**3 Nabbed in Fight at Gas Station**

Grosse Pointe City Police believe that a robbery of the Grosse Pointe Garage Thursday night was foiled by an officer of the Home Patrol, a private organization that patrols the Grosse Pointe area.

Arrested were Henry Bradley, 21, Arles Rhoades, 22, and Joseph Teceno, 24, all of East Detroit. Police found a loaded .45 automatic in Bradley's car.

The private officer, who was armed, surprised the men when they were arguing with David Kennedy, 50, garage attendant, after the three had stopped there, supposedly for gas.

The argument developed when Kennedy accused Rhoades of breaking a window near the cash register. A fight followed, in which Teceno, who weighs over 200, attacked the attendant, a small man.

Kennedy defended himself with a battery cable, hitting Teceno on the head, cutting him severely.

The Home Patrol Officer notified police, who took Teceno to Bon Secour Hospital.

Police reported that Bradley said he had the automatic "get even with a guy in East Detroit."

The men pleaded not guilty to charges of carrying a concealed weapon when arraigned before Judge Young in Grosse Pointe City Municipal Court Monday evening.

The three were released on bond. No date was set for trial.

## Plan for Bond Issue Is Rejected by Farms

Grosse Pointe Woods voters passed the Parkside land contract and Farms voters vetoed their proposed bond issue in record turnouts at the villages' respective elections Monday.

The Parkside proposal was passed by an overwhelming vote of 926 to 460. The bond issue program, which needed a two-thirds majority, received only 563 yes votes and 433 no.

Woods citizens also voted to retain in office all its present administration, with the exception of Paul Marco, who was defeated for the third commissioner's position by Rex H. Johnston.

It further authorizes the appropriation of \$7,500 for the year of 1946 to meet the land contract obligations and the tax liabilities in connection therewith; and authorizes an annual appropriation in an amount sufficient to carry out the terms of the land contract until such a time as the bonds to finance the project may be issued.

Highlighting the Farms election was the race for Board of Trustees. Incumbents William F. Connolly, Jr., and William G. Kirby were re-elected. Henry H. Hubbard was also elected to the board.

Final count revealed that Kirby beat Irving T. Winkler for the third position on the board by six votes.

James K. Watkins, president. Harry A. Furton, clerk; Alonzo J. O'Connor, treasurer; and Russell A. Labadie, assessor, were all re-elected by Farms voters.

THE PUBLIC IS YOU

In a thoughtful article in the Atlantic Monthly, Richard E. Danielson writes on "The Right to Stiffie." In his conclusion, he states that one principle which must govern the exercise of all human rights is that the public good is always controlling.

Here is the yardstick by which the practices of labor and proposed legislation dealing with labor questions, must alike be measured. Does the closed shop, which denies a living to a man unwilling to pay tribute to a union, serve the public good?

EVERY 53 SECONDS

Every 53 seconds a fire breaks out in the United States. Every two minutes an American dwelling catches fire. Every fifty minutes someone dies in a fire or from burns.

These grim truths were recently aired over the radio, by State Fire Marshal McCormack of Tennessee, who spoke on one of the weekly nationwide broadcasts sponsored by the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

Mr. McCormack further observed that nearly 1,000 fires occur in home alone each day — and a total of more than 600,000 fires happen in this country annually. Ninety per cent of all these fires are the result of some careless act.

At the end, Mr. McCormack urged his listeners to organize their own fire prevention programs to correct the common hazards of fires in homes. This is the very essence of fire control.

DRIVE AGAINST PRIVATE MEDICINE

Marjorie Shearon, Ph.D., recently published a pamphlet entitled "Blueprint for the Nationalization of Medicine." This work shows, in considerable detail, that an aggressive, well organized campaign is underway to virtually enchain the practice of medicine with bureaucratic controls—and to thus pave the way for eventual socialization.

Those who think that only the doctor is concerned with this new mistake. It comes directly home to everyone who may have to consult a physician or go to a hospital. Your health, your children's health, is the issue at stake.

It cannot be repeated too often that bureaucratized medicine is non-progressive medicine. The average employe of the state has little incentive to experiment, to work harder than a routine job demands, to develop his knowledge and his talents.

The system of private medicine developed in this country knows no superior. The problem of paying for medical care has been largely solved by the expansion of voluntary prepayment plans which offer complete service at moderate cost.

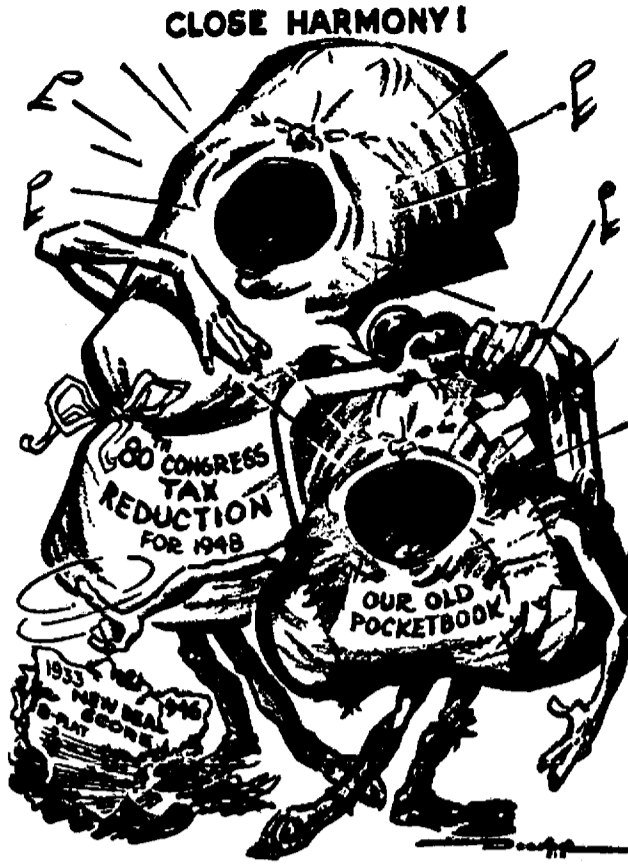
Government aid can be given to the indigent without endangering the structure of medical practice. The American people must be constantly on guard against schemes, no matter how well intentioned, that would subject medicine to the deadening anesthesia of a dictatorial government bureau.

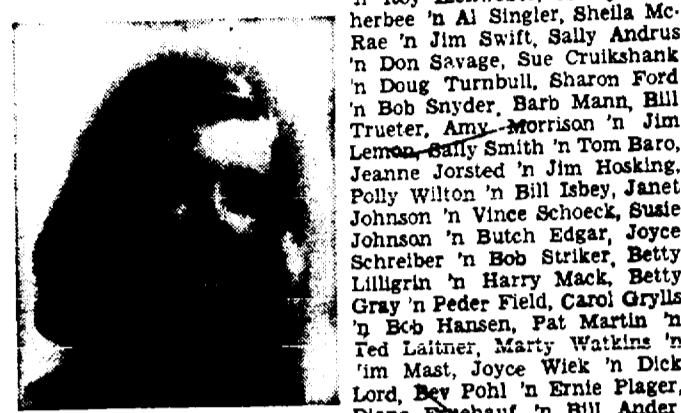

- Top Hat Cake
- Coffee

\*Irish Salad: On individual plates, arrange fresh lettuce leaves. Place two halves of canned pears on the lettuce, decorate with cream

cheese and top with a green maraschino cherry.

Round out the evening with Irish songs and games such as "Pin the Nose on Paddy." To play this game, draw a smiling Irishman on a large sheet of paper. Give each contestant a circle of red paper and a pin. Blindfold them and let them try to "Pin the Nose on Paddy."

## GIRL SCOUT NEWS

You all have seen fond parents beholding the antics of their off-spring, love and pride shining bright in their eyes. But have you ever noticed the look on a child's face when his father or mother does something of which he is proud?

Children like their parents to take part in the activities connected with their child's world. It gives them confidence, and a sense of importance, especially valuable in helping a shy young person to get his feet on the ground.

Thoughtful men and women today are concerned with youth, and the future of the world; many would like to find a way to help. There is a way! Girl Scouting!

In 1912 a Savannah, Georgia, girl named Juliette Low brought Scouting to this country from England, where it was founded. The Girl Scouts of America are now over a million strong, and March 12 celebrates their 35th anniversary. The organization is world-wide; international and interracial, all the way from the first Girl Guides to the newest troops being formed.

The Scouts need workers; people who like children, and are genuinely interested in their mental, moral, and physical growth. Scouting plays a big part in these phases of youth's development. The young people we are educating in the ways of clean living will be our future citizens; the background they acquire in early years is of the utmost importance. Being a Scout is an experience that goes a long way toward helping our girls to face problems of adult life.

Scouting in Detroit has progressed from the first 10 girls registered 31 years ago, to its present 18,000. Grosse Pointe boasts 600 spirited members.

One example of Girl Scout achievement is shown by Brownie Scout Troop 393, which consists of 28 girls aged 7 to 10, who, over a period of two years, raised \$150 by giving plays. They presented the money to the Leader Dog League of Rochester, Michigan, to be used as a scholarship to help an underprivileged blind person to acquire a leader dog.

Harriet R. Ferguson, National President of the Girl Scouts, says, "Anyone who is working with and for youth as we do in Girl Scouting feels that added tingle-of urgency today. Other things can wait. Youth cannot. The citizens who will be making homes, holding jobs, and helping to run the world are being prepared for those jobs now. They will be prepared somehow—perhaps badly prepared—whether we do anything about it or not. But they can be better prepared through contact with the practical experience and ethical code of Girl Scouting."

Those who have faith in the ideals and aims of Scouting keep it alive. Some give time, others contribute money. Both are done gladly.

It is a privilege to be a member of this highly deserving organization, and an inspiration to know we are making it possible for so many of our girls to have the advantage of this valuable citizenship training.

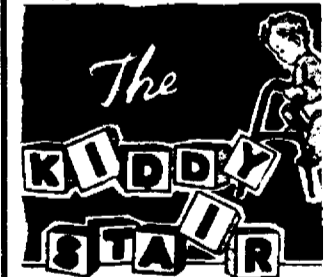

color fountain which will throw a spray 20 feet high reflecting colors selected by a color organ. United Nations gardens—ten gardens representing the cultural nations of the world—is an effort on the part of the Michigan Horticultural Society, sponsors of the show, to bring about a unity among nations by showing what these nations have contributed to the modern garden. A large modern American garden with plant material from all parts of the world will symbolize this unity.

Commercial florists have taken over a large section of the show and with Easter in the offing will show the latest flower fashions for milady on this festive occasion.

Lovers of bulbous plants—tulips, hyacinths, crocus, etc.—will welcome the return of these favorites in large pre-war quantities. The Department of Parks and Recreation is staging an immense display featuring thousands of blooms in a mass effect. In addition, the private gardeners are featuring bulbs from the greenhouses of Mrs. John S. Newberry, Fred M. Zeder and Mrs. Edgar B. Whitcomb.

An extensive exhibit, the combined efforts of the natural science organizations showing the evolution of Michigan, will be of interest to all naturalists. Starting with astronomy, all the phases of natural science will be covered from rock and minerals through soils, plants mammals, reptiles, insects and birds to man.

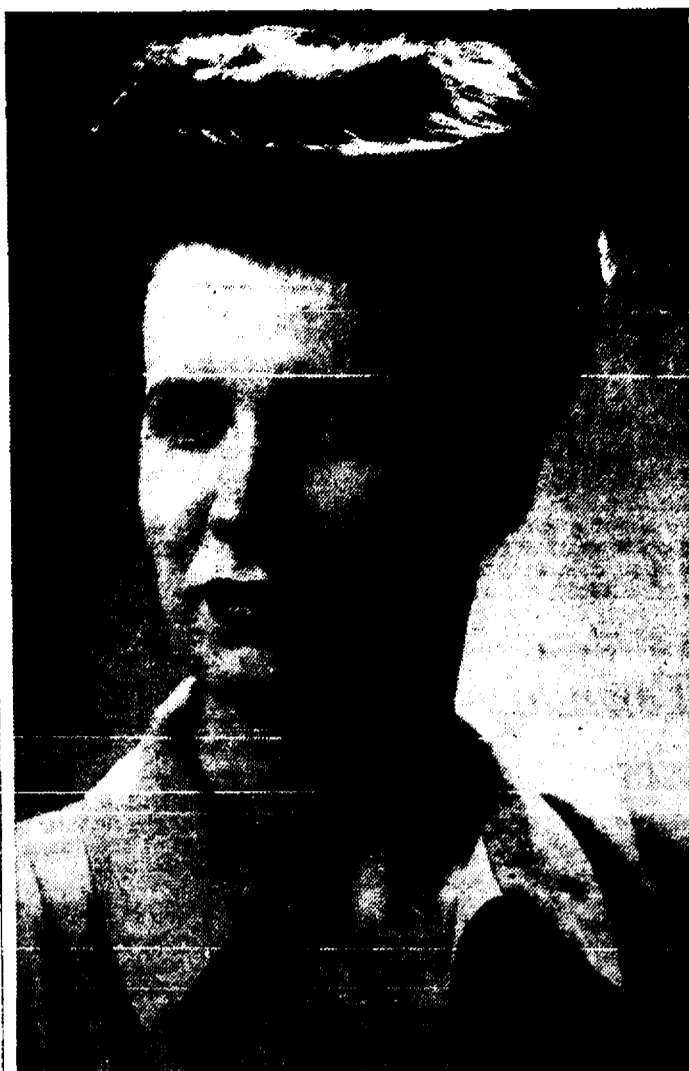
The rose will come in for her share of glory in a "Rotunda of Roses" in which more than 10,000 roses will be shown during the show.

## Rumpelstiltskin Reviews

By ISABELL BONEY  
Most book lists arranged for children are of necessity limited and arbitrary. This one unfortunately can be no exception to the general rule. Adults interested in fitting the right book to the right child know it is not as simple as planning a proper diet, or gathering suitable wearing apparel.

Even when age levels in general are indicated, every adult knows that children of the same age differ in temperament, tastes, interests, and reading ability. Against the reading range of most children is very broad—and unpredictable. There is, for instance the little long hair, who takes a flyer at Dickens and Thackeray in the fall, only to return to such juvenile delights as "Doctor Doolittle" and "Wee Gillis" when winter comes. The casual little character who sandwiches "Ferdinand" between "The Robe" and "The Oregon Trail" is also not unfamiliar. Nor is the high school freshman who devours "Austrian Requiem" on Tuesday and emits loud guffaws over "Gwendolyn the Goose" on Wednesday.

This delightful disregard for adult stuffiness in the matter of reading selectivity is one reason why it is futile to gen-

eralize when it comes to the "ought" books on the junior reading list. No general list for any age group can be entirely satisfactory. It can serve however as a guide post for the child on his journeys through book-land.

An adult, who understands the temperament and tastes of the child in whom he is interested, can be most helpful to him when the time is ripe for the child to begin building his personal library. He can help him to develop a sense of discrimination in the choice of his books, so that he will derive real benefit and keen enjoyment from them. With the help of an understanding adult the child generally will select a better book than he might choose alone. His reading skill will be improved, his interests gradually expand, his knowledge increased, his sympathies broadened, and in the end, a fine sense of self-reliance attained.

With this worthy goal as our objective, we will attempt to present a reading list for different age levels, during the subsequent weeks, apologizing for its certain limitations, because as we mentioned at the beginning of this foreword the individual personality of each

On his graduation from St. Joseph's Commercial in Detroit in 1932, Mr. Lauer had won 9 varsity letters — three each in basketball, football and baseball. Although he was deeply interested in all the sports in which he participated during his years in high school, baseball was his favorite.

Mr. Lauer showed outstanding ability in the scholastic line as well as in athletics by winning a place on the Honor Roll with all A marks, and the fact that he was elected Senior president proved that he rated high with his classmates.

After graduating from St. Joseph's, he continued his studies at University of Detroit where he played baseball—the rest of his time being spent in

**More Youth Enjoying Fund Fun**

Approximately 103,550 youths were members of recreational organizations in Detroit and Grosse Pointe during Dec., 1946, according to figures released Wednesday by Mrs. George A. Schemm, chairman of the Group Work and Recreation Division of the Council of Social Agencies.

Organizations included in the report were the Boy and Girl Scouts, YMCA, YWCA, Boys' Club and Camp Fire Girls all Red Feather agencies of the Community Chest of Metropolitan Detroit. Figures show that memberships increased by 3,544 persons over membership of December 1945.

Attendance at settlement houses, community houses, International Institute, Catholic Youth Organization and the Society for Better Hearing reached 81,600 adults and children. This was an increase of 14,366 persons over the figures of the previous year.

The monthly average number of sessions at Community Chest supported settlements and community houses in the metropolitan area increased from 2,334 to 2,524. Attendance at the same settlements and community houses increased by 8,748 persons during the last month of 1946. Attendance at group activities of the Catholic Youth Organization, International Institute and the Society for Better Hearing showed a decided increase of from 14,731 persons in Dec., 1945 to 20,349 persons in Dec., 1946.

Comparable figures on a national basis appear in a study of community health and welfare services recently received by the Council of Social Agencies of Metropolitan Detroit from Community Chests and Councils, Inc., a national association in New York.

In 28 cities, 394 local group work agencies showed a monthly average attendance of nearly 2,000,000 according to the study.

Boy and Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girl programs in the same cities reported a monthly average of 485,000 boys and girls registered nationally. Detroit showed a monthly average during 1946 of 47,750 active boy and girl members in the same organizations. The monthly average number of active groups of Scouts and Camp Fire Girls increased from 1,552 in 1945 to 1670 in 1946.

**RADIO NEWS AND VIEWS**

Radio has its own jargon heard more frequently in the production centers of New York and Hollywood than in our own Motor City. The language is as colorful and unfathomable as the teen-age mishandling of the American language.

Before mike time an announcer may be heard saying "Time to drag out the arsenic again." "Arsenic" in this phrase means a tiresome program. Perhaps some of the programs on the air today could use some of the bona fide arsenic.

In a busy studio you might overhear something like this—"Where is Madame Marino's long underwear? Unless Madame Marino is familiar with the terminology she's likely to be embarrassed or indignant. In radio parlance her "long underwear" would only be her sheet music.

A cliff hanger is a serial dramatic program, full of suspense and very exciting. And drooling has nothing to do with babies. Anybody who gives with unimportant talk "drools."

A radio performer "on the beach" is not a very happy person. He's out of a job. However, he may find a spot as an "old cow hand" until he gets started again. An "old cow hand" is an experienced staff member that escorts visiting firemen around the studio.

Two expressions that seem to be gaining momentum in Detroit radio-advertising circles are: Give him a "con" job or "I'll send him a "rocket." A "con job" implies fast persuasive talk to gain a point and a "rocket" is a jolting message calculated to bring fast action.

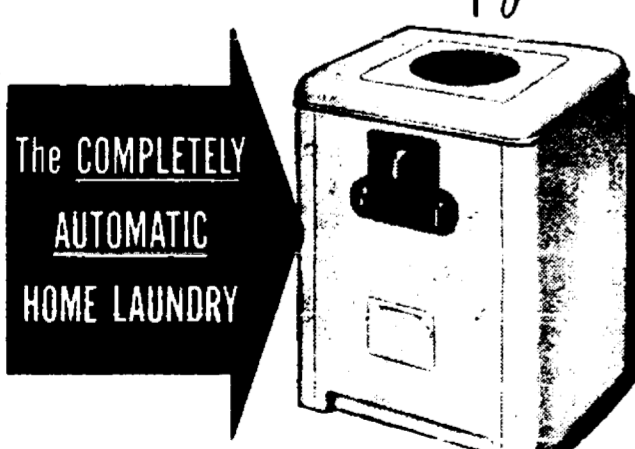
