According to Mr. Coulter, a campaign for funds is contemplated here in Detroit, late this year or early in 1948.

Four Die Each Day In Traffic Mishaps

Traffic accidents in Michigan during the month of May claimed the lives of 132 persons, or more than four each day, according to the monthly statistical reports submitted by police departments throughout the State. The toll represented a 20 per cent increase over the same month last year.

There were 10,479 reported accidents, or 19 per cent more than in May of a year ago, and 3,201 persons were injured, a gain of 10 per cent.



JUSTICE TRIUMPHED

Five women, members of a jury in a trial heard in Grosse Pointe City, should be highly commended for their sense of justice in the performance of a civic duty.

These women, housewives and mothers, were in complete sympathy with the defendant's wife, a mother who is expected to have another child shortly.

It was a difficult duty for these kind and considerate women to perform, in waiving their sympathetic and personal feelings to find the defendant guilty.

Justice triumphed, and a few moments later the Judge, understanding the unexpressed feelings of the jury and bearing in mind the circumstances of the case, imposed the lightest sentence possible on the defendant, a non-Grosse Pointer.

Though the case was of a minor nature, the judge and the jury revealed once again the justice and consideration that is present in the courts of Grosse Pointe.

The Judge was Joseph P. Uvick and the women of the jury were: Mrs. Vivaas Johnson, Mrs. P. Bedell, Mrs. Stewart Frazer, Jr., Mrs. Marjorie S. Kilgore and Mrs. Evelyn Kolowich.

LUXURY OR NECESSITY

Representatives of nations where there is no freedom of the press and where the people enjoy no privileges of personal liberty have often remarked that the American system of individual freedom is a luxury only a rich nation can afford.

When this country was founded, the going was tough. Freedom was the first goal of life. It was not achieved easily. The privilege of going to the church of one's choice was not considered a luxury.

Very likely there will be depressions in this country in the future, as in the past. They can either be short pauses in the march forward of a great nation—or any one of them can be the jumping off point for state socialism and the subjugation of the people.

UP TO THE COMMUNITY

The Action Program developed at the President's Conference on Fire Prevention is now being put into effect. A basic need, which is essential to the success of the entire program, is to overhaul laws and law enforcement procedures as they apply to fire.

Every state and community should at once initiate a study to determine whether its fire prevention regulations are so antiquated as to create perils to life. Many such codes are a generation or more old.

Secondly, every state and community should create a continuing advisory board to make recommendations to keep the regulations up to date. As new materials and new engineering techniques are developed, they should be incorporated into law.

Lastly, the key to the whole problem is rigorous enforcement of safety laws and building codes. The best code ever devised is worthless if enforcement officials allow it to become a dead letter.

There can be no excuse for states and communities which fail to discharge their responsibilities in these vital matters. The life and property of every citizen is at stake.

The Grosse Pointe Woods council would like to hear from Mr. Leonard B. Willeke, 1142 Bishop, a architect and builder, whose \$380,000 multiple dwelling was approved by the Woods council on June 19.

Mr. Willeke informed the council that he planned to have the housing project, which was to be located on the north side of Vernier road between Lakeshore Drive and Marter road, financed by the FHA.

He told the council he hoped to have final FHA approval within a few days. That was on June 19, the council has not seen or heard from Mr. Willeke since.

Cab Owner Found Guilty By Jury

Judge Joseph P. Uvick imposed a sentence of ten days in jail and a fine of \$110. On Albert Afchieny, 33, owner of the Pointe Cab Company for driving after his operator's license had been revoked.

Afchieny, who lives in St. Clair Shores, was found guilty by a jury of five women and one man in a trial heard in the Grosse Pointe City court Friday afternoon.

CONSIDERATE. Bearing in mind the pregnant condition of his wife, Afchieny and the demands of the cab company, Judge Uvick ruled to allow Afchieny to serve his sentence in one day intervals.

He was arrested by police on Thursday, June 12, while driving on Jefferson avenue. Through previous violations, police knew that Afchieny's license had been revoked.

Afchieny, a father of a two-year-old girl told police he was driving because it was an emergency. He was taking his wife to a doctor.

RECORD. Before passing judgement on Afchieny, who faced a sentence of 90 days, Judge Uvick checked over Afchieny's driving record which revealed his license had been revoked four times and that it was unlawful for him to drive a car in Michigan until 1935.

However, despite Afchieny's record, Judge Uvick was highly considerate of Mrs. Afchieny's condition and of a desperate appeal by the defense counsel.

Police reported that Afchieny, will serve his sentence in the Wayne County Jail.

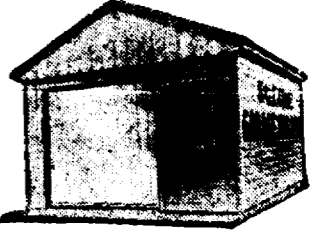
