The GAS SHORTAGE

What caused it? What is being done about it?

STATEMENT BY HENRY FINK, PRESIDENT, MICHIGAN CONSOLIDATED GAS COMPANY

as a Witness under oath in the Congressional Investigation of the Natural Gas Shortage before the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, in Washington, D. C., February 10, 1948.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

My name is Henry Fink. I am President of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company which is the distributing company serving gas to 625,000 customers in Detroit and other large Michigan cities. The reason it is impossible to furnish an adequate supply of natural gas in severe winter weather

to Detroit and other areas served by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company can be explained in a few words.

From

Consolidated is entirely dependent for its natural gas supply upon Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company. We have a contract for a daily maximum delivery of 125 mil-No Increase lion cubic feet in Detroit. Since our demand in winter months runs frequently more than 200 million cubic feet per day, we have sought in vain to obtain an increased supply of natural gas from Panhandle. We have been unable to get an agreement to supply more gas from Panhandle for three reasons:

Panhandle 1. It has been the announced consistent policy of Panhandle to sell as much gas as possible direct to industries on its lines instead of through distributing companies, such as Michigan Consolidated, because such direct sales have not been regulated as to rates by any public authority and were more profitable to Panhandle than sales

at regulated rates. 2. It has been Panhandle's policy to operate its lines at as nearly 100% load factor as possible, that is, at uniform full capacity, and therefore to avoid supplying distributing companies with their peak winter requirements. This has forced Michigan Consolidated and other distributing companies to maintain expensive manufacturing equipment and storage capacity so as to be able to manufacture gas in the winter to meet peak loads. This requires distributing companies to sell large quantities of gas at a loss since, for example, Michigan Consolidated's manufacturing costs are approximately \$1.65 per thousand cubic feet, which gas is sold at an average of 70c. 3. Panhandle has failed to increase the capacity of its lines, although during the last two years its lack of capacity to serve customers has been so serious that, under authority of the Federal Power Commission, sales under firm contracts for industrial

users had to be curtailed in order to supply domestic users with essential service. After fruitless efforts to obtain an increased supply of gas from Panhandle, Michigan Consolidated and its parent, American Light and Traction, were forced to undertake the project of bringing a new supply of gas into Michigan. Application for the construction of the Michigan-Wisconsin pipeline from Texas to Michigan and New Supply of Wisconsin was filed with the F. P. C. early in 1945 and a certificate granted by Natural Gas

the Commission November 30, 1946. At the present time, the pipelines from For Michigan Texas to Austin Field, Michigan, and from Austin Field to Detroit are under construction. The operation of these lines offers the only prospect of relieving the customers of Michigan Consolidated from annual serious shortages of gas. Yet, Panhandle has fought and is fighting the construction of this pipeline. Panhandle fought us before the F. P. C. and now on appeal in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. Panhandle fought us before the Securities and Exchange Commission, trying to stop the financing of these pipelines. Panhandle has claimed and still claims a legal right to maintain a monopoly Claims Right

of natural gas supply into Michigan, despite its utter inability and unwillingness To Monoply to supply enough gas necessary to meet the essential requirements of Michigan consumers. Michigan Consolidated has tried every winter to manufacture enough gas, at excessive cost, to supply its consumers on days when the natural gas supply was pitifully inadequate. We planned carefully to meet these needs this winter. We had the necessary oil under con-

Solution to Adequate Gas

tract, but we have been unable to obtain prompt deliveries because of transportation difficulties. We will continue to suffer the heavy losses caused by manufacturing gas and selling it at less than half of its high cost, but no company can serve customers at a loss indefinitely. The hope of Detroit and other Michigan communities to obtain an adequate supply of gas at reasonable rates rests entirely upon
