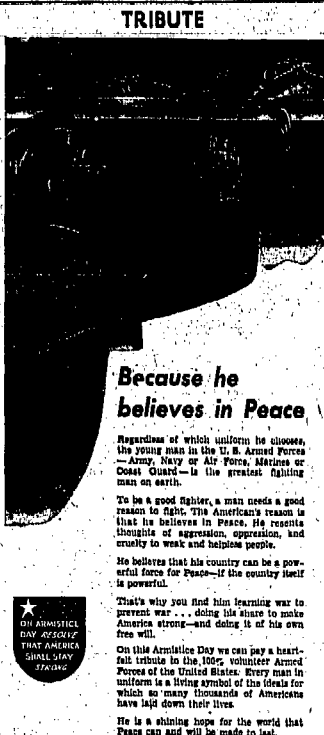

Optimists President To Speak

Members of the Grosse Pointe Optimist Club will join forces with the Detroit Club in greeting Lucien L. Renuart of Miami, Florida, President of the Optimist International, who will be the principal speaker at the Detroit Optimists meeting on Wednesday, November 19 at 12 noon in the Book Cadillac Hotel.

President Renuart joined the Optimist Club of Miami in 1934 and was largely instrumental in the formation of a club at Miami Shores in 1939, becoming its charter president. In 1940 he was elected Lieutenant Governor of District 4 which then comprised the states of Georgia and Florida together with Puerto Rico. The following year he was elected Governor of the district.

In 1942 he was elected International Vice-President, an honor again conferred upon him at the annual convention in 1946 at Miami Beach. He served as chairman of the Convention Committee in 1946 and during his term as vice-president served as chairman of the International Policies and Objectives Committee and of the International Ways and Means Committee.

He has long been identified with civic activities and in the trade association field of the lumber business. He is a director of the Little River Bank and Trust Company; a past president of the Florida Lumber and Millwork Association and a member of the Greater Miami Executive Association. His charity and fraternal affiliations include the St. Vincent de Paul Society of Greater Miami of which he is president, the K. of C., and B. P. O. E.

His election was by unanimous vote of more than 2,500 delegates at the 29th annual convention of Optimist International in Denver on June 28, 1947.

St. Paul High School Senate Combines Student Activities

At Saint Paul High School there is an organization which was begun September 1945, called the S.S.T.S. (Students' Spiritual and Temporal Senate.) This organization functions daily and it is run by the students, under the direction of one moderator and several advisers. The object of the senate is to tie all student activities together into one unit, with the purpose of developing self-expression, leadership, a spirit of democracy and a God-consciousness in every day life.

The seventh hour at Saint Paul is an added period called the opportunity hour, during which time a different activity is carried on each day. The S. S. T. S. has a monopoly on Fridays. It is during this period that the different bureaus of the unit have the opportunity to function at a general assembly. The opportunity period provides for the co-curricular subjects — lectures, programs, assemblies, etc.

The senate is headed by five major officers: co-prefects (a boy prefect of the Holy Name Society and a girl prefect of the Our Lady's Sodality), a treasurer, a social chairman, a secretary and five key chairmen of the different bureaus of the S.S.T.S. These key chairmen are aided by representatives from the different home rooms.

Social activities in the school are under the jurisdiction of the general social chairman and her representatives; namely, the social chairmen of the different classes. They sponsor the informal dances which take place in the school and other social activities. All bureaus of the organizations are behind the annual all-high Sodality ball which is the major social event of the year.

In regard to the press bureau, the editor-in-chief has a staff who are responsible for publishing the school paper and memory book. They are also in charge of the school publicity in the parish paper and in the Grosse Pointe papers.

There are two squads in the civic bureau made up of boys and girls of the senior class who wear the monitor badge. The chairman of this section is aided by the representatives in the various civic duties of the school. Authority has been delegated to the students of this committee to give blue tickets for minor offenses and orange for major breaches of the civic laws.

Another important committee is the host and hostess club whose duty it is to collect and check attendance slips, answer the telephone and to greet guests who might come into the building. This group also take care of minor administrative duties while the principal is on supervisory visits to the various class rooms. The captain of the seasonal S.S.T.S. assemblies.

Rumpelstiltskin Reviews

Only a little more than four hundred years ago Scandinavia was not a group of countries. Denmark, Norway and Sweden were one country then, and one king ruled over it. Three nations later, grew from the common soil, three languages sprang from the parent stem, and tales grew up from the soil too and blossomed alike in the three languages.

Was a certain tale first told among the fir forests of Norway, on the uplands of Sweden or where Denmark's green acres lie flat with the sea? Who can tell? Not the child who hears it today or the parents who tell it. From rich source material of Swedish, Norwegian and Danish folklore Ruth Bryan Owen has carefully selected nineteen tales for her "PICTURE TALES FROM SCANDINAVIA," illustrated in black and white by Emma Brock. She has told them beautifully and simply, with a flavor gained from her own close association with Scandinavia. Published by Stokes.

An excellent collection of Norwegian folk tales is "EAST OF THE SUN AND WEST OF THE MOON," ed. and illus. by Ingri and Edgar Parin D'Aulaire, adopted from the Danish translation. Published by Viking. Denmark has made a great literary contribution to the world in the beloved tales of Hans Christian Andersen, read by grownups and children of every nation. Published in Danish as "WONDER TALES" in 1835, the popularly called "ANDERSON'S FAIRY TALES" have been translated into many languages and along with Grimm's is the most popular in the English language. Anderson is not for the youngest readers, but every child

when he is ready should become acquainted with the humor, wisdom and gentle satire of the great story teller.

Among the best editions are the Heritage Press Ed. (1944) translated by Jean Hersholt, the actor, and illustrated by Fritz Kredel; the Grosset and Dunlap edition, trans. by Lucas and Paul, illus. by Arthur Seyk, and "ITS PERFECT TRUE AND OTHER STORIES," trans. by Paul Leyrae. "THE STEADFAST TIN SOLDIER," "THE LITTLE MATCH GIRL," and "THE UGLY DUCKLING" are important indeed in the world of children and grownups.



Compromise Rate Structure and Trial Thereof:—

(a) Lake Shore Coach Lines will propose new rates effective November 1, 1947 shown above.

All local and school fares will remain the same as in effect prior to November 1.

DUE TO THE IMPOSSIBILITY OF OBTAINING TICKETS ON SHORT NOTICE, LAKE SHORE COACH LINES MAY, UNTIL NOT LATER THAN DECEMBER 1, OFFER THE TWO-FARE RATE ONLY IN THE FORM OF A RETURN TRIP. TRANSFER GOOD ONLY ON THE SAME DAY.

(b) The Municipalities will consent to putting the above tariff into effect on a trial basis beginning November 1 and will so inform Michigan Public Service Commission. If the Commission authorizes the above, the Municipalities will agree to a three month's adjournment of the pending rate case.

(c) If the Michigan Public Service Commission authorizes the above tariff, Lake Shore Coach Lines will operate thereunder for at least three months and the Municipalities during such three months' period will not seek any reduction therein. During such three months' period Lake Shore Coach Lines will keep the Municipalities fully informed of its operations thereunder; at the end of such period the Municipalities and Lake Shore Coach Lines will review the results of such operations; each Municipality will have the right to determine for itself (i) whether such results are satisfactory, (ii) whether the results are inconclusive and require an extension of the trial period, or (iii) whether such results are unsatisfactory and require resumption of the pending rate case.

(d) If, at the end of the three months' trial period (or any extended trial period) any Municipality believes that the results are unsatisfactory, either on the ground that the tariff or any part thereof is higher than necessary or on the ground that the service is of inadequate quality, it will give Lake Shore Coach Lines a reasonable opportunity to propose a remedy. If the remedy so proposed is not satisfactory, the Municipality shall be free to cause its rate case to be brought on for hearing, and if any Municipality brings its pending rate case on for hearing then Lake Shore Coach Lines shall be released from its engagement hereunder as to all Municipalities.

If, at the end of the three months' trial period, (or any extended trial period) any Municipality believes that the results are satisfactory, or at least not sufficiently unsatisfactory to require proceedings before the Michigan Public Service Commission, such Municipality will dismiss its pending rate case without prejudice.

We will appreciate your co-operation and patience in carrying out the above agreement.

People say that our high school days are the happiest days of our lives; yet there are many problems which bother teen-agers. Through its counseling system Grosse Pointe High School attempts to help them solve their problems successfully.

Some students have social problems. One of the major drives of the high school student is to be socially accepted. Adolescents want to have friends. When they have few or none, they burden themselves with a terrific desire to attract attention somehow.

To help students mix and become better acquainted the school offers many outside activities. Numerous clubs direct a host of interests into productive channels. Hundreds anticipate the monthly S. A. dances. The vast sports program offers many hours of enjoyment.

Other students have vocational

problems. With today's variety of careers to choose from, they are in an endless debate with themselves trying to decide on their future work.

They are told the professions are overcrowded and those thinking of possible careers in medicine, engineering, or law will face a highly competitive world.

In three or four years the business world will be flooded with ex-G.I.'s just graduating from college.

Such a large number of capable applicants will make the choices few and far between.

Taking advantage of the various helps the school offers, many students have begun to inquire about the Kuder Vocational Interest and Aptitude tests. They are anxious to know about their abilities so that precious years of their lives will not be wasted trying to fit a square peg into a round hole.

Capable counsellors take each student separately and work with him to solve the problems of the future. Three-year plans to insure proper selection of courses, and civics career books help to guide the student.

Still others have emotional difficulties. When there are problems at home, students often have no one with whom to discuss their difficulties, and consequently keep them shut up inside.

Psychologists say it is wise to talk over our problems with some one. In spite of this advice many go along tense and frustrated—unable to understand the conflicts of growing up. Recent events in the newspapers have shown the dire consequences resulting from emotional upsets.

When their troubles get too thick, students may consult teachers, counselors or deans, one of whom may be able to give some practical suggestion which will help. Sometimes interviews with the school psychologist prove helpful.

Thus unnoticed Grosse Pointe High School deals with many of the perplexing problems of youth, producing better men and women to guide tomorrow.
