The current Chest X-ray drive brought to mind again the ever presence of tuberculosis; and that nothing but an X-Ray can forsee where the dread germ may strike next or mark the germ carrier.

Health officials constantly drive home the fact that TB fools people. The healthiest looking athlete may be a carrier, of this highly contagious disease.

In view of these factors, we urge all persons over 15 500.000. Grosse Pointe taxpayers years of age to take the X-Ray examination when the are high among the contributers Mobile Unit arrives in the community beginning Feb. 10.

We urge village officials to take steps in adopting an ordinance requiring all food handlers to be X-Rayed annually.

At the present time, the only food handlers compelled to take a chest examination at regular periods are those employed by the board of Education. In fact all employees of the Board of Education are subject to this regulation.

By adopting such an ordinance and providing the ways and means of enforcing it, village officials would be doing the people of this community a tremendous service.
