#### LET'S CONSIDER THE SERVICE

Let us consider the service of the Lake Shore Line Coach company whose president, Walter Schweikart is seeking an increase in fares to be effective November 1.

Since 1932 when Schweikart became head of the company it has served the community faithfully without any interruption-while Detroit and other communities' transportations suffered from strikes and other problems.

Despite the fact that Lake Shore Bus drivers hourly pay was below that received by DSR, Dearborn and other suburbs' operators, Schweikart was able to keep a staff of men employed who were highly considerate and courteous to passengers.

Buses are kept cleaner and in good all-around condition.

It is true that during "peak" hours seats on the local lines are at a premium, but this condition is present in virtually all companies when they are faced with the problem of getting everyone home with as little delay as possible.

Despite the continued rise of operation his company, Schweikart refrained from increasing his fares. "However the time has come that if he is to make both ends meet, he must receive a slight fare increase.

Refusal of any increase meant that the persons who depend on the Lake Shore buses for their daily transportation will suffer the most-It was inevitable that the company could not operate with continued efficiency without additional revenue.

Over the years the enrollment of the Richard School has tended to vary in cyclic form. The school was organized in September, 1930. The initial enrollment was 389 pupils. In those early



from the family without being unduly disturbed. EMBARRASSING QUESTIONS During this period children will ask questions naturally if they are answered simply as they come up. Children who do not ask questions have some how gotten the idea that this subject is taboo. 

#### **City of Grosse Pointe Ordains:** An Ordinance Amending the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe, Michigan

#### Amendment to SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS: Section I. (16) Classes of Dwellings-

(b) A "terrace dwelling" is a series of attached private dwellings separated from one another by common party walls of fireproof construction, three (3) to twelve (12) attached one family dwellings, not more than two and one half (2½) stories in height, nor more than two (2) rooms deep facing upon a street.

#### Amendment to SECTION II, DISTRICTS:

Revision of the boundary lines of parts of the Residence Districts "A," "B," and "C" to be shown on the Amended Zoning Map are as follows:

## RESIDENCE "B" DISTRICTS TO BE CHANGED TO RESIDENTIAL "A" DISTRICTS

- AREA 1-West side of Fisher Road between Jefferson Avenue and lots now in Local Business District at southwest corner of Fisher Road and Maumee Avenue.
- AREA 2-Roosevelt Place, both sides between Jefferson Avenue and Charles Street.
- AREA 3-David Beyers Subdivision between Cadieux Road and Notre Dame Avenue, Lots 1 to 22 inclusive.
- AREA 4-Freemont Woodruff Subdivision between Cadieux Road and Notre Dame Avenue, lots 1 to 9 inclusive.

#### RESIDENCE "B" DISTRICTS

- RETAINING ALL "B" USES EXCEPTING TERRACES AREA 1-Neff Avenue, both sides from Jefferson to Mack Avenue, excepting lots 1, 2, 3, A and B at Jefferson Avenue intersection.
- AREA 2-St. Clair Avenue, both sides between Jefferson Avenue and Mack Avenue including interior parcels between St. Clair and Neff Avenue, excepting lots 35, 36, 37, 38, 79, 80, 81, and 82 of Amended Plat of St. Clair Subdivisions, and excepting frontage on Jefferson Avenue,
- AREA 3-Notre Dame Avenue, both sides from Jefferson Avenue to Kercheval Avenue, excepting Jefferson Avenue frontage, excepting Fremont Woodruff Subdivi-sion, excepting David Beyers Subdivision, and including lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 of Damerows Subdivision, at northeast corner of Notre Dame Avenue and Waterloo Avenue.
- -Cadicux Road, east side between Jefferson Avenue AREA 4 and Kercheval Avenue, including lots and parcels between Cadieux and Notre Dame Avenue, excepting Jefferson Avenue frontage, excepting Fremont Woodruff Subdivision, and excepting David Beyers Subdivision.
- AREA 5-That area at present in Residence "B" zone, between Cadieux Road and Notre Dame Avenue, and north of Local Business zone on north side of Kercheval Avenue,
- AREA 6-St. Clair Avenue and Waterloo Avenue-southeast and southwest corners,-iots 35 to 38 and 79 to 82 inclusive, of Amended Plat of St. Clair Park Subdivision.

#### RESIDENCE "C" DISTRICTS

Proposed Residence "C" Districts carry same restrictions as present Resident "B" Districts, hence only the change in designation from "B" to "C" applies to the following areas:

- Jefferson Avenue frontage-north side of Jefferson Avenue from Cadieux Road to Neff Avenue including AREA :lots 1, 2 and 3 at northeast corner of Jefferson Avenue and Neff Avenue.
- AREA 2-Rivard Boulevard, both sides between Jefferson Avenue and Charles Street's center line projected. Note: Present Residence "C" District, south side of Kercheval Place between Cadieux and Notre Dame, to be changed to Residence "B" District with permitted professional uses, excepting terraces.

#### Amendment to SECTION III, GENERAL PROVISIONS (J) Parking Garages, Parking Spaces, and Parking Lots.

- AUTOMOBILE PARKING SPACE-
  - There shall be provided at the time of the erection of any main building or structure or at the time any main building or structure is enlarged or increased in capacity, minimum off-street parking space with adequate provisions for ingress and egress by standard sized automobiles as ioliows:

#### RESIDENTIAL--

(A) Private Garages for Dwellings-In all Residence "A," "B" and "C" Zones there shall be at least one (1), permanently maintained parking space in a private garage of masonary construction on the same lot with the main building or the enlargement of a main building, for each dwelling unit in the case of a new building or for each dwelling unit added to an existing building. Such parking space shall not be less than ten (10) feet wide, twenty-two (22) feet long and seven (7) feet high. A private garage shall not have a capacity of more than two (2) passenger automobiles for each dwelling unit unless the lot, whereon such garage is located has an area of two thousand (2000) square feet for each parking space in such garage. (B) Parking Space for Dwelings-In Business and Commercial Zones, there shall be at least one(1) permanently maintained parking space on the same lot with the main building or the enlargement of main building, for each dwelling unit in the case of a new building or for each dwelling unit added to an existing building, or in lieu such parking space shall be provided in a parking lot not more distant than fifteen hundred (1500) feet from main building and said parking space shall have not less than one hundred twenty six (126) feet net area.

except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, shall be erected or used except for one or more of the following purposes: (1) Private dwellings

- (2) Public Schools, Churches and other places of worship.
- (3) Parish houses and community buildings, except those the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a business and excepting those which are multiple dwellings as defined herein.
- (4) Accessory uses customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses, including not more than one private garage or stable for each lot or for each ten thousand square feet of lot area, and including signs pertaining to the sale, lease or use of a lot or building placed thereon and not exceeding six (6) square feet in area on any one lot, except as provided in Section IX (E). Dwellings for the use of domestic employees of the owners, lessees or occupants of the principal dwelling on the lot shall be considered accessory buildings but shall conform to all the height and yard requirements for dwellings in the district in which they are located, except that where erected above a private garage or stable, the depth of rear yard, if not abutting upon a street, may be reduced to the dimension prescribed herein for side yards.
- (5) The following lots in Residence A District shall be permitted accessory professional uses of physicians' office or dentists' office, excluding clinics: Lot number 9 at southwest corner of Fisher Road and St. Paul Avenue. Lots number 5 and north half of lot at southwest corner of Fisher Road and Maumee Avenue.

#### Amendment to SECTION V, RESIDENCE "B" DISTRICT

- (A) Uses. In a Residence B District no buildings or premises except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, shall be erected or used except for one or more of the following specified purposes:
- (1) Any use permitted in a Residence A District.
- (2) Two family dwellings.
- (3) Public buildings and properties, hospitals, and sanitaria, and educational, philanthropic and religious institutions, except penal or correctional institutions or those for the care of the insane, provided there is not in connection therewith any activity which is noxious or offensive by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration or noise.
- (4) Farms and gardens, provided no building for the care or shelter of animals or the storage of manure is located nearer than thirty feet to a lot line, except for one private stable.
- (5) Accessory uses customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses including not more than one private garage or stable for each lot or for each ten thousand square feet of lot area, and including signs pertaining to the sale. lease or use of a lot or building placed thereon and not exceeding six square feet in area on any one lot, except as provided in Section IX (E). Dwellings for the use of domestic employees of the owners, lessees or occupants of the principal dwellings on a lot shall be considered accessory buildings but shall conform to all the height and yard requirements for dwellings in the district in which they are located, except that where erected above a private garage or stable, the depth of rear yard, if not abutting upon a street, may be reduced to the dimension prescribed herein for side yards.
- (6) The following lots in Residence B District shall be permitted accessory professional uses of physicians', dentists' offices or clinics, real estate or insurance offices, schools of music, dance, arts and kindergarten, day schools. Lots south of Kercheval Place in Kercheval Avenue Subdivision, Lots 47 to 53 inclusive, of Assessors' City of Grosse Pointe Plat No. 2 and lots 4 to 9 inclusive, of Chas. M. Cadieux Subdivision and lots 6 to 10 inclusive of Damerows' Plat.

(B) FRONT YARDS. In a Residence B District there shall be on every lot a front yard, the minimum depth of which shall be twenty (20) feet. - (4) Farms and gardens, provided no building for the case or shelter of animals or the storage of manure is located nearer than thirty feet to a lot line, except for one private stable.
- (5) Accessory uses customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses including not more than one private garage or stable for each lot or for each ten thousand square feet of lot area, and including signs pertaining to the sale, lease or use of a lot or building placed thereon and not exceeding six square feet in area on any one lot, except as provided in Section IX (E), Dwellings for the use of domestic employees of the owners, lessees or occupants of the principal dwelling on a lot shall be considered accessory buildings but shall conform to all the height and yard requirements for dwellings in the district in which they are located, except that where erected above a private garage or stable, the depth of rear yard, if not abutting upon a street, may be reduced to the dimension prescribed herein for side yards.

(B) FRONT YARDS. In a Residence B District there shall be on every lot a front yard, the minimum depth of which shall be twenty (20) feet. On a lot occupied by a permitted multiple dwelling of Class B, the depth of the front yard shall be increased ten feet for each twenty-five resident occupants or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five for the ac-commodation of whom such dwelling is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally uses, but this shall not require a depth of front yard of more than fifty feet in any case.

Where, at the time of passage of this ordinance, more than fifty per cent by frontage of the lots on one side of a street between two intersecting streets within a Residence B or C District are occupied by dwellings having a front yard of greater depth than twenty (20) feet, any building thereafter erected on any one of such lots shall have a front yard at least equal in depth to the average front yard of such existing dwellings, but this shall not require a greater depth than fifty feet in any case.

Where the depth of a lot existing and of record at the time of passage of this ordinance is less than three times the depth of front yard required by any of the foregoing provisions for excess front yards in certain cases, the total depth of front yard required shall be reduced to one-third such lot depth, but to not less than twenty (20) feet in any case.

(C) SIDE YARDS. In a Residence B District there shall be on each side of every lot a side yard, the minimum width of which shall be four feet. This width shall be increased four feet for each story by which a building erected on the lot exceeds two stories in height. Where a side wall of a building exceeds fifty feet in depth, the width of side yard opposite the portion in excess shall be not less than ten feet.

#### PARKING SPACE FOR BUILDINGS OTHER THAN DWELL-INGS-

For a new building or structure or for the enlargement or increase in seating capacity, floor area, or guest rooms of any existing main building or the enlargement of a main building, or structure there shall be at least one (1) permanently maintained parking space of not less than one hundred twenty-six (126), square feet net area as follows:

- (1) For church, high school, college, public schools, theatres, auditoriums, community halls or other similar places of assembly, at least one (1) parking space for every ten (10) seats provided in said building or structures.
- (2) For hospitals and welfare institutions, at least one (1) parking space for every one thousand (1000) square feet of floor area in said buildings.
- (3) For hotels, apartment hotels and chebs, at least one (1) parking space for each of the first twenty (20) individual guest rooms or suites: One (1) additional parking space for every four (4) guest rooms or suites in excess of twenty (20), but not exceeding forty (40).
- (4) For business or commercial buildings or structures having a floor area of seventy-five hundred (7500) square feet or more, at least one (1) parking space for every one thousand (1000) square feet of gross floor area in said buildings or structures, excluding automobile parking space.

Parking space as required above shall be on the same lot with the main building or structure or located not more than fifteen hundred (1500) feet therefrom.

#### PARKING LOT AREAS-

Areas permitting parking lots surrounding Kercheval Avenue Business Zones are to be extended as follows:

Area bounded by south line of Kercheval Avenue Subdivision, and extended easterly across Notre Dame Avenue between lots 46 and 47 and along line of north half of lot 27, across St. Clair Avenue and along north line of the south forty (40), feet of lot 90, thence southerly to and along south boundary of the two interior parcels fronting on Kercheval Avenue, thence northerly along east line of said property, across Kercheval Avenue and along east property line of interior parcels fronting on Kercheval Avenue and Waterloo Avenue, thence west and south along interior parcel fronting Waterloo Avenue to southeast corner of lot 82, thence westerly between lots 82 and 83, and across St. Clair Avenue and on line between lots 34 and 35, and between lots 8 and 9, continuing westerly to Cadieux Road

Amendment to SECTION IV. RESIDENCE "A" DISTRICTS (A) Uses. In a Residence A District no buildings or premises,

shall be increased in addition Sei- Turner Buick stories in height, two feet for eaglack-Nations or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five, for the ac-commodation of whom the building is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used, but for any portion of such building, the exterior walls of which are of fire-proof construction and entirely without movable windows or other openings within such prescribed side yard, such increase in the width of side yard shall not be required.

On a corner lot the width of a side yard abutting upon a street shall be not less than the minimum front yard depth required on an adjoining lot in the same or a less restricted district fronting upon such side street, but this shall not reduce the buildable width of any lot of record at the time of passage of this ordinance to less than twenty-five feet, at the ground story level, unless said lot be less than fifty feet in width in which case the building shall be not less than ten feet from the building line on the street side.

(D) REAR YARDS. In a Residence B District there shall be on every lot a rear yard, the minimum depth of which shall be sixteen feet for a one story building, eighteen feet for a two story building, twenty feet for a three story building and four feet additional for each story by which the building exceeds three stories in height.

On a lot occupied by a permitted multiple dwelling of Class B the depth of rear yard shall be further increased four feet. for each twenty five resident occupants or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five for whom such building is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used. On a lot occupied by a building in which persons congregate, or which is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used for the congregation of persons in numbers in excess of twenty-five, the depth of rear yard shall be increased two feet for each twentyfive perons or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five for the accommodation of whom such building is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used, but where the rear wall of such building is of fire-proof construction and without movable windows or other openings, such increase in the depth of rear yard shall not be required.

The depth of a rear yard abutting upon a street shall be not less than the depth of front yard required for a building of the same size and kind on an adjoining lot fronting on such rear street.

(E) HEIGHT. In a Residence B District no building shall exceed three stories or fifty feet in height, except that buildings or portions of buildings not used for dwelling purposes

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e B District there shall be on every lot a rear yard, the minimum depth of which shall be sixteen feet for a one story building, eighteen feet for a two story building, twenty feet for a three story building and four feet additional for each story by which the building exceeds three stories in height.

On a lot occupied by a permitted multiple dwelling of Class B the depth of rear yard shall be further increased four feet for each twenty-five resident occupants or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five for whom such building is de-signed, arranged, remodeled or normaily used. On a lot occupied by a building in which persons congregate, or which is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used for the congregation of persons in numbers in excess of twenty-five, the depth of rear yard shall be increased two feet for each twenty-five persons or major fraction thereof in excess of twenty-five for the accommodation of whom such building is designed, arranged, remodeled or normally used, but where the rear wall of such building is of fire-proof construction and without movable windows or other openings, such increase in depth of rear yard shall not be required,

The depth of a rear yard abutting upon a street shall be not less than the depth of front yard required for a building of the same size and kind on an adjoining lot fronting on such rear street,

(E) HEIGHT. In a Residence B District no building shall exceed three stories or fifty feet in height, except that buildings or portions of buildings not used for dwelling purposes and which in the aggregate do not occupy more than ten percent of the area of the lot may be erected to a greater height, provided that no portion of such higher building shall be nearer, to a side or rear lot line than one third of its height.

(F) BUILDINGS ON THE SAME LOT. Buildings on the same lot shall be governed by the provisions of Section IV (F).
