Leaf Burning Prohibited by Park Ordinance

Women Charged With Passing Bad Checks Detained by Detroit Police

Two women charged with passing bad checks were apprehended this week and are now being detained by the Detroit Police Department awaiting their prosecution.

On April 20 of last year Anne Marie Thrasher purchased flowers at the Pasaik Florist, 73 Kercheval and gave a check drawn on the Wabek State Bank, payable to Mary Brooke Hogan in payment. The check for \$13.03 was signed by Mary Brooke Hogan and an investigation shows that Anne Marie Thrasher and Mary Brooke Hogan were one and the same.

On the same day a check given to Peter Pan Shop, 7 Kercheval, for \$73.90 drawn on the same bank and payable to cash was signed by Mrs. William Hogan. Another at the same time of the purchase and drawn on the Wabek State Bank for \$37.49, payable to cash and signed by Mary Brooke Hogan was also passed.

It is now revealed that Mary Brooke Hogan, Mrs. William Hagan and Anne Marie Thrasher are the same. Miss Thrasher is in the Wayne County jail and complaints have been filed on recommendation of the prosecutor's office.

Another woman being detained on the same charge is Mrs. Irene H. Lutz, 10410 E. Jefferson who passed a bad check amounting to \$30 at the "Anthony" shop, 15 Kercheval, drawn on the First National Bank of Seattle, Washington. The check made payable to cash was returned when the account couldn't be located.

A complaint has been filed with the prosecutor's office and a complaint will be used as a supplementary report by the bad check detail of the Detroit Police Department to assist in the prosecution of Mrs. Lutz on the same charge.

Complaint Filed

A complaint received in letter form from Mrs. A. G. Williams, 810 Lincoln road was read by the City mayor at the regular council meeting this Monday. Mrs. Williams notified the council of the wells in her home being cracked as a result of the use of a two ton ball for breaking old pavement prior to repaving Lincoln road.

The matter will be referred to the contractor who in turn will refer it to the insurance company for investigation.

Board Advertises For Vernier-Mack Building Bids

At a special meeting of the Board of Education on Monday, September 16, the Secretary was authorized to advertise for bids on the proposed 18-room section of the Vernier-Mack elementary-junior high school building. The bids will be opened on October 10 and will be in a lump sum firm bid. Some consideration was given to the possibility of bids on a cost plus fixed fee basis but according to the best legal advice obtainable, public schools cannot obtain bids on this basis, except in first class school districts, such as Detroit, Grand Rapids and Flint.

Private Entrances To Park Refused By City Council

The City council by unanimous vote decided against providing private entrances to residents whose property border the City residential park.

Mr. Matherson, property owner on Lakeland avenue appeared at the meeting, but councilmen did not feel the reasons presented for the private entrance justified their installation.

The action taken is believed

to build this section on August 14, 1946. Since that time the architects have been busy in completing the revision of plans of specifications for this 18-room section.

The plans provide for the building to be located on that portion of the school site between Sunningdale and the long row of willow trees that dissect the 16-acre site and approximately 8 acres of land between the willows and Sunningdale will be completely graded and properly surfaced for playground. This playground will be of adequate size to furnish the school use of necessary playground facilities and the community with additional recreational space upon which all types of games can be played, including hard baseball. Provisions have been for the construction of a six foot fence. Old gates will be properly secured and no new gates will be installed.

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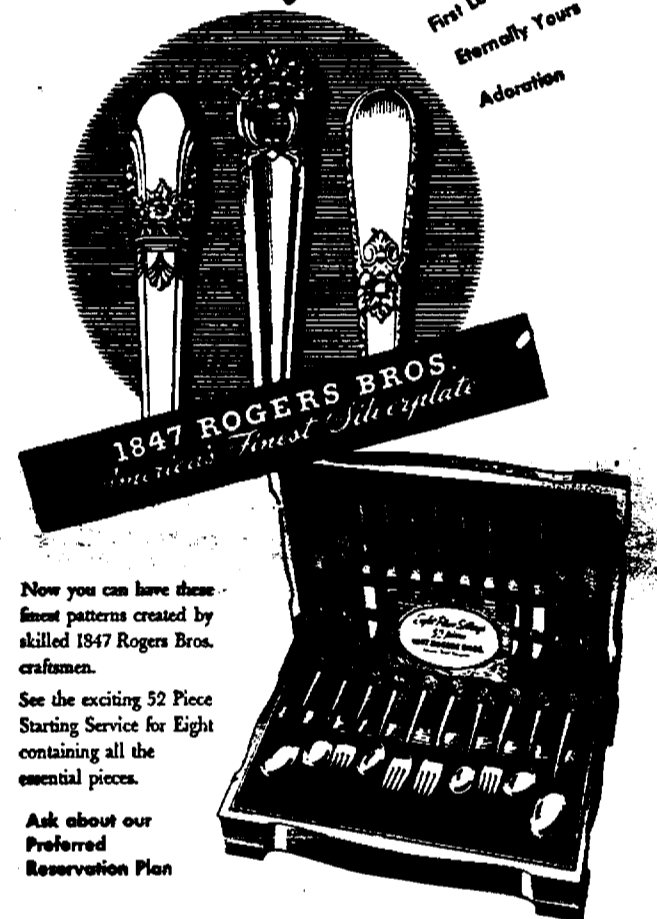

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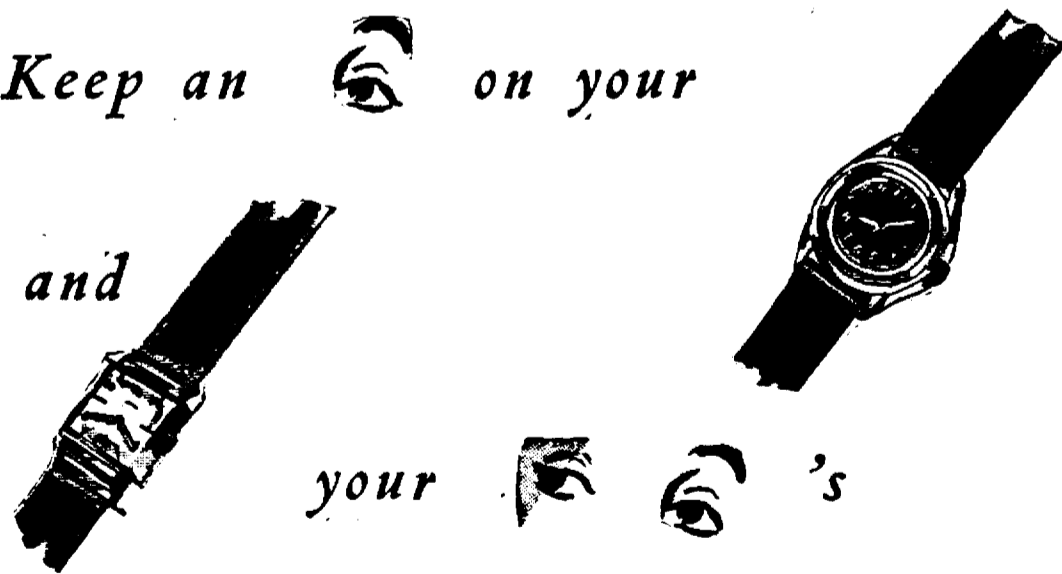
