 15-24: Accidents 359; tuberculosis 250; heart diseases 185; cancer 58
- Age 25-34: Tuberculosis 339; accidents 301; heart diseases 207; cancer 149
- Age 35-44: Heart diseases 708; cancer 497; tuberculosis 367; accidents 287
- Age 45-54: Heart diseases 2063; cancer 1123; apoplexy 497; accidents 327
- Age 55-64: Heart diseases 3677; cancer 1896; apoplexy 908; nephritis 454
- Age 65-74: Heart diseases 4764; cancer 1897; apoplexy 1185; nephritis 688
- Age 75-84: Heart diseases 5477; apoplexy 1523; cancer 1187; nephritis 688
- Age 85 and Over: Heart diseases 1484; apoplexy 485; arterio-sclerosis 299; cancer 281

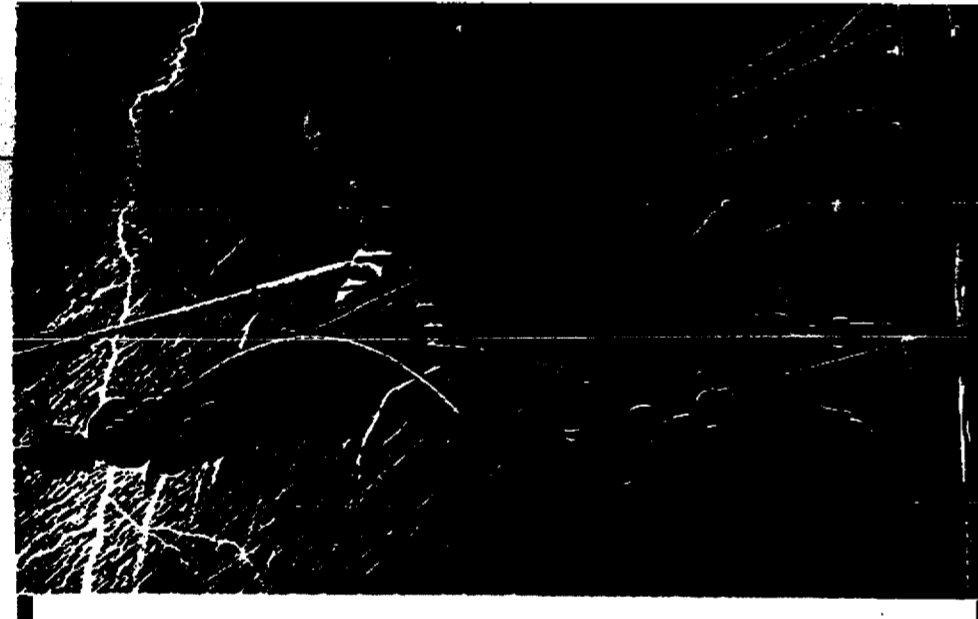

Notes from a traveler's journal:
 What is going to become of Captain Joe Beach's delightful, and river boat excursion to the leisurely "Toonerville Trolley" Tahquamenon Falls in Luce County, Upper Peninsula?

The state conservation department has appropriated \$50,000 to build an improved highway to the upper and lower Tahquamenon Falls—two of the scenic attractions of Michigan's famed north country.

The road will start at Paradise on Whitefish Bay, Lake Superior. It will proceed fourteen miles west to the lower falls and thence several miles more to within a quarter mile of the upper falls. To safeguard the

falls from the noise of motor traffic, the state will require travelers to park their cars and to walk over a trail to the upper falls. There the visitors will view the 200-foot wide waterfall.

As we traveled on Captain Beach's excursion early in August the question arose of what would happen to this unusual day's journey to the falls. The average American seems inclined to go places as quickly as possible. Leisure is a luxury in a two-week vacation. Somehow, we hope travelers will not overlook Joe's opportunity for a day of relaxation. On our trip we saw numerous deer, many ducks, and one bear.

Two so-called "night club"

mark the town of Dollarville, a mile and a half south of Newberry.

In company with a group of newspaper people we visited one of these hot spots. A piano player was banging away. A few minutes later, when the word was relayed of the Monday night "rush," a drummer arrived to reinforce him.

It seemed to be a far cry from the pioneer times when Robert Dollar was a "cookee" in a nearby logging camp and later rose to become the president of the Dollarville Lumber Company with vast mill and timber holdings. Dollar invested his logging profits in a steamship line. Yes, the Dollar Line of today was started on dollars earned by the ex-cookee of the Upper Peninsula many years ago.

Life is in constant transition, and Newberry is looking for a better postwar world.

Lumbering has been going on in Luce County since the Civil War. You begin to wonder how much longer it can continue.

Selective cutting was forgotten in the war-time rush to get out the lumber. From what the lumberman says we doubt if selective cutting ever will be adopted voluntarily by the lumber industry. There is always a competitor and a competitor's price. Eventually state control must come, perhaps on a co-operative basis.

A one-time big industry in Newberry, the county seat of Luce County and home of the Newberry State Hospital, was the Newberry Lumber and Chemical company, founded in 1882 as a charcoal kiln and iron-furnace venture. Thousands of cords of hardwoods have been converted into charcoal for use in smelting iron ore.

After a brief war-time revival, the plants are idle. New industries have taken their place, offering better wages for workers. Newberry is better off.

True life story from Newberry: Every morning and afternoon, when the weather permits, a woman patient of the Newberry State Hospital goes to the gate near the state highway and begins peering down the road, expectantly awaiting the arrival of her husband. She has been doing this now for several years. Her husband abandoned her, and the shock unbalanced her mind. Each day she returns and says: "He will come tomorrow." But tomorrow never comes.

Canadian geese are nesting at the Cusina state game refuge at Seney. Years ago, in the 1880's and 1890's, Seney had the reputation of being the toughest spot in the Upper Peninsula. Gambling, fighting, drinking and prostitution were too commonplace to merit newspaper attention. A woman reporter for a New York metropolitan newspaper concocted a wild yarn about strangers being "shanghaied" on the frontier and forced into chained peonage at the Seney Lumber camps. She called it "Ram's Pasture." The yarn became an overnight national sensation. . . . One of the section hands on the railroad crew at Seney played a part in shaping our nation's history. Leon Czolgosz became the assassin of President William McKinley in the days of "manifest destiny."



HOME FOLKS GREET SIGLER

HASTINGS — Kim Sigler, Republican gubernatorial candidate, paid a visit to his home town of Hastings to dedicate that city's new airport. With him and sharing the role of guests of honor were Lieutenant Commander, Hugh Kelly, Hastings' Marine Corps flying hero, Senator Homer Ferguson, and Frederick M. Alger, Jr., candidate for secretary of state.

The airport was a gift to the city from Mr. A. Johnson, a leading Hastings manufacturer. Barry county turned out en masse with an estimate 10,000 people taking part in the ceremonies.

Boatbuilders Turn To Making Houses

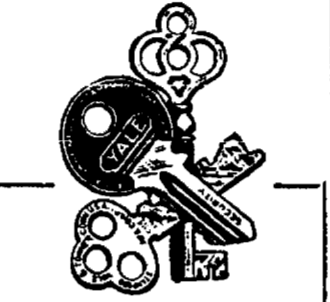

Management Class To be Held Here

Nearly one hundred veterans have completed special training offered by the University of Michigan to prepare them to organize and manage small businesses of their own. Prof. Charles L. Jamison, of the School of Business Administration, he revealed.

A four-month course in business management will be repeated in Detroit this fall, beginning Oct. 1, by the University Extension Service. This course is offered under the G. I. Bill and gives intensive training in accounting, management, merchandising and public relations.

Emphasis is placed upon retail and service enterprises, since about 60 per cent of the veterans organizing their own businesses are in these fields, Prof. Jamison explained.

The Michigan Plan, as the short course is called, was started on the University campus in Ann Arbor last November, and 67 men completed the course here. In the Spring, classes were moved to Detroit because of crowded housing conditions at the University, and a second group of veterans completed the course there in mid-August.

Many of the veterans who finished the first course are already established in their own businesses, though others have postponed going into business for themselves because of shortages of materials and supplies.

Women Speak—

By a vote of five to one, delegates to the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs convention in Cleveland last week went on record that "labor and management should be equally responsible under the law." The resolution, adopted by a vote of 402 to 77, asserted that both labor and management should be free from coercion, and "equally responsible for living up to their agreements arrived at through collective bargaining."

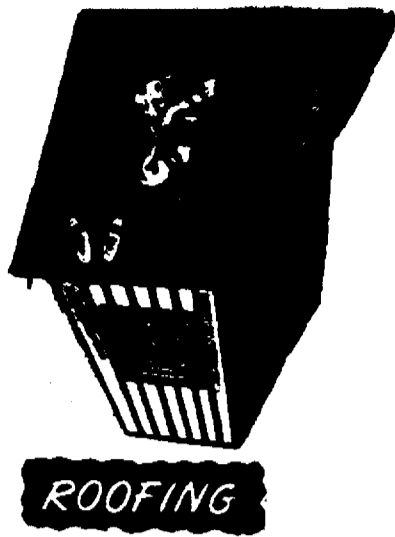
