MANSION GIVEN TO POINTE

Beautiful Home Given For Pointe Library

Sales Donates \$100,000 Home for Library

Murray W. Sales has made a gift of his property on the corner of Jefferson and Lincoln avenues, Grosse Pointe City to the Grosse Pointe School District.

This large residence valued at more than \$100,000, has been carefully studied in structure and location by the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools and the Director of Libraries and is found to be admirably constructed and easily adaptable to public library usage.

Farms OKs \$350,000 Sewer Job

A sewer relief program to cost \$350,000 will be commenced shortly in Grosse Pointe Farms the village council decided at a special meeting Monday night.

The Farms council also will seek to enlist the co-operation of the City of Grosse Pointe, Grosse Pointe Park and the city of Detroit in an effort to provide adequate means to dispose of the combined storm water from the communities.

FURTHER REPORT
After the excessive storms of last summer during which many basements in the Farms were flooded, a recommendation was made by Murray M. Smith, Village Engineer, to the Village Council that the engineering firm of Hubbell Roth and Clark be employed to study and report on the overall drainage problem of the village with particular emphasis on the following items:

- 1—Additional pumping capacity Kerby Road Pumping Station.
- 2—Design to correct back pressure and surges at Pumping Station.
- 3—Redesign of storm water overflows to Lake St. Clair.
- 4—Design of storm water relief sewers for Stephens, Cloverly, Touraine, Vendome, Kerby, Cambridge, Muskoka and Moross Road areas to Lake St. Clair.
- 5—Design of combined sewer relief for the Fisher, McKinley and McMillan areas to Chalfonte.

The Council approved the recommendation and H. R. & C. have been making a careful study of these problems for the past four or five months. Their report was submitted to the Council in a special meeting Monday and it was recommended that immediate steps be taken to carry out the entire program as the various parts are all necessary and in part at least interdependent.

OK'D BY STATE BOARD
This report contained much supporting data including approval in principle by the State Board of Health of the proposed relief sewer program. In addition to the original recommendations of the Village Engineer the report also provided a relief plan for the Moran, Merriweather and Mt. Vernon Avenue area to Chalfonte.

The Engineers assured the Council that the proposed program would provide adequate drainage and pumping facilities within the Village but that there is also a problem which requires co-operative action by the Farms, Grosse Pointe City, Grosse Pointe Park and the City of Detroit for the disposal of the combined storm water from those communities.

A preliminary estimate indicates a cost of about \$350,000. A committee consisting of Messrs. Connolly and Watkins with the village attorney was appointed by the council to study the report further and recommend at the next regular meeting a method of financing the cost.

Boy Scouts Are Worthy Of Support

Support is assured throughout the Grosse Pointe area of the drive to raise funds for increasing year-round camping facilities for Boy Scouts of the Detroit metropolitan area which starts this week under the auspices of more than 400 Grosse Pointe and Detroit business leaders.

Prentiss M. Brown, president of the Detroit Area Scout Council, and Edwin A. Tomlinson, chairman of the Camp Expansion campaign, announced that the goals, as accepted by the various District Chairmen, total \$100,000. Proceeds will be used to develop the Volunteer Leaders' Training Center and to increase the number of Troop camp sites at the Charles Howell Scout Reservation near Brighton, Michigan.

During 1946, Scouts of the Detroit Area enjoyed a total of 119,210 Scout days in camp. Mr. Tomlinson pointed out, however, that only 25 per cent of this camping was done on Scout property due to lack of facilities. The current financial drive aims at expanding these Scout Reservation sites by one-fourth, in addition to increasing the Training program for volunteer adult leaders.

The Brighton camp project, started in 1937 and now about half completed, is expected to gain additional equipment and buildings through the drive to provide 5,000 to 10,000 more ways of outdoor camping during 1947.

Mr. Brown declared that of the 165,000 boys, ages 9 to 19, who live in the Detroit area, a survey shows 123,000 of them want to become Scouts. Civic leaders have thrown their support behind the drive to help make greater opportunities for membership possible.

Graduating Students Get Honor Awards

Their names will be inscribed on a trophy provided by the Mother's Club of the high school.





Grosse Pointe Women were among those elected officers of the Visiting Nurse Association for 1947 at the annual meeting. Officers elected are Mrs. Gilbert B. Pingree, president; Mrs. Edward S. Wellock, first vice-president; Mrs. James Q. Goudie and Mrs. Howard H. Robinson, second vice presidents; Mrs. Guy C. Smith, secretary; Mrs. George C. Edwards, assistant secretary; Mrs. James K. Watkins, treasurer; Miss Katharine M. Kay, assistant treasurer.

A total of 44,532 persons in the Metropolitan Detroit area benefited during 1946 by the work of the Visiting Nurse Association, according to statistics made known at this Red Feather agency's annual meeting Thursday in the Alger Center.

In the report, Emile G. Sargent, executive director of the Visiting Nurse Association, pointed out that family nursing needs are changing. A comparative study of 1946 with 1936 shows that families no longer have as much illness from acute infections.

Communicable disease cases accounted for 21 per cent of the Visiting Nurses 1946 cases as compared with 43 per cent of the 1936 cases. Number of chronic cases increased from 4.3 per cent in 1936 to 18 per cent last year. Maternity cases increased a little over 4 per cent during the ten year period. Care of newborn babies, health supervision and care of injuries increased only slightly. Number of home deliveries decreased 24 per cent.

The Visiting Nurse Association is a Red Feather service, providing nursing care in the home on an hourly basis. A fee or a partial fee is charged for the service according to the patient's ability to pay. Often no charge is made. The agency's operating deficit is provided by funds raised in the annual Community Chest Red Feather Campaign.
