Hearing Grosse Pointe City Council voted unanimously to pass the Mack avenue zoning amendment with one temporary restriction that it will not include property west of Neff road.

The acton came as a result of a public hearing and council meeting at the municipal office Monlay night.

The restriction is based on a protest by Les Lowery, who wns property on University Place adjoining the Stalein property. Lowery voiced protest to the amendment which calls for 150 feet of parking space behind the business section, which would put

cars on his property. It is more than likely that the restriction will be lifted at the public hearing set for Monday. June 16 at which time Lowery was to furnish further support to his protest. CONDEMNED

The complete passing of the ordinance will mark the end of a long series of zoning investigations and meetings which was the result of the Wayne County condemning most of the Village group founded by the late property along the Mack avenue area. The major development of the

new zoning ordinance is that the Mack avenue business#zone will be 100 feet perpendicular to Mack, with 150 feet of parking space in the rear of the building. Other factors include:

VILLAGE ASSESSMENT ISSUE

Several weeks ago the Michigan Supreme Court ruled against Grosse Pointe Park and City Lakefront property owners in their fight against the Township for a property assessment refund and of home safety. reduction. claim the largest fatality and in-

Undiscouraged by the decision the Grosse Pointe City aggregation began a movement to raise the assessment on the smaller Village homes to reducing their own. They were encouraged in on the sessions of the law enthis effort by Detroit's increase of property taxation.

The City Council, working to protect the smaller home owner, denied the lake front group's proposal.

The council was determined to keep taxes for smaller home owners at a minimum. However, when these very same people that the council was trying to protect had the opportunity to help reduce their taxes they refused to co-operate.

We mean by this the reaction of the home owners on University Place, St. Clair, Neff and others in the Stalein project area, who were completely opposed to any business development there which would have contributed to Village taxes.

It appears that the smaller home property owner wants lower taxation without making any efforts to obtain them whereas the owners of the lakefront estates are obviously making every effort to keep their assessment at a minimum.

The question, "What Group Deserves the Most Consideration?" is easily answered.

STRAY DOGS ARE MENACE

Grosse Pointe Township's means of handling the stray dog problem is a disgrace to the community.

Only two of the five Villages have dog wagons. The Parks and Farms police departments have reasonable facsimile of adequate dog wagons. They are makeshift carts which are hitched to the police scout cars.

The rest of the police departments use their scout cars for chasing and transporting stray animals. In the meantime the township's number of stray dogs have

increased double fold and the police departments with their limited facilities cannot do too much about it.

At present police officers are forced to chase stray animals and carry on the duties of a dog catcher while in uniform. We believe this conduct is disrespectful to the police department. Stray dogs are a menace to the health and safety of Grosse

Pointe. This community's method of fighting that menace is incomplete.
