Blame Man, Materials Shortage

Labor and material shortages will delay the opening of the Parcels School for upper elementary pupils who live in the Grosse Pointe Woods area until some time in March.

We are at present embroiled in war with Russia, a political and economic warfare, asserted Arnall. But, Russia is talking too loudly to fight.

Communism will continue to find its Quixings, crackpots and ignorant audience everywhere, but the little orator holds no fear of it. "It won't work," said Arnall, "because Democracy is the best form of government."

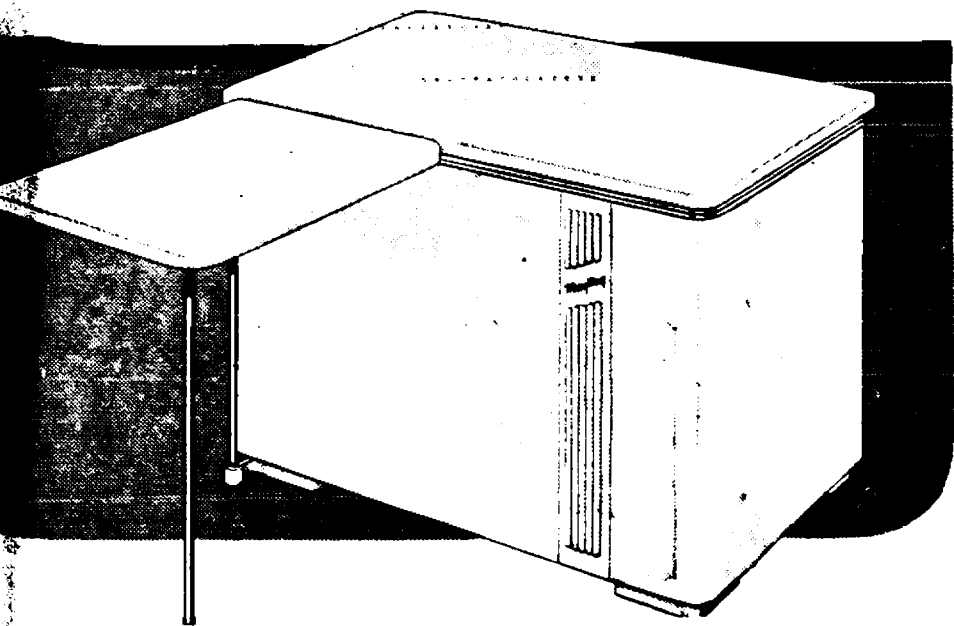
