Please consult your new Detroit telephone directories before calling any former Lafayette, Lenox, Tennyson 5, Tennyson 6 or Tennyson 7 number. These numbers have all been changed. Getting the new numbers from your new directories will help you avoid getting wrong numbers. Correcting your personal list of frequently called numbers also will help.

These changes are the first in a long-range program under which all telephone numbers in Detroit and suburbs eventually will consist of two letters and a numeral, representing the central office name, followed by four numerals.

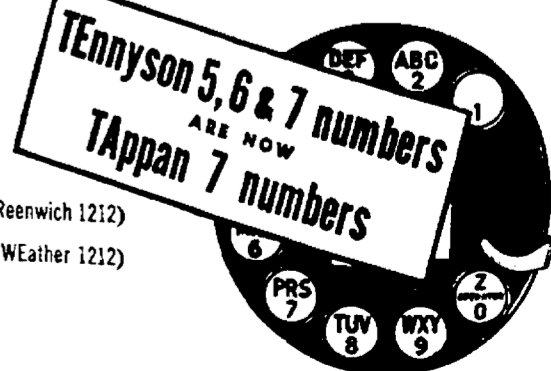
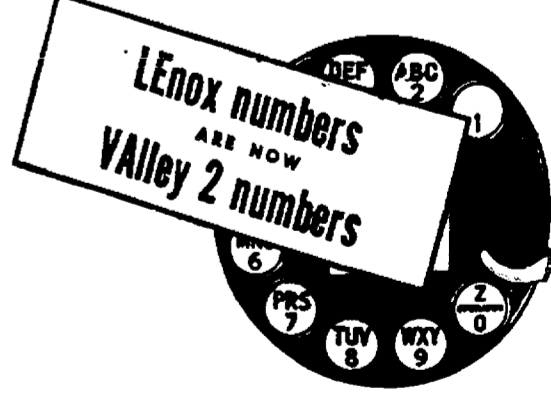
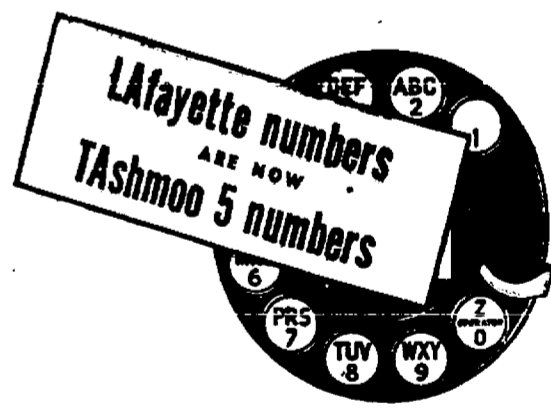
The immediate purpose of the changeover is to increase the numbering capacity of the telephone system to provide for growth in this area. However, it also will lead, ultimately, to two far-reaching improvements in telephone service.

1 In a few years, Detroit telephone users will be able to dial suburban telephones direct, and suburban users will be able to dial Detroit numbers direct.

2 Eventually, long distance operators will be able to dial telephones in any part of the country direct, further increasing the speed of your long distance service.

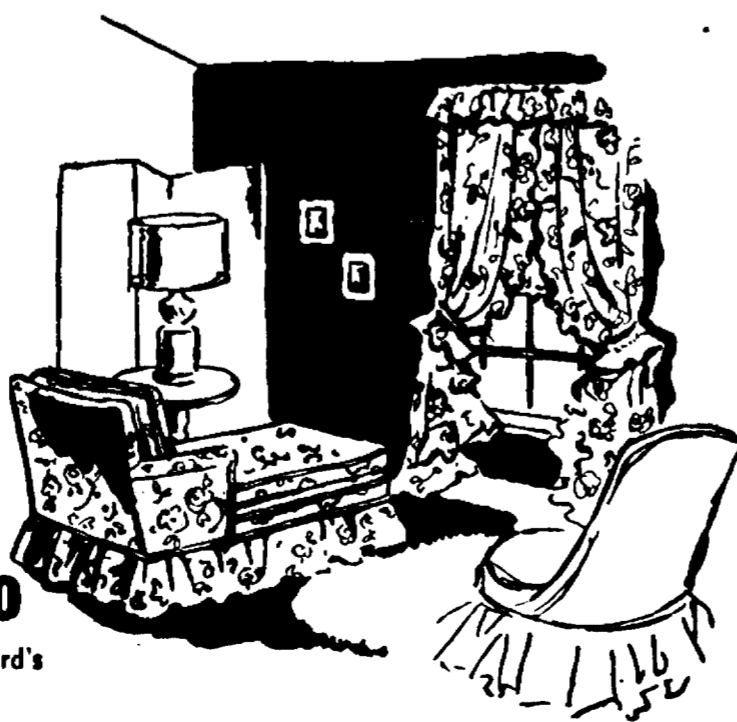

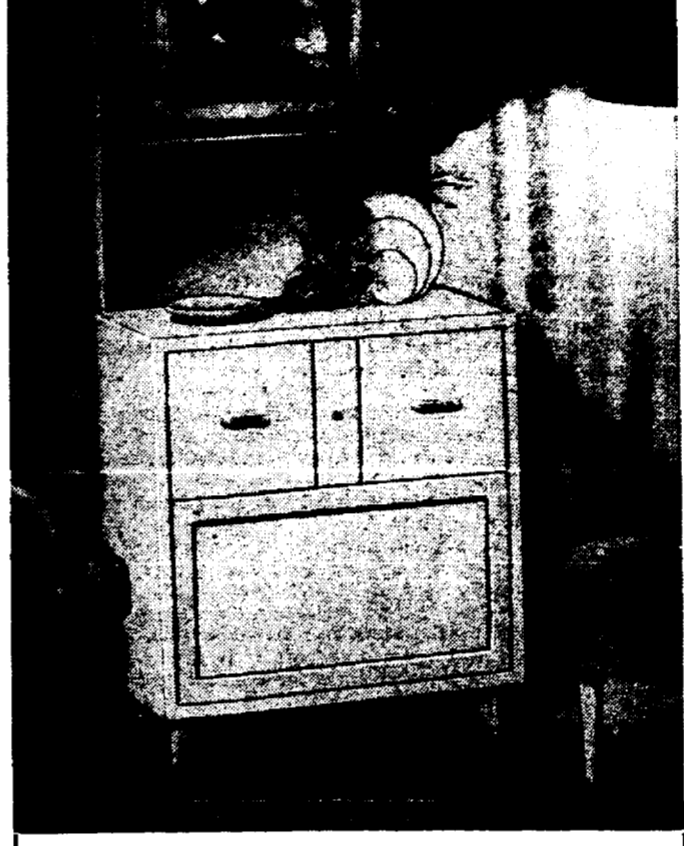

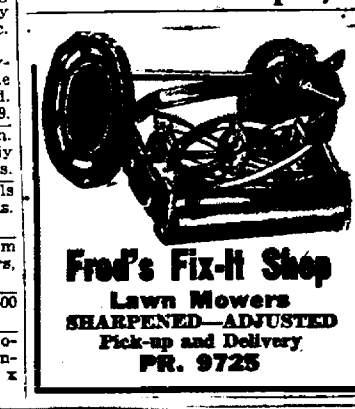
