PRICE FACTS

One of the most intelligent and illuminating statements on the situation was recently given by Robert A. Seidel, vice-president of a leading merchandise chain, before a Congressional subcommittee.

Mr. Seidel observed that it is commonly believed that all prices are unreasonably high as compared with a year ago. The truth is that many prices have gone down or have held to the same level. He exhibited various essential articles of apparel which now cost less than in 1946, and which are also of improved quality. Finally, he summed up his testimony by emphasizing these points:

- 1. All prices are not out of line. Some are up, some are down, some are the same.
2. Increased labor costs are a major contributing factor to the present price structure, and the trend of wages will largely determine the trend of prices.
3. Bottlenecks still exist which cause shortages in production and so force the prices of the commodities affected upward.
4. The cost of government has an important effect on price levels. Surprising as it may seem, government now costs the country more than the food it eats!
5. Retailers' margins have been substantially reduced, and retail trade has not retained an undue share of the consumer dollar.

Mr. Seidel spoke from a study of the facts, and the committee members who heard him were interested and impressed. The whole price problem has been confused by wild denunciations of one group or another. The truth is that prices are the result of present day costs and conditions—not of isolated causes.

AAA To Present Safety Award To Trombly

Trombly school will be cited for its outstanding traffic safety education program during the 1946-47 school year when Automobile Club of Michigan presents it with the Traveling Safety Cup award at 9:00 a.m., Monday, December 15.

Presentation of the award will be made by Philip G. Stratton, Auto Club safety supervisor, to E. J. Cowe, principal. The cup, as its name implies, is not a permanent award. It remains in possession of the winning school for only the following school year.

Praising Trombly school for its well-balanced safety education program, Ernest P. Davis, Auto Club safety and traffic director, in a written message, singled out the teachers of Trombly for special commendation.

"Michigan parents and auto drivers can be thankful that so many teachers are participating so fully in the safety education of the state's children," he said.

"School safety patrol work coupled with classroom safety education directed towards creating safer habits in walking and playing will go a long way in preventing the toll of deaths and injuries caused by traffic now and in the future," he added.

Records compiled by Michigan State Police on traffic deaths of school children from 1936 through the present date show decreases in such tragedies. That child traffic deaths have been more than cut in half in the last 10 years can be attributed in no small measure to the efforts of teachers and the safety patrols, the Auto Club official said.

Since the office was officially established in 1944, it has done \$539,390 worth of business.

Defer News Health Board Warns Of Holiday Hazards

The sixth grade pupils exchanging letters with school children in Santa Anna, Calif.; St. Cloud, Minn.; Marion, Ind.; Johnsville, Pa.; Las Vegas, Nevada; Colorado; Stan Rock, Ky.; Kallispell, Montana, and Louisville, Kentucky. They learned that children in these cities do many of the things they do. The nature of their games and sports influenced by the climatic conditions in the area.

The pupils have made booklets "Friendship," "Beauty," and "Health." The children contribute money to the Christmas Fund. The money will be used to help needy.

Santa Claus was transformed from St. Nick by early Dutch settlers who made him the fat, jolly, bearded old fellow he is to-day.

Use a little care to keep your Christmas cheery. Don't let sickness, accident or death take your holiday, the Michigan Department of Health counseled and issued a reminder on some pre-holiday and holiday hazards to Grosse Pointe.

More than one-tenth of Michigan's 1946 accidental deaths occurred during December. Accidents in the home took the lives of 129 persons, 8, from falls (almost all of these were in the mature parent or grandparent age bracket) and 26, from fires, burns and explosions.

You fall when you are climbing, when you tumble down stairs, when you stumble over something, or when you slip on something left in your path. Use a sturdy stepladder when you are decorating your Christmas tree. Move it around the tree. Don't carry huge armfuls of bundles down the stairs. Move those skating rugs from above and below the staircase, preferably forever, but at least for the holiday season. Don't leave toys or packages on the stairs. You can break your neck on a piece of wrapping paper or tinsel, and small toys like marbles can cause big falls. Remind all members of the family of furniture moves made to accommodate the Christmas tree and holiday guests. Be sure that outdoor steps are sanded.

SHOP UNTIL TIRED
Eleven persons died from falls in public places and at least 49 pedestrians were killed by automobiles last December. Don't load yourself to the eyebrows with Christmas parcels and dodge through automobile traffic, walk down store steps, or walk on icy streets. Don't chase a holiday bargain across the middle of a block. Cross only at intersections and then with the light. It is best to plan a special brief shopping expedition with the children. Quit shopping when you're tired or irritated. It is the weary, preoccupied person or the one who just had two cocktails to freshen up to whom an accident occurs.

GIVE UP YOUR RIGHT
More than 160 persons died as the result of automobile traffic accidents last December. When you are driving in shopping or holiday traffic, let your Christmas spirit be big enough to give the other fellow (pedestrian or driver) your right of way. Be sure your car is in good condition with brakes equalized and all lights working. Drive slowly and allow plenty of room to stop on slippery pavements. Slow down well in advance of curves and intersections. Be especially careful in the evening. The biggest handicaps to winter driving are poor traction and poor visibility. Be prepared for adequate defrosting of your windows and windshield. Use chains on snow and ice. Do not drive when you have been drinking and do not ride with a driver who has been drinking.

BEST WAY TO CATCH COLD
Probably the best known way to catch a cold is to rush in and out of overheated crowded stores and slash through cold wet streets. Do not over-do, keep your patience in check and don't get over-excited. Your feet will probably never literally kill you, but you can get much more shopping done more quickly if you wear sensible shoes and boots. From your health's standpoint it is better to make several small shopping trips rather than to try to buy every present from grandmother's to small nephew's the same day.

Treating Trees To Save Needles

Dropping needles or leaves of Christmas trees, which strip the trees of color and litter the floor, long have been a Yuletide bane. Therefore, the discovery of the New York State College of Forestry that waterglass spray will prevent the spruce leaves from falling comes as welcome news to family and housewife alike.

Besides preserving the foliage, the waterglass spray adds to the decorative effect of the spruce by leaving a slight silver sheen to the green of the needle-like leaves. The waterglass also has been found to be a good fire retardant.

The college found that the shedding of spruce leaves also can be retarded by placing the base of the tree in a bucket of moist earth, peat moss or water. Users have reported the success of this treatment.

If children instead of their parents were allowed to choose the family homestead, the tiny fishing village of Rodanthe, N. C., would become a metropolis overnight. Here's a place they celebrate two Christmases every year. Santa Claus, his reindeer scampering over the sands of North Carolina's outer banks, makes his first stop in Rodanthe during his annual world tour on the night of December 24. Hardly have the children recovered from their oversupply of candy and wild duck when Santa returns in time for "Old Christmas," which for hundreds of years Rodantheans have celebrated on January 5. This time, however, Santa is accompanied by a menacing ogre, known as "Old Buck," who takes care of the bad children while Santa administers to the good. The historical background of "Old Christmas" is uncertain. COLE (Coordinated Leadership Education) teaches leaders how to carry out the activity of the group, where to get help on leadership when it is needed, and how to use activities of the group to bring enjoyment and individual satisfaction to the girls and to teach them democratic group living.

The coordinated program helps bring the vast resources of the community to the attention of the leaders, an adllows better training by competent instructors.

Miss Edwards said that workshops in "Out-of-Doors," "Crafts for Service," "Jewelry Making," "Fun for Blue Birds and Brownies," "World Neighbors," and "Touring Detroit" would be given during the coming year.

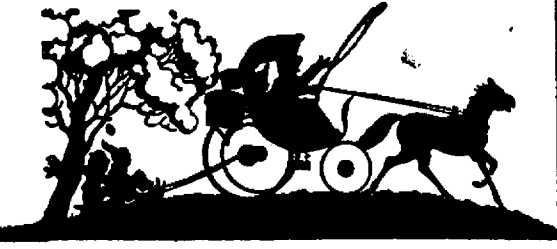

Pointe Youth Marks Progress of Rotary International Award

According to a report received from the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club, Cole Blasier, of Grosse Pointe, is making good progress with his Fellowship Award which represents a year's study of life and ways in Chile.

The award, valued at \$2,000, is presented annually by the Rotary International to outstanding scholars. Its purpose is to encourage a better relations and understanding among the countries of the world.

WIFE TRAVELS

Cole, who is accompanied on the trip by his wife, is a graduate of Detroit University School. He served more than three years in the Navy as an officer in the supply corps.

The youth expects to use his war time savings to help finance the trip which is estimated to cost \$6,000.

He is the son of Mr. Stewart P. Cole, of 16830 Village. In his report to the Rotary Club, Cole stated that:

"On arrival at the Miami airport September 24, we were met by Major Small of the Military Liaison Office who kindly offered the use of an Army car. This was made possible through the courtesy of the chief of this Army unit, Lt. Colonel Sam R. Knight, an honorary Rotarian. The next day we were taken for a whirlwind tour of Miami and vicinity. In the mornings there was the coffee hour at the Army's home for welcoming Latin Americans arriving from the South. Colonel Knight was a wonderful host, personally conducting us through the gardens of the Army's establishment. Later there was the regular weekly Rotary meeting, and in the afternoon Mr. Dennis Welch of the University of Miami faculty invited us to his home and later for a drive through the city. I was particularly impressed by the beauty and cleanliness of Miami, despite the recent hurricane, and the considerable civic pride of the citizens whom we met.

VISITED PANAMA

"During three days in Panama we visited the Canal, Colon on the Caribbean side, and Panama City on the Pacific. One can tell that Panama is one of the most

important crossroads in the world by her people. One afternoon we took a crowded bus out to the ruins of Old Panama. Among our fellow passengers were a Chinese, several coal black Negroes, a handsome mulatto, two Panamanians in their Indian dress, a Filipino, and others who probably contained mixtures of Negro and Indian, and Indian and Oriental blood. We were the only pure whites on the bus. We were also surprised to note the predominance of Negroes in Panama. City and Colon, although we knew them to compose only a fraction of the Panamanian population. Apparently, these people had come to Panama during the construction of the Canal from the Caribbean, especially from Jamaica with which Island Panama appears to retain close cultural ties if newspaper

articles are a valid indication. Many of these Negroes speak both English and Spanish, the latter with a most peculiar and interesting accent."

24 DAY TRIP

In his 24 day trip from Detroit to Chile the youth also visited Call, Columbus where he found it quiet, restful and in sharp contrast with teeming and tropical Panama. He said he visited the offices of the president and secretary of the Rotary Club.

His report continues:

"Soon after arriving in Santiago October 18, I met Mr. Benavente, secretary of the Santiago Rotary Club. I have attended Rotary meetings and have met a great many Rotarians here. Recently some of the officers of the club and new members gathered for tea at the Rotary offices. Since it was by way of a welcoming and instruction meeting about Rotary conducted by Mr. Carlos Hoerning, I was please to have been invited. It is difficult to express the warm and friendly manner in which I have been received here, and the kindnesses shown me on many occasions.

BETTER IDEA

"Recently, I have been attending classes with an opportunity to become accustomed to class room procedures and to meet some of the students. The University is closing its spring session now and examinations will soon begin. I have consulted some dozen professors in connection with my studies and have compiled a bibliography on the history of Chile which will keep me busy for many weeks. In the United States I had studied much of the available material on Chile. Now at the very source of this information, I hope to secure in the next two or three months a better idea of Chilean history, geography, and current political and economic problems!
