Two girls returned from the funeral services of a close friend Wednesday afternoon, bewildered and unable to accept the tragedy that had befallen them.  
The deceased was, Mary K. Snyder, 22, 3144 Nottingham, who was killed in an automobile accident from which her two friends Patricia Peterson, 21, 4829 Bishop and Mary Richardson, 20, 755 Lincoln escaped unharmed.  
The three girls were riding in a car driven by Robert Kimball Simonds, 19, 242 Lewiston, when it was struck by a car driven by Henry John Keane, 27, 1007 Harvard, at Lake Shore and McKinley in Grosse Pointe Farms early Sunday morning.  
Both drivers were questioned by the Prosecuting Attorney's office but were released pending further investigation.

## Manslaughter Charge Faced By Petzel

According to reports received from Lincoln Park Police, Albert H. Petzel, 28, 1035 Wayburn, awoke from a drunken escapade to find himself a police prisoner, responsible for a man's death, facing a charge of manslaughter.  
Chief of Police F. M. Crichton of Lincoln Park, placed a drunken charge against Petzel after his sedan hit another car in a head-on collision at Dix and Council, Lincoln Park, killing Harry Gordon, 38, 546 N. Elizabeth Dearborn, late Saturday.  
The car in which Gordon was killed was driven by Curtis J. Hagen, 36, 549 N. Elizabeth.  
Petzel suffered a fractured jaw and was taken to Receiving Hospital in Detroit where he is held. Others injured were, Donald Helme, 23, 1152 Coplin, and Estelle Broughton, 33, 111 Drexel Blvd. Both were riding with Petzel and suffered lacerations of face and legs. They were taken to Wyandotte General Hospital.  
Chief Crichton said that the accident was caused by Petzel's driving on the wrong side of the highway.  
The police chief reported that Miss Broughton admitted being completely intoxicated, and that her companions had been drinking for hours.

## Farms Project to Voters

The Grosse Pointe Farms 350,000 sewer relief proposal moved another towards becoming an actuality when the Village council voted at a special meeting Tuesday morning to put the plan before the voters in the March 10 election.  
The voting on this proposal will be restricted to those who own property in Village of Grosse Pointe Farms assessed for taxes or the husband or wives of such persons.  
The program, which was originated at a Village Council meeting, Feb. 3, calls for the borrowing the sum of \$350,000, and issuing the bonds of the Village for the installation and construction of:  
1—Additional structures and improvements at the Kerby road pumping station.  
2—Design to correct back-pressure and surges at Pumping Station.  
3—Redesign of storm water overflows to Lake St. Clair.  
4—Designs of storm water relief sewers for Stephens, Cloverly, Touraine, Vendome, Kerby, Cambridge, Muskoka and Moross road areas to Lake St. Clair.  
5—Design of combined sewers relief for the Fisher, McKinley and McMullan areas to Chalfronte.  
Husling, Roth and Clark, consulting engineers, have assured the Council that the proposed program would provide adequate drainage and pumping facilities within the Village.

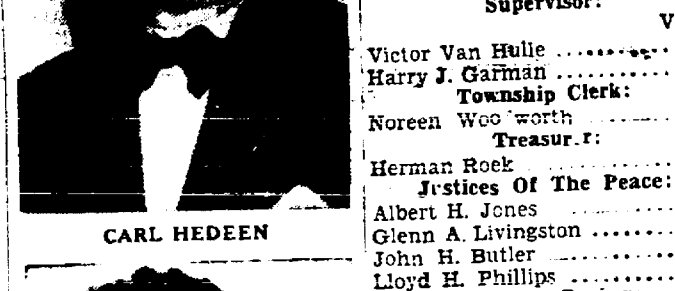
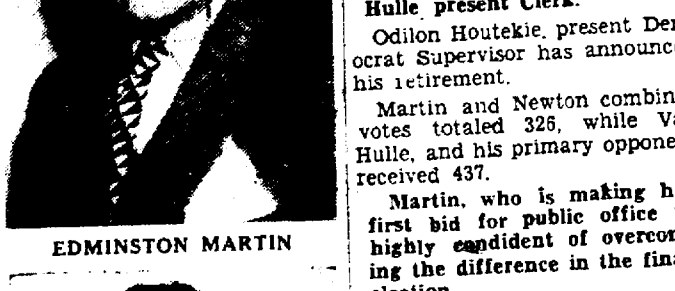

Martin, who is making his first bid for public office is highly confident of overcoming the difference in the final election.  
Another encouraging note in the Republican drive is the showing of Mrs. Laurel Boyer who pulled 296 votes and for Clerk and Carl Hedeen who received the Treasure nominee with 297 votes.

A columnist's item which appeared in the Detroit News stating that gambling flourished in Grosse Pointe Park was denied by Park Police.  
"As far as we know there's no gambling going on here," said Arthur E. Louwers, Chief of Police. "But if any one has information to the contrary, his first duty as a citizen is to notify the law enforcement body not tell the public."  
The item which appeared in Tony Weitzel's column in the Detroit News February 15 said: "Newest and one of the fairest gambling joints in these parts are located in the older section of Grosse Pointe complete with two top table, roulette, and a big time poker game."  
According to the police chief if any high scale gambling is going on in forementioned vicinity it must be in private homes where residents recklessly play such games of chance as bridge and crummy at a fortieth a point.

## Motor Smash-up Kills Wife Hurts Husband

The third fatal accident within two days involving Grosse Pointers occurred Monday when a car driven by Walter Gibson, 61 1071 Beaconsfield sideswiped another car and smashed into a tree at Warren and Burns, killing his wife, Mrs. Edna Gibson.  
Gibson, charged with reckless driving by Detroit police, was taken to Receiving Hospital for minor injuries.  
According to witnesses Gibson was driving at excessive speed in a 25-mile zone when he hit the side of a car driven by Gerald J. Boush, 4865 Boush.  
Detroit police are investigating the case.

Higher Education

One of the most alarming disclosures of the thinking of our time is contained in a two-volume standard text on economics in use in more than 100 universities.

Page after page contains implied or direct condemnation of private venture and private property. It is so written that a gradual and confiscatory expansion of government authority seems the only solution to all major problems.

Socialism and communism are discussed. As to how these political theories could attain supremacy, the authors state, "Opinions differ as to the method by which land and capital would be brought under the ownership of society."

At no point is the fact brought out that sweeping destruction of private ownership of property, as envisioned above, would necessarily result in abolition of the American form of government which is based on the sanctity of certain individual rights, including the right to ownership of property.

Navy Honors Pointe Hero

Lt. (jg) Lee F. Ross, USNR, of 780 Barrington rd., Grosse Pointe, Mich., son of Mrs. Elmer R. Ross has received a permanent citation for the Air Medal from Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal, for the President.

Lt. (jg) Ross, who has been released to inactive duty, received the award for his action in aerial flight in the Pacific war area.

During the war, citations were temporary, or incomplete, for security reasons.

Text of the full citation is as follows:

"For meritorious achievement in aerial flight while serving with Composite Squadron 8, attached to the USS Nehenta Bay, in action against enemy Japanese forces in the Okinawa and Sakishima areas from May 19 to June 14, 1945. Completing his fifth mission during this period, Lt. (jg) Ross contributed materially to the success of his squadron. His gallant devotion to duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Farms Plans Whale Lots of Minnows

A plan is underway to buy minnows in wholesale quantities for fishermen of Grosse Pointe Farms.

According to a report received from the Grosse Pointe Farms Recreation Association a group of fishermen would like the Board of Trustees to consider granting permission to the Farms Recreation or a responsible group of fishermen to purchase minnows in wholesale quantities to be available to all fishermen at cost.

This plan has been offered as a remedy towards curbing the increasing problem of purchasing bait minnows in small lots. Often individuals have found it necessary to resort to an excessive amount of travel to locate bait. Sometimes it has been necessary to go as far as Mt. Clemens.

Minnows in multiple lots are distributed weekly throughout this territory by a Port Huron firm.

**GUIDE CAREER**  
 Suppose for example, that Johnny Jones, a typical student, meets with a situation which he thinks needs the advice and assistance of someone outside of his own immediate family. He may turn for help to any one of the staff of guidance personnel employed in the high school, but in all probabilities he will first go to the one he knows best—his homeroom teacher. Under ordinary circumstances Johnny has but two homeroom teachers during his entire high school career, one in the junior high and one in senior high. These teachers get to know him as an individual better than anyone else. Therefore, most of the time they will be better suited for giving assistance and advice than any other person in school.

If Johnny's homeroom teacher is unable to help him, he will be referred to one of the grade counselors. Each grade has two counselors who devote almost their entire day giving students help in meeting problems. These counselors meet with every student at least once a semester and aid pupils in making out their schedules. They have a complete file on the scholastic achievements, extra-curricular activities, attendance, and future plans of each student.

If Johnny's counselor considers the matter of sufficient importance to merit the attention of the head of the guidance program, Johnny will be sent to the assistant principal who directs the counselors in their work. He is always willing to discuss any problems or plans with students and their parents.

Juroch led the scorers with 14 points followed by his teammate Barron with 10. Schoeck and Quirk led the Pointers with 4 points each.

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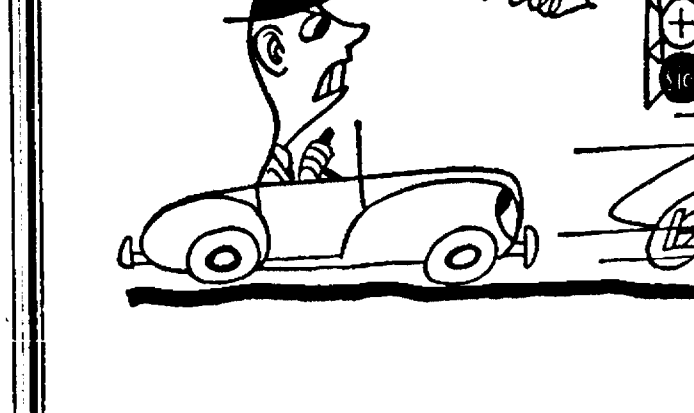

Washington's Last Birthday Was Outstanding Occasion

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was written by Nancy DeBrol, Grosse Pointe student at Marygrove College, in commemoration of George Washington's birthday, Saturday, Feb. 22.

Much has been written about the wartime birthdays of the Father of our country, but it seems quite probable that his sixty-seventh birthday was the happiest he spent in many years. He was at home in his beloved Mount Vernon, enjoying the domestic life he had given up in order to serve his country.

Congratulations and good wishes came from the General's many friends both at home and abroad. He must have been contented that February 22, 1799. He had become famous as the Commander in Chief of the victorious American Army. As the first President of the infant Nation, he had firmly established the principles and rights of a people to self government and had steered the ship of state through the first rough waters.

The occasion was a doubly happy one for Washington, however, for it was also the wedding day of his adopted daughter Nellie Custis, the belle of Mount Vernon, and Lawrence Lewis, his young secretary and nephew. It is interesting to note that the General evidently had no knowledge of the romance within his family circle until the time of betrothal had arrived. When informed of the proposed marriage, however, he did all he could to aid in the preparations.

Family tradition describes the lovely bride as wearing white satin brocaded in silver and fashioned in the new short-waisted style just in from Paris. Her veil was held in place with a cluster of flowers and the white plumes sent to General Washington from France. The General attended the wedding wearing, not his resplendent new uniform ordered by President Adams, but his beloved old buff and blue Continental uniform.

Many friends and relatives attended the celebration. The wedding supper was complete with sparkling crystal, shining silver and the dainties that were featured during that era. The General celebrated his last birthday, as he drank a toast to the happiness of the two young people he loved so dearly.

**"Lest We Forget To Remember"**

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The Grosse Pointe Review is proud to contain the complete contents of the Grosse Pointe Unit of the American Women's Voluntary Services, who closed their chapter last week after five years of civic service.

The Grosse Pointe Unit of the American Women's Voluntary Services was organized in April 1942 for the purpose of training volunteers to better become participating Americans in civic life in war and peace.

In five years of active and strenuous service to the Community three administrations have inspired volunteers to "unite and serve." Mrs. Sydney Small chaired the pioneer and war preparedness period; Mrs. Ager Sheldon and Mrs. Howard Binham were co-chairman thru the heat of a warping world; Mrs. Frederick C. Ford, the chairman thru the post war adjustment period.

Following the National AWVS Pattern, flexibly designed to meet local needs where to application of effort occurred, the first training classes were established:

- "Civilian Protection" developed instructors later absorbed by the OCD Defense Program.
- "Fire Prevention and Home Defense" — for every housewife.
- "Photography" — for war needs.
- "Nursery School" class at Merrill Palmer — for day nursery leadership.
- "Map reading" which developed map making for air raid wardens in OCD Defense Program.

This Program called for an office manager as a permanent need. A placement chairman to enlist and place volunteers which developed into the source of volunteer supply for all civic organizational needs.

A request for Recruiting brought forth: A Recruiting Unit — which added hundreds to the ranks of the WACS, WAVES, Army Air Corp and State Troops.

And likewise the need for a Uniform Chairman, who outlined and safeguarded the conduct of all AWVS workers.

An identification department, became imperative, that all war volunteers be fingerprinted in cooperation with the FBI. This expanded into fingerprinting school children for a permanent record.

A button brigade was called for that served veterans uniforms.

Financial needs warranted: The War Shop, where useful and attractive items were sold, and these profits were later supplemented by benefits and eventually the Grosse Pointe Unit became a Red Feather Community Fund Beneficiary.

Drastic economic changes produced: The Consumers Division — trained leaders taught the women of the Community their economic responsibilities of their purchasing power; and legislative demands of rationing and price ceilings so vividly depicted in the gala war savings for war needs, County Fair. The workshop for remodeling clothes and home furnishings, with practical demonstrations, became a Community rendezvous and developed the largest consumer participation of any like program in the country. Its philosophy enduring to meet post war needs.

Growing demands and expansion of volunteer needs resulted in:

- New Headquarters, a double store spread, thru the heat of World War II.
- The Office of Civilian Defense commissioned AWVS to execute all of its civilian projects in Grosse Pointe Township.
- A War Clubs chairman was appointed and organized 192 clubs for the purpose of trafficking all war effort into each and every community.

The Secretary of the U. S. Treasury commissioned AWVS to handle all War Bond and Stamp sales in the Township — this huge
