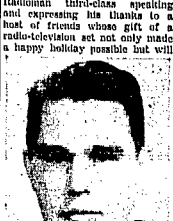

NEW YEAR'S REVOLUTION

1948 is a pivotal year in history. At a time like this, New Year's resolutions are like the toot of a tin horn in the teeth of an onrushing wind.

There must be new hope for the future—the rebirth of faith in people's hearts—that will give men the will to recover and to stand on their own feet in Europe.

In the face of needs like this we can't resolve to eat one egg instead of two for breakfast, or to cut down our tobacco money, in the hope of saving Europe.

If we ourselves put first the points of view on which we disagree and fight over them we can't expect people in Europe to agree and fight together for the great principles of freedom and democracy.

But if we ourselves revolt against self-centered living and thinking and begin to live, as God intended, to make other men and nations great, we can give the world great hope.

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR WORK

J. J. Newberry, head of the national retailing chain system that bears his name, recently sent a message to store managers throughout the country which contains, in simple, forceful language, fundamental truths that apply to all of us.

He wrote: "The person who makes his job the most important thing in his life, other than taking care of his family, and who has common sense and intelligence to apply to his job, should be entitled to greater success and rewards than the one who only wants to work eight hours a day, five days a week."

"Everything in the way of farming, mining, manufacturing and distribution must keep on expanding to give work to the increased population and to produce and distribute the larger requirements of more people.

"Those leaders will be the people who have such enthusiasm for their work they would rather stay on the job and see that which they are interested in progress and growth than to spend their leisure time at less important pursuits."

"When you hear bright young people talking about working only forty hours a week who expect equal compensation with the man who loves his work enough to put the necessary time in to make his company grow, then you owe it to such a person to tell him how wrong his ideas are."

This is an old-fashioned doctrine. It is in opposition to the new and engaging theories of the more advanced social and economic planners. But, whether we like it or not, it is a theory which is solidly supported by centuries of human experience — and human experiment.

Gratiot Township Resident Honored By Packard, WJR

Out of the 403 men and women who were awarded gold wrist watches and chests of silver at Packard Memorial Building Harley Whitmore Jr. of 20689 Washtenaw was chosen to appear on Bud Mitchell's "Auto Horizons" program over WJR recently.

The Packard award is for those who have had ten years of continuous service with the company. Mr. Whitmore is the third generation of his family who has received it. His father, now retired and living in Findlay, Ohio, and his grandfather were similarly honored in years past.

"This is a record employee-company association with few, if any, equals in American industry," Alvan Macauley, who initiated the annual award in 1917 stated. "It typifies a rare kind of loyalty, which—as is true in all human relationships—must work both ways if it is to be of value to those who share in it."

This loyalty was signified in a later interview at the Whitmore home. Proudly displaying the watch, Mr. Whitmore said, "This is something I have always wanted but couldn't just buy for myself—not even as a gift to my wife and, then—the company gives it to me." There seems to be no question about its appreciation.

Checking his age—thirty-eight—and the fact he has served with Packard about twenty years all together, having left once or twice since his first start as an office boy, we inquired about military service to which he answered, smiling, "No I quit once and got fired once." (Who hasn't?)

And that led to the well filled scrap book of photos and news clippings those years in the motor testing department of Packards. One in particular of Orin Johnson and the Gray Fox from Algonac who created the waters of the Detroit river not so long ago, and when Mr. Whitmore was doing test work on the motors of the first Miss Americas.

Mr. Whitmore on the first Rolls-Royce motor built in the United States—the first P.T.'s and there were lots of photos of the classes of Naval students he taught to tear down and rebuild P.T.'s during the war.

And getting back to that loyalty and co-operation. Mr. Whitmore strikes you as a man who really believes in the American way of doing things—that there are those who must own and manage and those who must work. The type of a man who would have his dime ready when the bus stops and step to the back when it got crowded—so that all riders would have a better chance.

He has been a resident of Gratiot Township for the past eight years and has not had the time to take much part in its civic affairs. But, in his home, with that new watch, his scrap book, a beautifully decorated Christmas tree, his wife Eileen and their "little helper" Gloria, five, he can greet this season as a man the community should be proud to call its own.

Rare Books At U. M. Show Science of 17th Century

ANN ARBOR—The twentieth century is no doubt the "miracle age" of science, but rare volumes in the University of Michigan General Library indicate that a good deal of modern science had its beginning in 17th century Holland.

Two of the most notable of these early Dutch scientists were Christian Huygens, born in 1629, and Anthony Van Leeuwenhoek, born in 1632. Huygens was an astronomer, making his own telescope lens and clocks for study of the heavens.

He wrote a book on his idea of the constitution of the plants which contains many correct observations, although it also includes the assertion that the planets other than earth are inhabited. An early edition of Huygens' volume is in the University Library.

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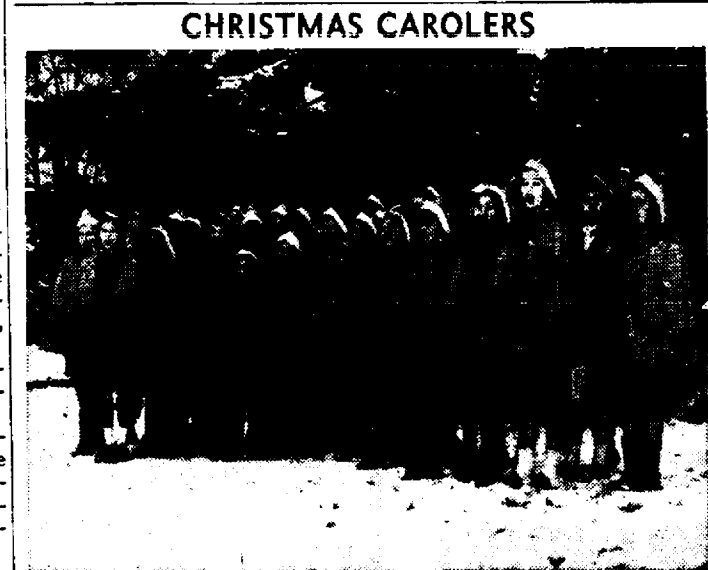
