### Sought Fun Boys Tell Principal

Seven Grosse Pointe High School students confessed this week to maliciously destroying a large number of school windows. They admitted their action to Charles Saltzer, assistant principal of the school, who has been conducting a special investigation since last August when 75 windows were broken. "We just wanted to have some fun and excitement, was the only explanation the youths offered for their action" said Mr. Saltzer. He said that although they denied breaking all the 75 windows, they will be forced to pay for the entire damage, estimated at \$200. Saltzer conducted his investigation after the Farms Police complied with his request that he be given free reign in handling the matter.

Terming that Grosse Pointe Woods' voters were mis-informed and that the the Lakefront Park is rapidly proving to be an ill-advised purchase, George M. Burgess, Woods councilman is highly opposed to sale of the Mack Avenue Park Site.

The statements were made in a letter to the Review from Burgess. The Woods Council has asked the voters for permission to dispose of the Mack Avenue Park in favor of the Lakefront Park site. The matter will be decided at the March 8 election.

### SERIOUS BLUNDER

In his letter, Burgess pointed out that the development of the Lakefront Park at the expense of the Mack Avenue Park site would be a serious blunder. He said, that real estate operators are sitting back and quietly hoping for favorable action on this proposition. They would welcome the opportunity to develop the Mack Avenue Park Site into a residential and business lots. They are more interested in the profit to themselves than the benefit to the local residents. Paul W. Rowe, who is a member of the council and who conducts a real estate business in the village could not be reached by the Review for comment.

### ALL IN FAVOR

However Philip Allard, Village Clerk said all members of the council with the exception of Burgess voted that the sale of the Mack Avenue Park Site proposal be placed on the ballot. Allard said that Burgess was not present at the council meeting when this action took place. Instead of selling the Mack Avenue Park, Burgess recommends that the Lakefront Park be sold and the money used to install a beautiful swimming pool at the Mack Park to assure safe and season-long swimming.

Burgess said that he was against the acquisition of the Edsel Ford Property from the very beginning. He added that he was fully convinced that the property would never be a desirable bathing location until the sewage and pollution problems are overcome.

### PRINT LETTER

The Village purchased the Lakefront Park site in 1945, for \$60,000 in 1946. The Mack Park was bought in 1945 for \$42,000. Following is the Councilman's letter:

### GET YOUR CHEST X-RAY

## 10,000 Expected To Board Health Train In Pointe's Fight Against Tuberculosis

Grosse Pointe's Health Train—the X-Ray Mobile Trailer is rolling along in the community's fight against tuberculosis. During the first seven days of the survey more than 2,000 persons 15 years of age and over have taken chest X-rays here.

Officials of the Township Health Department, Wayne County Health Department and the TB and Health Society, who are engineering the four-week survey are hopeful that final tabulation will exceed the 10,000 mark. According to officials those who have taken the examination can expect to receive a report from the Health Department in approximately ten days.

### PARK SURVEY ENDS

Meanwhile the trailer will complete its ten-day schedule in Grosse Pointe Park on Feb. 20. From there it will roll to Grosse Pointe City to begin a five-day stay on Tuesday, Feb. 21.

Dr. Thomas S. Davies, Pointe Health Commissioner who is spearheading the local drive was highly pleased with the co-operation received from organizations and individuals. "Members of the Mothers' Health Education Council, the High School Mother's Club, the American Association of University Women, the Parent Teachers Association's Visiting Nurses Ass'n, church groups, and the many others who have volunteered their services have done an outstanding job in making this community project possible," said Dr. Davies. "The sponsoring organizations extend their gratitude for the untiring efforts of the hundreds who have participated in house to house calls, who are assisting as receptionists and typists, and who have scheduled speakers and movies."

### Ex-Governor Brucker May Keynote Memorial Drive

Grosse Pointe's temporary War Memorial, now located at the corner of Fisher and Grosse Pointe Boulevard, will be moved to the site of the proposed half million dollar Grosse Pointe Memorial Library at the corner of Fisher and Kercheval, if the Board of Education gives its consent. This action came first on the agenda of the meeting of the Honor Roll Association last Friday night, which was called for the purpose of mapping strategy for the fund-raising campaign to finance the memorial to Grosse Pointe men and women who saw service in World War II.

### Woods President Acts In Gala Premiere Opening of New Theatre

Thousands of Grosse Pointers as well as Detroiters from all parts of the city thronged the "Woods" section of the gala opening Wednesday night of the beautiful new Woods Theatre located at Seven Mile road and Mack roads. Promptly at 6:45 p. m. Grosse Pointe Woods Council President Alois Ghesquiere snipped the white satin ribbon across the entrance and officially signaled the opening of the theatre as he congratulated United Detroit Theaters President E. J. Hudson.

Opening attractions were "Crossfire" starring Robert Mitchell, Robert Ryan and Robert Young, plus "Little Iodine." Seating 2500, all on one floor the Woods Theatre rates as one of the most beautiful neighborhood theatres in America. It is the newest and most modern home of motion picture entertainment with the latest scientific improvements in acoustics, plus facilities for large screen theatre Television when it is available. It has double-comfort de-luxe seats and an unusual feature, new portable sound receivers for the hard-of-hearing, usable in any seat in the theatre. The Woods is the first theatre in

America equipped with this unusual feature.

**FIRST "SALON"**  
Another "first" is the grand lobby salon which presents each week startling and different exhibits including products of interest to all home owners. First exhibit is sponsored by J. L. Hudson Company and is a smart spring clothing display. Others will present home design, furnishing and economics, home landscaping, flower and garden culture, student accomplishments in art and manual training crafts, previews of new automobile models and so forth.

Other distinctive features include the largest paved auto parking lot in the mid-west. The main lobby of the theatre is 100 feet long by 60 feet wide with walls covered in copper cloth. Located on the left is the exhibit salon and on the right the concession bar, modernistic in appearance and finished completely in white leather. Tan and blue ceiling and cove are lighted by colored neon tubing, with an ornamental chandelier suspended in the center of the ceiling reflecting into a mirror wall. Doors entering the foyer from the lobby form the rest of the entrance background in a solid green Formica, trimmed in silver.

**Foyer Opens**  
The foyer opens into the auditorium, separated by a glass stanchion rail. The walls of the foyer are painted Old Rose and blue with a very pale yellow ceiling with lower half in maroon. The 2500 streamlined new-comfort seats in the auditorium are upholstered in blue Mohair. Walls are painted in blue blending into the drapes at the front of the auditorium which are in blue and upper colors extending along the walls through to the stage. The ceiling of the auditorium is in a dark maroon with coves in pale yellow lighted by varicolored neon. The latest "Voice of the Theatre" sound includes a new invention for those hard of hearing, a Telesonic system. The picture screen is one of the largest plastic mold screens in any theatre in this area (30' x 28'). Projection is the latest in Simplex International.
