Grosse Pointe boys and girls will take part in one of the most eventful days in the history of the community Saturday, April 3 when they fill the Pierce School auditorium to see WJR's musical extravaganza "Make Way For Youth."

Lions To Fete All-Star Group at GPYC Banquet

Immediately after the WJR coast to coast "Make Way For Youth" radio show at the Pierce School Auditorium, Saturday, April 3, the Grosse Pointe Lions in co-operation with this newspaper will fete the Grosse Pointe All-Star Basketball Squad, their coaches, school officials and prep sports writers at a banquet at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club.

WJR in co-operation with the Grosse Pointe Review is bringing the program here as a public service to the community. It will mark the first time a network program will originate in Grosse Pointe.

Doors will open at 3:15 p.m. and all persons are asked to be in their seats by 3:45. No seats will be reserved.

Following the broadcast, a half-hour of entertainment will be presented under the direction of WJR's Mark Haas.

The popularity of this colorful WJR show which features Don Large's 65 voice "Accent on Youth" chorus and a host of other talented youngsters, was indicated last week when the supply of 1000 free tickets was virtually exhausted 24 hours after the Review announced their availability.

The Review regrets that the Pierce Auditorium's seating capacity is a little less than 1000 and that there are no more tickets left.

A major portion of the tickets were distributed by principals of public, parochial and private schools. They used this means to reward some of the students who have been of particular service to the schools and the community.

A limited supply was also distributed to adults who called at the Review's office.

During the post-show program, the Review's Grosse Pointe All-Star Basketball Squad will receive special recognition.

Besides the "Accent On Youth" chorus which includes the sweet voice of Majorie Reyst, of 461 Belanger Road, the "Make Way For Youth" broadcast will feature Paul Lavole's 24-piece orchestra, "The Double Daters" and Earl Scott, trumpeter.

Junior League Names Director

Mrs. James McEvoy, Jr., president of the Grosse Pointe Junior League received national honors Tuesday when she was named director of Region Four of the Junior League of America.

In her new position, Mrs. McEvoy will preside over 17 Junior Leagues in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

Mrs. McEvoy, who completes her two-year term as head of the local group in April, was named by committees representing each of the Junior League units concerned.

News of the appointment was disclosed at a League meeting held Tuesday noon at the Country Club.

Pointe Plans New Time

Grosse Pointe will adopt daylight savings time on Saturday, April 24 by moving up the time one hour.

Though no official action has been taken on the issue, it was the opinion of local officials that the only practical thing for Grosse Pointe communities to do was to in accord with Detroit's time.

The Motor City council approved the new time last week. Grosse Pointe governing bodies are expected to officially approve on daylight savings time at future meeting.

District Sells Old Trombly School Property for \$46,000

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education announced the sale of the Old Trombly School property on Jefferson Avenue near Beaconsfield this week. The property was sold to the Sun Oil Company at a price of \$46,000 net to the school district.

"The Board of Education is greatly pleased that this Jefferson Avenue frontage has been sold under terms which we believe are very favorable to the school district," said Bert H. Wicking, President of the Board of Education. "The Board has been anxious to see this property returned to the tax rolls for many years," continued Mr. Wicking. "We have refused to sell the property, however, until we could be certain that the school district was receiving a price consistent with the value of Jefferson Avenue frontage."

The Board of Education will continue to use the old school building at the rear of the property for at least one more year at a nominal rental under a lease negotiated with the new owner. The building has been used in recent years as a storage and work center for the plant maintenance activities of the school district. Continued use of the building for one or two years for such purposes will enable the Board of Education to work out other arrangements for housing this maintenance work. The use of the building by the school district will not interfere with the development of the property by the Sun Oil Company.

Editorial writer and Military Critic of the Detroit News.

Mrs. Lloyd G. Hooker, president of the Friends of Grosse Pointe Public Library and one of the vice-chairmen of the War Memorial drive fund will preside at the meeting.

Mr. Charles A. Parcels, member of the Board of the Friends will bring the community up to date on the plans for the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Library.

Invitations have been sent to the members of the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Library, but all civic minded residents are urged to attend.

Villages Study Health Services

Wayne County Board of Health Officials attended a special Farms Council meeting Monday with the possibility of the County replacing the present Grosse Pointe Township health service.

The County officials were present at the meeting at the request of President Watkins. Also present were Dr. T. S. Davies, Township Health Commissioner, Sidney Morgan, City Commissioner and Thomas Jeffries, Shores superintendent.

Dr. David Littlejohn, Wayne County Health Commissioner explained to the council that the County would be able to provide complete health service to the Farms community at no extra cost other than the regular taxes the community pays to the County.

Currently the Farms is paying approximately \$6,000 annually to the Township for its share toward supporting its \$25,000 a year health department.

Dr. Littlejohn stated that it would not be practical for the County to accept jurisdiction of the Farms unless the other Pointe communities also accepted its service.

He said that the Board could not accept any additional responsibilities unless their annual budget was increased.

At the present time the County Board of Health has jurisdiction over all cities and communities in Wayne County with the exception of Detroit, Highland Park, Dearborn and Grosse Pointe, which have their health departments.

A breakdown of the cost per person for the County Health service was estimated at \$1.00 per year by Dr. Littlejohn. This figure is somewhat higher than the 70 cents per person the local communities are paying to the Township.

The County Health service does not include the same extensive health program conducted in the schools by Dr. Davies and his staff.

Any vaccination and examination for school children would be done by private physicians at extra cost.

Dr. Littlejohn explained that in the event the Pointe communities accept the County Health Service, a branch office would have to be established somewhere near here.

The County's main office is located in Dearborn. Also heard at the meeting was Morten Hilbers, Sanitation Engineer Department.

The Farms Council and the other Pointe governing bodies plan to study the matter further.

However those who knew the good-looking Dudley, who possessed a sparkling personality and an easy-to-get-along-with nature, knew that this was not true. They knew that there was a tragic yet inspiring story behind the news items. A story that busy city news reporters missed.

U.S. Postal Officials To Survey

Representative Harold F. Youngblood (R.Mich.) the Congressman from Michigan's 14th District which includes Grosse Pointe announced that he has conferred with officials of the Post Office Department regarding the erection of a Post Office building in Grosse Pointe, possibly in the vicinity of Kercheval between Fisher and Muir Road.

Representative Youngblood cited the great need for additional postal facilities in this area and strongly urged the Post Office Department to take immediate action for the erection of the necessary building.

The 4th Assistant Postmaster General, with whom the Congressman conferred has assured a Post Office investigation into the necessity for and extent of the proposed building and upon the completion of the postal investigation the Federal Works Agency will proceed to estimate the cost of the proposed building.

This action by high government and postal officials is the result of a 4-year campaign by Norbert Neff, veteran Grosse Pointe City Clerk, to have an adequate post office here to meet the increasing needs of Grosse Pointe.

Neff is the father of the little post office on Maumee near St. Clair which has done over \$500,000 since the office was officially established in 1944.

In a recent letter to Congressman Youngblood, Mr. Neff stated that the present post office which is staffed by three men is highly over-taxed as it tries to service the Township's population of 38,000.

He added that if the present building boom continues, the population of Grosse Pointe will exceed 100,000 within the next several years.

"Our community definitely needs a large post office with off-the-street parking facilities," explained Mr. Neff, "and the time to act is now."

An extensive survey conducted by Mr. Neff and postal officials approximately four years ago disclosed that the area near the Punch and Judy Theatre on Kercheval avenue would be most ideal as a post office location.

Their survey also indicated that the construction of a building to accommodate all postal service requirements and off-the-street driveways and parking would cost approximately \$50,000.

When the survey was undertaken in 1944, the government was intending to let some private contractor erect the building. However, due to the great material and labor shortages, contractors shunned the project completely.

APRIL MARKS 100TH YEAR FOR TOWNSHIP

Grosse Pointe Township is 100 years old on Thursday, April 1 — and that's no April's Fool's joke son!

According to statistics offered by Norbert Neff, Grosse Pointe City clerk and veteran resident, this area broke away from Hamtramck Township on April 1, 1848 and founded the local administration.

The township at that time comprised property east of Bevilacqua Avenue to Macomb County and North east to Gratiot.

4. Progressive change in color or size of a wart, mole or birthmark.
5. Persistent indigestion.
6. Persistent hoarseness, unexplained cough, or difficulty in swallowing.
7. Any persistent change in normal bowel habits.

(Continued from Page 1) The promise in the water was so recognized that he was placed on the Life Guard staff at Grosse Pointe Park. Mrs. Gustafson related how her son unable to join his friends in golf, tennis and other sports concentrated on his music.

Despite his disappointment, he was still the life of any party he attended — the younger set marveled at his piano playing.

At home his parents arranged a special board on his bed to accommodate his ailing hip. They also kept the home as quiet as possible whenever he was home from his studies at the University of Michigan.

Mrs. Christensen explained that whenever he was in pain any little noise would upset him.

NORMAL BOY She also mentioned the many long chats she and her son had together. How she learned so much about her boy and how typical he was of any normal American boy of a normal mind and body as far as girls were concerned.

He wanted to go steady with his girl and had her set up religious differences he thought it best not to get too serious with her. He decided to stop seeing her regularly.

Dorley left her at 10:30 p.m. on the night of his death. He returned to his room at home for a good night's rest in preparation for a busy week-end of parties and fun.

"Right then," said Mrs. Christensen who holds a college degree, "something must have happened. Perhaps those pains came back stronger than ever, for signs then Dorley decided definitely that life was not worth living. He picked up the gun and shot himself."

Besides his parents who were in Florida at the time of his death, Dorley is survived by an older sister, Mrs. David Womack, of Lakeland, Fla.

The council however could not do any business with Mr. Reeves since he held status which forbids village officials from receiving any village business. 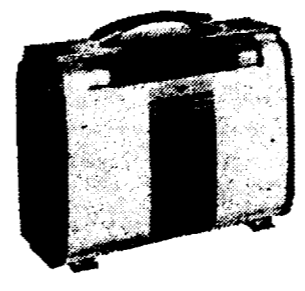
