WOODS COUNCIL SEEKS PAY

Board Approval Asked on Plans

Final approval by the Grosse Pointe of Education plans will get underway immediately for a drive sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association to secure funds to construct a half-million dollar public library on school property at the southeast corner of Kercheval and Fisher Road.

Grosse Pointe High School graduated 130 of its students, including 19 veterans, in traditional rites at the school auditorium Thursday evening before a capacity crowd of 600.

The ceremonies saw six outstanding students receive special awards from their principal, W. R. Cleminson. They were: Tom Willson, Florence Erringer, Robert Trees, Loraine Hewitt, Kyle Worley, and Robert Essert. The occasion marked the first graduation ceremony participation of John R. Barnes, as superintendent of schools.

Ideas growing out of their high school studies were expressed by the three student speakers whose addresses constituted a major portion of the program. Transcending Generosity

(AN EDITORIAL)

Seldom in the history of a community is a completely unselfish gesture for the benefit of that entire area made by an individual.

But, Mr. Murray W. Sales is that kind of an individual. And, this is not the first local project that has found him its benefactor.

About a year ago, Mr. Sales deeded his home to the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, to be used as a public library, and as a memorial to his wife, Jessie Carter Sales.

Mr. Sales was aware of the work the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association was doing in attempting to determine a suitable and fitting memorial to men and women of Grosse Pointe who served in World War II. And, Mr. Sales was perfectly agreeable to permit a World War II memorial to be worked out in conjunction with his original gift.

Meanwhile, it was learned that some \$100,000 would be required to remodel the present Sales property at Lincoln and E. Jefferson, to adapt it for library purposes. And, another \$100,000 would be required to build a War Memorial wing. Even with the \$100,000 expenditure for the renovation of the property, because of the expanding needs of the community, it might soon become inadequate.

With this thought in mind, members of the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association approached Mr. Sales to see if he would alter his original plans, while still permitting the indirect benefit of his original gift to remain with the community in the name of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education.

"Will Rogers of the Piano" Coming to Pierce Auditorium

Henry L. Scott, distinguished pianist and originator of Concert Humor, alternately described by music and drama critics as the "Will Rogers of the Piano" and the "World's Most Versatile Concert Pianist," will give a unique recital of classics, swing, and concert humor at the John D. Pierce Auditorium on Tuesday, February 10th, at 8:30 P.M. under the auspices of Grosse Pointe Community Lectures.

A distinguished concert pianist and brilliant interpreter of Chopin and Liszt, Henry Scott is at the same time an authority on modern popular styles. His recent Carnegie Hall concert was so eminently successful that they won nationwide praise from press, radio and national magazines including Collier's and Life's Kyle Crichton, foremost celebrity critic, in a feature article for Collier's of Scott's Carnegie Hall Concert, made the following comment: "His serious concert numbers stamped the audience; he panics them with his boogie-woogie; he plays like a whirlwind."

His musical training is almost entirely classical, while much of his ability and gift for swing interpretation has developed through a keen ear which enables him to closely imitate the styles of top flight pianists in the popular field. At one point in order to better understand South American rhythms, he got a job on a cruise ship and spent all his shore time haunting the dance halls of Colan, Nassau, and Trinidad. The result is he plays rumbas and tangos with a zest and rhythm rarely found in North American pianists. His work is constantly observed and studied by the greatest musicians and dramatics of our time.

Farms Primary Set For Feb. 9

Grosse Pointe Farms will hold a primary election, the first since 1943, on Monday, February 9 to eliminate two of the eight candidates seeking public office as village trustees.

The successful six will then enter the final election on March 8 in which three will be elected. It was announced by Harry S. Furton, village clerk, who stated that whenever there are more than two candidates for any one office a primary election is required by law.

Trustees seeking re-election are Richard L. Maxon, Neal S. McEachin and George L. Schlaepfer. Heading the opposition are Irving Winkler and Horace E. Farmer, who were both defeated by small margins in their bids for the same office last year.

The remaining three candidates never sought public office before. They are Henry Dey, 184 Moross, Gerald A. Keating, 205 Muir Road; and Thomas Anderson, 241 Ridgemont.

The March election will also find James K. Watkins, president, and Harry S. Furton, clerk facing opposition. Watkins, up for his sixth-one-year term meets a formidable political foe in Jack R. Sutton, Jr., former village trustee and police and fire commissioner.

Furton, in office since 1938, is opposed for re-election by Fred T. Kuehl, of 293 Moran Road. Kuehl, an accountant who moved into the village a little more than two years ago, is making his initial attempt for public office.

Two more new names, that will appear on the March ballot are Francis J. Hock, 257 McKinley, and L. M. (Joe) Reeves, 360 McMillan. Hock will attempt to oust Alonzo J. O'Connor as treasurer and Reeves will seek to take over Russell A. Labadie's responsibilities as assessor.

HARRY R. DEY, is a member of the Farms Better Government Association. A graduate of the University of Michigan, Mr. Dey is employment manager of United States Rubber Co. This is his first bid for public office. He lives at 184 Moross Road with Mrs. Dey and their two children.

HORACE E. FARMER of 167 Moross Road is a member of the Farms Better Government Assn., a production engineer, he has been very active in village interests. He was defeated by a narrow margin for the same office in last year's election. He has lived at the Moross address for more than 15 years with his family.

GERALD ARTHUR KEATING, 205 Muir Road, not affiliated with any political group. A tool and die engineer, Mr. Keating is making his initial attempt for public office. A resident at the aforesaid address with his family since 1940, he has been very interested in the village administration.

IRVING T. WINKLER, 258 Merrivether not a affiliated with any political group; endorsed by Farms Better Government Association. A construction engineer Mr. Winkler has lived in the Farms with his family for more than 25 years. In his bid for the same office last year he lost by four votes. He has been very active in civic affairs.

RICHARD L. MAXON, 350 Country Club Drive, veteran Pointe realtor, is seeking his third two-year term in office.

NEAL S. McEACHIN, 348 Hillcrest, who is seeking re-election to his second term as Trustee is another veteran village resident. His principal endeavor is display advertising.

GEORGE L. SCHLAEPFER, 251 MacMillan, also a veteran Farms resident. A research engineer, Mr. Schlaepfer has been in office since 1943.

The three incumbents are endorsed by leading Farms residents.

FARMS OFFICE CLOSED ON LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY
In observance of Lincoln's Birthday, the Grosse Pointe Farms village office will not be open on Thursday, Feb. 12.

However, the municipal office of Grosse Pointe Park, City Woods and Shores will be open for business as usual.

3 Villiage Issues Up To Voters

Grosse Pointe Woods voters will be asked by the council to approve on the following three issues at the village election, March 8.

1—An amendment calling for an annual salary of \$600 for the village president and \$400 each for the six village commissioners.

2—A \$400,000 bond issue to finance improvements and additions to the village municipal building.

3—The sale of village property on Mack near Huntington which has been used as a public park. It was purchased for \$44,000.

SET PRECEDENCE
The first issue, if approved, will set a precedence as village officers have never been compensated for their efforts.

The Woods council, in placing the issue on the ballot, feels that the conducting of the village business requires so much time and effort of each official that he should receive some small reimbursement.

According to Alois A. Ghesquiere, village president, approximately 40 village meetings are held every year, each requiring about 3 hours to conduct.

Add to these meetings, he said, "numerous other special sessions and each officer has virtually all of his time outside of his principal endeavor occupied.

Regarding the second proposal the council contends that the present municipal building which houses the village office, and the police and fire departments is inadequate for the growing needs of the community.

The \$400,000 will be used for general improvements which include increasing the office space and enlarging the quarters for the police and fire departments.

SELL AT PROFIT
Through a favorable vote on the third issue, the council will be able to negotiate for profitable disposition of the 44 acres of property in the best interest of the village.

This property, used as a recreation center, is no longer needed now that the village has a spacious lakefront park.

Voters will also be asked to elect a president and three commissioners. Mr. Ghesquiere, who is completing his ninth-one-year term as president announced that he will seek re-election.

The present commissioners whose terms expire will also act to remain in office. They are: Arthur Post, Albert Beever, and George W. Gardner.

Phillip Allard, village clerk, stated that no other candidate has filed. He added that the village will not have a primary election.

Farms Better Gov't Group Backs Sutton

The Farms Better Government Association, which has been highly critical of the present village administration, will support Jack Sutton, Jr. for village president in the election, March 8.

It was announced by R. E. Moran and George Tremblay, officials of the party. They said that their party dropped plans of naming their own candidate when it was learned that Mr. Sutton would run against James K. Watkins, incumbent, seeking his sixth-one-year term as village head.

Mr. Sutton, former Farms Trustee and Police and Fire commissioner announced his candidacy for president last week.

The Better Government Association also announced its support of Fred Kuehl for village clerk; Francis J. Hock for treasurer; and Russell Labadie to be retained as assessor.

In the primary election for trustees, the group endorses Horace E. Farmer, Irving T. Winkler and Harry Dey.

Accident Wrecks School Wagon

John Lunley, of 1900 Lennon driving of Grosse Pointe Country Day School station wagon, struck a car driven by Hugh A. Delfs, 419 Touraine, on Merrivether near Ridge Road.

Farms Police estimated damages to the station wagon at \$500 and to Mr. Delfs' car at \$150. Police reported that each party agreed to take care of his damages. Mr. Lunley is employed at the school.

Fuel Shortage Hits Library

The Grosse Pointe Public Library will close at 6 p.m. on Saturday evenings, beginning Saturday, Feb. 7th. This change in library hours is necessitated by the present shortage of fuel oil.

The library, located at 15150 Kercheval is a wing of the Pierce Junior High School. Since the building is not in use for any other purpose Saturday evenings, closing the library at 6 p.m. will make possible a definite saving in money and fuel.

Gentlemen:

Since I deeded my home at the corner of East Jefferson and Lincoln Avenues, City of Grosse Pointe, to you I have been informed of the possibilities of their being developed a civic project for the whole Grosse Pointe area whereby a war memorial library contributed by private subscription could be erected on property owned by you at the intersection of Kercheval Avenue and Fisher Road. I am greatly interested in this proposal and in order that you may in no way be embarrassed in relation to any feeling of responsibility towards me or towards my estate in connection with the use of the property which I deeded to you, I have felt it desirable to advise you that you are entirely without any obligation to me or to my representatives to utilize this property for library purposes. I also want to have you feel no sense of obligation in relation to naming or memorializing any part of the whole of such a proposed war memorial library in the name of Jessie Carter Sales. If you see fit to memorialize her name in any part of such a structure, I shall, of course, be greatly honored as would members of my family and friends, but I want you to feel no sense of obligation in respect thereto.

You may be assured of my good wishes and full cooperation in respect to any such proposed plan of this nature, and I certainly feel that from the standpoint of memorializing those of our young people who have served their country as well as creating a useful and beautiful structure in the Grosse Pointe Township, we should all lead our encouragement to any such proposal.

Although no definite architectural plans for the proposed Grosse Pointe War Memorial Library have been determined, it is the intention of the sponsors that an impressive rotunda would be incorporated in the main entrance, carrying suitable memorials to service men and women and their war records alongside tribute to those who gave their lives in conflict.

It has also been aptly pointed out that the structure will be so designed as to permit the addition of wings to the original building, which may be donated as memorials later or be built by some method, as the growth of the community demands.

Housed in the proposed memorial, most appropriately, would be Grosse Pointe historical data and records, as well as any relics or mementos of the early days of this community.

It has also been hinted that it is not impossible that many valuable private libraries or collections may be donated to the care of the library, once a suitable structure is in sight.

The letter accompanying the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association's petition to the Board of Education, along with the petition, is reprinted below:

We have in mind, at the present time, to raise approximately \$500,000. This amount, however, will have to be more definitely determined at a later date when planning has further progressed.

Woods Council Disposes of \$72,000 Bonds

Grosse Pointe Woods' council disposed of the \$72,000 bonds issued to finance the purchase of the Edsel Ford property, to a Detroit investment company.

The Ford property was purchased by the village in September, 1946 for \$60,000. The balance was appropriated by the council to be used in converting the private acreage to a lakefront park for the community.

Earlier disposition of the bonds was held up due to a lengthy legal conflict with St. Clair Shores officials who tried to prevent the Woods from buying the property, which is located in St. Clair Shores.

However, the State Supreme Court ruled in favor of the Pointe community.

Cold Wrecks Village Water Main, Lights

Due to a damaged water main on Roosevelt Place, between Jefferson and Charles Place, residents in that area had no water for more than 48 hours.

Grosse Pointe City officials blamed the zero weather for the trouble which started late Monday night.

Officials said that emergency crews worked day and night to repair the damage. They hoped to have it cleared by early Wednesday.

Cold weather was also held responsible for impairing the traffic lights in Grosse Pointe City Sunday night. Special crews were assigned to repair them.
