WHAT'S RIGHT WITH THE UNITED STATES

Millions of Americans seem to be apathetic toward charges that there is something basically wrong with our governmental and economic systems, and that socialism, communism and the rest of the assorted "isms" have more to offer.

Edward C. Sammons, president of the United States National Bank of Portland, Oregon, touched on that vividly when he said:

"Our country is the only nation in the history of the world that has continued with its intrinsic, basic type of government since its beginning 10 years ago... In those 10 years our 6 per cent of the world's population produced 25 per cent of the world's goods and possesses 50 per cent of the world's wealth. In no other country is there such opportunity as here.

"Too many people are saying what is wrong with America. Instead, we should be saying what is right with United States. Why should capital be on trial here? Why should not socialism or communism instead be on trial, when our people are asked to provide the money and the food and tools for other nations to carry on.

"In my time we have defended our country three times from outside invaders, but we are not defending it sufficiently from within. The working man here is able to live almost as well as a king compared with those in other countries. Other systems promise. Our people have!"

That is a fundamental truth. The American people should shout from the housetops their faith in a system that has given them unprecedented tangible benefits—and, infinitely more important, the intangibles make for a life of freedom.

LETTER BOX

TO THE EDITOR:

The people of your community have not been afforded the opportunity of showing how much they would like to contribute in the way of food for the starving millions of Western Europe. The recent "Friendship Train" went across the nation without entering Michigan. The citizens of our State, therefore, had no chance to contribute to its valuable cargo.

Michigan led the nation during the war in the production of war material, preventing totalitarianism from conquering the democratic nations. Today we Americans are trying to win the peace. We Michiganders have not had a chance to participate in this peace-making effort as characterized by the "Friendship Train."

Therefore, the 78 Michigan Junior Chambers of Commerce are spearheading a strictly Michigan "Friendship Motor Caravan." This will comprise truckloads of food contributed by the citizens of Michigan for the hungry of Western Europe. The Junior Chambers will collect the food, pack it in cartons, load it onto trucks and the gigantic caravan will move downstate to Detroit where it will receive a magnificent send-off, then to Philadelphia, and by ship to Europe. Five Junior Chamber members will accompany the shipment and report back to the people of Michigan how and where their food contributions were distributed.

You, as editor of your community's newspaper, can place this letter into the hands of the president of one of your local leading civic organizations, church, service club, women's group, or otherwise so that your area will be represented, however little or much, in this gesture by the people of Michigan to the starving Western Europeans.

The state-wide campaign officially opened Tuesday, Dec. 16; the motor caravan will leave from Detroit on January 5.

Your local chairman should know these three points:

- 1. If you plan to cooperate, immediately wire the Detroit Junior Board of Commerce, Detroit LeLand Hotel, Detroit, including name of organization and president.
2. The State Caravan Committee will notify the Junior Chamber of Commerce nearest your community which will send a member to see you and advise you on the campaign.
3. Signs, placards, food containers can be placed in local groceries; most Boy Scouts would be willing to help pack the food and stencil cartons; local truckers most likely will cooperate in providing transportation.

We enlist your support and that of your community in this drive. Then we all can show the world that Michigan has a heart of gold during peacetime, as it had a heart of steel during the war.

Civic Leaders Prepare For Chest X-Ray Program

The Michigan Department of Health mobile X-Ray unit will move into Grosse Pointe in February, Dr. Arthur P. Derby, Tuberculosis Control Officer of the Wayne County Health Department, announced at a meeting of community leaders which was held at the Neighborhood Club last Friday. Every adult 15 years of age and over will have an opportunity to get a free chest x-ray at that time.

Dr. Thomas S. Davies, Grosse Pointe Health Officer, is to be the chairman of this community project in which all civic groups and leaders will participate. The drive to get every adult in Grosse PointeTownship x-rayed as sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Health Department in cooperation with the Wayne County and Michigan Department of Health, and the TB and Health Society.

Dr. Davies, appointed Mr. Forrest Geary to head the public education committee for the drive, and Mr. George Elkworthy the neighborhood organization committee. Mrs. Alice Moody-Shaeffer will be in charge of volunteers for the X-ray trailer and Mr. John Hannan of a businessmen's committee. Mr. Lynn Bartlett was appointed to organize an educational committee in the schools.

The X-ray survey in Grosse Pointe is a continuation of the Wayne County survey which has been in progress for approximately a year, Dr. Derby said. Over 50,000 residents of Wayne County have had free chest X-rays so far.

Dr. Derby emphasized that tuberculosis takes the lives of 53,000 Americans a year, 1000 of

them in Wayne County. It is the first disease cause of death in the age group between 15 and 44. That is why he urged all adults to take advantage of this free chest X-ray program in Grosse Pointe.

Teacher Exams Will Be Given At Mich. State

The National Teacher Examinations of the American Council on Education will be given for the first time at Michigan State College next February 7 and 14.

The exams are endorsed by numerous school system officials and records on the tests are frequently referred to by administrators in considering applicants for teaching positions.

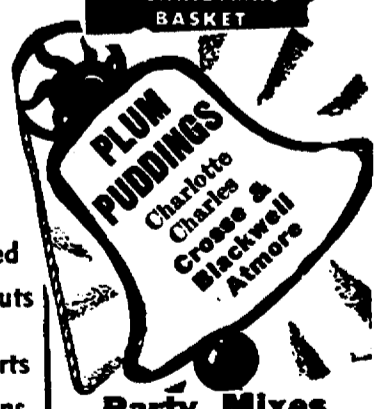

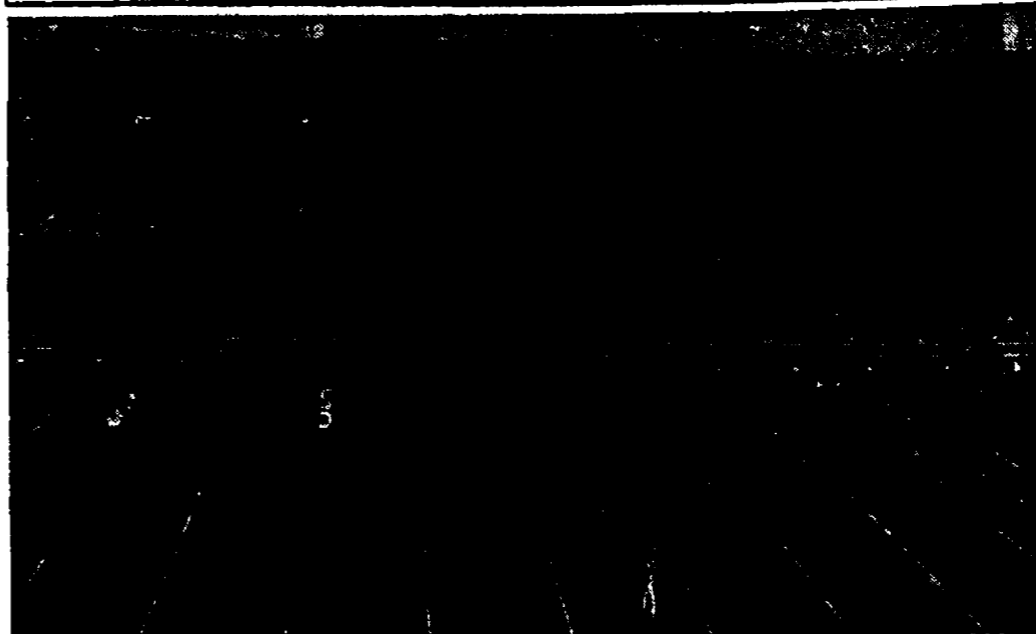

Yule Shopper in 1847 Had Difficulties

The Christmas shopper of a century ago who made out her shopping list from the newspaper advertisements would have had a difficult time.

The newspaper ads of 1847 made rather dull going for the reader, concentrating as they did on groceries, hardware and clothing essentials. Many of the advertisements used in weekly newspapers ran for several months without change.

Files of the Ann Arbor "True Democrat" for December, 1847, contained in the University of Michigan General Library, offer as their best advice to the Christmas shopper jewelry and musical instruments "direct from New York." Presumably the clocks and watches, rings and necklaces, accordions and violins listed in this advertisement arrived via canal, lake steamer and railroad.

Other advertisers of the period pointed to their stocks of "large family Bibles," "hats and caps, Yankee notions, looking glasses," and "new goods for the winter trade."

But if it were prices on items needed for the Christmas dinner that caused concern, the 1847 food buyer can look with envy at the 1947 price list. According to the Ann Arbor market report, corrected weekly by the True Democrat editor, potatoes were selling for 38 cents a bushel, and wheat for 85 cents a bushel. Butter was not more than 16 cents per pound, and eggs sold for 12 cents a dozen. Beef by the hundredweight could be had for \$2.50 to \$3.00.

Along with the advertisements of possible Christmas items was that inevitable call for military recruits. The Mexican War was then in progress, and the Marines were advertising "Who'll Go to the Halls of the Montezumas?"

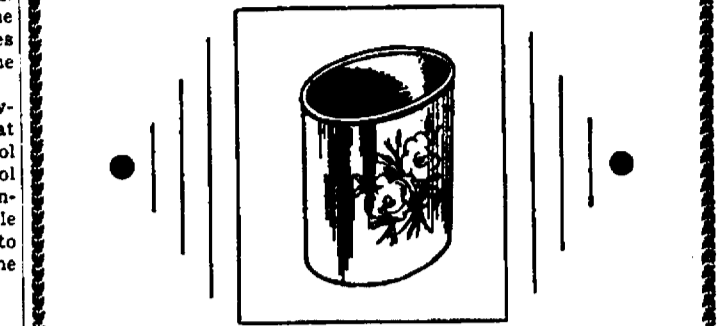

Nevens Leads Virginians to Successful Season

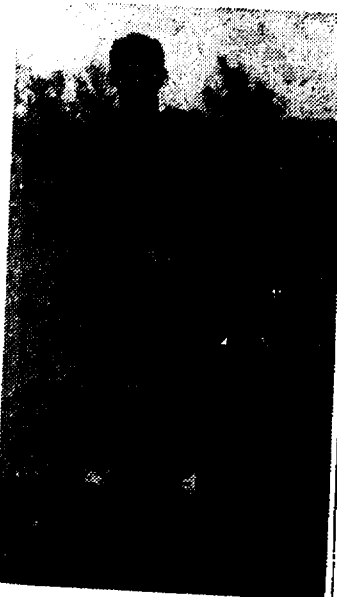



Clerk Warns of Marriage License Laws

Thousands of married couples are put to great inconvenience and unnecessary litigation, because of the failure of officiating clergymen or magistrates to comply with the marriage license laws, according to Edgar M. Branigan, Wayne County Clerk.

"An examination of the marriage license records of the last six months indicates that about five per cent of the marriage licenses issued have not even been returned to the office of the county clerk as required by law," Branigan said. "In other words, there is no official record that the parties were ever married."

"The result of this failure on the part of the clergymen or magistrates is that in years to come there will be considerable difficulty on the part of the married couples involved to prove their marriages. The copy of the marriage license issued to the married couple is often misplaced."

"The present day demand for copies of marriage licenses needed for pensions, civil service, naturalization, and for almost all dealings with the federal military and related departments, shows the extreme necessity for recording marriage licenses," Branigan said. "It was pointed out that the statute requires that the officiating clergyman or magistrate fill out the marriage license and return the same within ten days after the ceremony is performed. Branigan said extreme care should be exercised by the officiating clergyman or magistrate in filling out the blanks on the marriage license. Many such mistakes occur and almost always litigation follows."

"If the clergymen or magistrates realized fully the great inconvenience caused to these thousands of married couples, they would comply with their statutory duty," Branigan said.
