Park, City To Erect New Rinks

Plans for the greatest ice skating season in the history of Grosse Pointe were announced this week by officials of the five communities.

Grosse Pointe Park plans include two new rinks to be erected—one at Trombley field and the other at Defer field.

In making the announcement, Village Manager Everett B. Laue said that the new rinks will be available for use within two weeks, weather permitting.

Efforts have also been taken to improve the skating facilities at the Village's Waterfront Park and to the rink at Three Mile Drive and Charlevoix avenue.

FOUR RINKS
The four locations represent the largest area to be made available for skaters in the history of the Village.

Laue said that the Waterfront Park will be open for skating from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., weather permitting.

PARK COMMISSIONER CITES OFFICERS

Fire swept the \$35,000 home of Frank L. Klingbeil at 1041 Lochmoor Blvd. Sunday afternoon causing damages estimated at \$15,000 to home and furnishings. No one was injured.

The property was insured. Grosse Pointe Woods Fire Department was aided by the Shore's fire-fighters in putting the flames under control.

Woods Fire Chief W. J. Goulette stated that a spark from the incinerator was responsible for the fire.

Flames and water ruined the entire second floor of the two-story home and caused considerable damage to the first floor, forcing the family to find refuge among friends.

CITY PLANS MOVE

Grosse Pointe City is also completing plans to increase rinks in the village.

According to Councilman Chester W. Carpenter, chairman of the Recreation committee, a new rink may be erected at Notre Dame, south of Kercheval.

Besides the City's Park front which will be open until 10 p.m. for skating, the Village also has a rink at the Neighborhood Club field.

FARMS READY

A report from the Farms' Clark office stated that the Pier is being readied for the winter season and as soon as weather conditions are favorable for skating, the Pier will be open daily until 11 p.m.

The Farms also has a rink at Kerby field.

Grosse Pointe Shores officials stated that they have converted their beach "bathhouse" to a "skaters' quarters" for the comfort of residents who use the Shore's lakefront part for skating. It will also be open until 10 p.m.

Shores listed no other location.

WOODS RINKS

John F. Hansen, Woods' Highway superintendent stated that he hoped to have seven rinks available for Woods' residents this season.

The locations of the seven rinks are: Roslyn road at W street; Brys Drive at Marter road; Ridgemont road at Mack; Lennon at Mack; Oxford road at W street; North Oxford road near Milk river; and Severn road at Brand-caster.

Hansen also indicated the strong possibility of three more rinks in centrally located areas.

Chest X-Ray Program To Get Underway Soon

An extensive Tuberculosis Chest X-ray program will get underway in Grosse Pointe beginning the last week of January, 1948.

It was revealed by Richard L. Lea, executive secretary of the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County, co-sponsors of the program with the State Board of Health.

Speaking to members of the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club at their meeting Monday afternoon, Mr. Lea urged all persons to take advantage of the X-Ray test for their health and safety as well as the entire community's.

He said that mobile X-ray units will be placed at central locations throughout the Township for approximately two weeks. There will be no charge for the X-ray.

The program will be conducted in co-operation with Dr. T. S. Davis, Township Health Commissioner.

Complete dates and locations will be announced.

She will confer with John Finch, of the high school, in making recommendations. Final choices of the pictures are then made from these lists by student organizations.

The November meeting of the Motion Picture Council was devoted to giving the newly appointed delegates a history of the organization, and instructing them in the work of making the monthly listings of motion pictures that are suitable for children. Mrs. Hembel reported on the history and Mrs. Marick outlined the method of making the lists.

THE RIGHT TO BE LET ALONE

Somerset Maugham, the distinguished novelist, playwright, and essayist, recently said this: "If a nation values anything more than freedom, it will lose its freedom; and the irony of it is that if it is comfort or money that it values more, it will lose that too."

There, in a brilliant sentence, is the tragic significance of the world wide movement toward "security" at any price. Nation after nation has surrendered its liberties in return for promises of bread and shelter.

The greatest danger in this country is what H. W. Prentis, Junior, has termed, "the present blurring of the lines of responsibility between the three departments of the Federal government." The ultimate result of this policy will be to create that certain destroyer of liberty—a government of men instead of a government of laws.

The late, great Justice Brandeis once said: "The makers of the Constitution . . . conferred, as against the government, the right to be let alone, the most comprehensive of rights and the right most valued by civilized man."

GAMBLERS GENERALLY LOSE

Do you want to die in one of the most horrible manners possible? It's an easy trick. Just take chances with fire and, sooner or later, your number will come up.

More than 10,000 Americans roast that way each year. Thousands more are disfigured for life. Fire is an extremely efficient killer and maimer.

The ways to take chances are legion. Smoking in bed is one of the best. So is doing home cleaning with flammable liquids. So is starting first with kerosene and gasoline. So is carelessness with illuminating gas.

In addition, all the usual home hazards are responsible for their share of deaths. Faulty electrical wiring and equipment; closets, attics and basements full of paper and other junk; overloaded and improperly maintained heating stoves and furnaces—these are all dependable killers, and in addition they are responsible for the destruction of tens of millions of dollars worth of property each year.

Fire is rolling merrily along in the United States now. The total loss is at an all-time high and it is increasing. There seems to be no end to our carelessness and indifference. This may keep the fire departments on their toes—but, unfortunately, there's a limit to what the best of them can do.

STORM DEBRIS CLEARED

AAA Finds Florida Ready For Winter Vacationers

Fall hurricane damage to Florida should not deter winter vacationers from making a trip to that state, Automobile Club of Michigan's Travel Bureau Manager Harry Rogan stated. Members' demands for information on travel to Florida since the storms have been increasing daily in all Auto Club travel offices.

Just returned from a three-week inspection of resort facilities in the south, including Florida and Cuba, Rogan emphasized that the terrific destruction caused by water and high winds will not be visible to motorists and will not affect vacationing in the sunny south.

DEBRIS CLEARED

"Almost all debris of the storms including uprooted coconut palms, sand, collapsed buildings and water, has been cleared away. None of this will affect seriously the physical features and recreational facilities of this land of sunshine," Rogan stated.

With Lawrence Kelley, Auto Club reservations department chief, Rogan logged more than 5,000 miles of main highway and inspected hundreds of hotels and motor courts. They found the entire route ready for fugitives from the cold country, young and old, rich and not so rich.

Roads are in good shape and free of major construction projects which last year caused delays and damage to cars making the trip, the Auto Club men reported. An exception is Highway A1A in Florida, which has been damaged so that it will probably not be reopened in its entirety between Jacksonville Beach and Daytona Beach or from Palm Beach to Miami Beach this season.

REBUILT BEACHES

Beaches swept away by hurricanes are fast being rebuilt, Rogan reported. Motor courts, hotels, resorts and inns await visitors, resplendent in new coats of paint. In the larger resorts, he stated, the number of new building projects overshadows anything in his 25 years of inspecting Florida accommodations.

In Miami, building permit totals show more new construction going up per capita than anywhere in the United States. On the beach alone 380 hotels await the onrush of visitors. Even with new additions, however, accommodations will be at a premium in January and February, the Auto Club travel experts predicted. Trailer space is already scarce.

HIGHER RATES

Hotel and apartment rates, particularly in choice locations, will undoubtedly be slightly higher than last year, Rogan stated. Motor court, motel and rooming house prices will compare with last year's rates, but meal costs will definitely be higher in the south, he predicted.

Enroute to Florida, hotel rates for double rooms vary from \$6 to \$11 per night. First class motor courts will run from \$3.50 to \$8. The increase in gasoline prices will add \$2.50 to the cost of driving the round trip to Miami.

Transportation to Havana by air and boat, and hotel costs there have been increased. Round trip boat fare runs \$46, while airliners leave every hour at \$36 per round trip from Miami. Early predictions indicate that increasing numbers of Florida vacationers will visit Havana despite the increased costs.

BEST ROUTES

Grosse Pointers motoring to Florida's state line can reach there in three or four days of comfortable driving by taking direct connections, traveling about 1100 miles. Northern Michigan and Upper Peninsula motorists will require an additional day. Those leaving from Detroit or may choose from several good routes to Cincinnati, either through Springfield, Dayton or Van Wert, O. Those leaving from the western part of the state may use optional connections to Cincinnati or go via a more western route through Indianapolis to Louisville, adding 150 miles and avoiding semi-mountainous terrain.

Optional routes differ from 80 to 700 miles in distance, as logged by the Auto Club. Most direct route is via Lexington, Knoxville, Atlanta, Macon and Jacksonville—total 1,425 miles to Miami. The so-called "least mountainous route" via Louisville, Nashville, Birmingham, Columbus and Albany, Ga. will be popular with trailerites and others who prefer the most level roads south. Many miles of new-relocated roadways are now in use and many new stretches of multiple-lane highway have been added on all routes, Rogan stated.

Burial services were read Saturday at Roselawn Cemetery for Mrs. Herbert Josephine Parsons, 69. She died Wednesday, November 26, at her home at 1006 Buckingham road.

Highly active in club and social affairs, Mrs. Parsons was a member of the Women's City Club and the Garden Club and was helpful as a canteen worker in the war.

Besides Mr. Parsons, her survivors are: a daughter, Mrs. Mortimer A. Neff; a son, Joseph, and two sisters, Miss A. Louis Rinsahed and Mrs. J. R. Maddock.

Rites Held For Pointe Veteran

Funeral rites were held last week for Camille VerVaedke, 64, of 3882 Eastlawn, and formerly of Grosse Pointe. He died on Wednesday, November 24.

Survivors are his wife, Elizabeth, both daughters, Mrs. Lillian Toley, and Mrs. Grace Sebastian; son, Matthew; and eight grandchildren.

He was also the father of the late Pfc. Camille VerVaedke who was killed in World War II.





Half a million bills, calling for the payment to Treasurer Harold E. Stoll of \$18,777,157.84 in 1947 county taxes on Detroit and Grosse Pointe properties, are in the mail.

Due, December 1, the taxes may be paid by January 15 without interest or collection charge. The new tax rate is approximately \$5.43 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation on 463,942 parcels of real estate and about 40,000 items of personal property.

As an accommodation to the working public, Treasurer Stoll announced, the cashier's window in the first floor lobby of the County Building will remain open from 9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays, and Saturdays to 3:30 p.m., throughout December.

Arrangements have been made for the prompt handling of mailed payments. Taxpayers are asked to pay by check or money order, not cash, enclosing both copies of each bill.

This year, county taxes total \$23,349,038.86. In the out-county districts, the local treasurers are required to collect and remit the county taxes assessed in their territories.

Star Finds Women "Slaves To Fashion"

Lily Pons, famous coloratura soprano heard frequently on the Metropolitan Opera Saturday broadcasts over WXYZ-ABC at 2:00 p.m. (recently revealed the fashion rules she has followed for years.

With the unwillingness to compromise characteristic of any great artist, Miss Pons puts her tiny size three foot firmly down whenever she talks about American fashion and the fallacy of "a la mode." "Slaves to fashion," she mutters and shakes her head. "Though American women may be, en masse, the smartest looking women in the world, it is a complete triumph of basic good looks over courage."

FASHION RULES Miss Pons is particularly adamant in reference to those women who follow, haphazardly and come-what-may, whatever fantastic idea is dreamed up on the designer's board just so long as it is labeled "high" or "long" fashion, as the case may be.

Miss Pons' own fashion rules are simple and direct: 1—honestly evaluate your good and bad points 2—discover what basic lines and colors minimize the bad and point up the good 3—obey the only real fashion command, "Does it become me."

Expounding further, Miss Pons points out that any woman over five feet with a straight back, good legs and healthy skin and hair, qualifies most American women are born with, already have the only necessary bases for chic. "From my own observation," she adds, "I should say that the problem in this country for the average woman is to develop some individualized variation, however slight, on the general theme of whatever becomes her, and to make it her own by constant repetition in different keys and mutations.

Winter Wraps No Problem To Wise Mothers

When small children can't dress themselves, winter brings more troubles to busy Grosse Pointe mothers who have to struggle with snow suits, caps, mittens and boots.

Clothes made so children can help dress themselves are a boon to mothers. Ruth Highberger, child development specialist at Michigan State college, believes that children should learn to dress themselves and take pride in it.

SOFT SNOW SUITS

Snow suits from soft materials are easier for children to manage than stiff ones . . . and one-piece suits are simpler to put on than two-pieces. They will have less trouble with suits which have loose fitting legs and knitted cuffs than zipped tight ones. Large zippers with no fabric overlapping them are best for front openings.

Tightly knitted toboggan caps are ideal for children to put on themselves. Children can neither tie nor snap the caps that fasten under their chins but they can take off the snapped kind. Knitted mittens, especially hand-knitted ones, are easy for small fingers to manage. Leather ones with elastic cuffs are much too difficult and become stiff as soon as they get wet.

help to put on boots or rubbers that fit or are a little too large they're too tight. Four-year-olds can fasten boots that buckle but they'll have trouble with those that snap.

EASY TO WEAR

Miss Highberger suggests to Pointe mothers that they give these small fingers a chance with clothes that are easy to put on. These easy-to-put-on items can be found in most stores. It will save you time and little Johnny or Susy will be able to dress themselves before they start going to school.


