## These Street Cars Mark Happier Period In Community's History



Many Grosse Pointe oldtimers and young-old timers will observe Saturday, May 1 with sentimental discussions of the old Shore Line Interurban street car service which was ordered discontinued on May 1, twenty years ago. The Shore Line, which marks a happier period in our local history, is remembered by them for the highly personalized service rendered by the platform men and others operating the cars that our present hurried mode of life will not allow. They will recall the street car above with its popular conductors Salton, left, and Doan. Its run on Grosse Pointe Blvd., included stops at the early road houses famous for their chicken dinners. On the lower left is the Shore Lines' freight car which was another usual sight in Grosse Pointe. On the lower right is the family car, often used by Pioneer Painters for the Sunday outing. ## Old Interurban Service Lingers In Memories Of Pointe Old-Timers

The old actually began at Fisher and Jefferson, connecting with the Detroit "Grosse Pointe" branch cars to down town Detroit, and locally it ran along Grosse Pointe Boulevard to West Lane, thence along the lake edge and parallel to the shore to Lakeside, then a popular spot at the foot of Cranley Boulevard to Mount Carmel, where it connected with the important RAPID RAILWAY line extending through from Detroit to Four Huron. Prior to the consolidation of city and interurban lines in 1900, the Grosse Pointe-Shore Line had operated under names such as "Detroit and Lake St. Clair" and "Detroit Lake Shore and Mount Clemens" Lines.

The turn of the century brought about an amalgamation of many of the interurban lines operating from Detroit, and a network of electric lines radiating to many of the important cities within a radius of 100 miles was thus formed, providing fast, comfortable service to the patrons who steadily increased in number. The agencies adopted the general name Detroit United Railway and its fine service connected with our state interurbans in many directions affording fine service to such points as Saginaw, Sandusky, Toledo, Cleveland and Norwalk, Ohio, and numerous other towns. The able leadership of Mr. Jere C. Hutchinson and Mr. Frank W. Brooks together with Mr. Allen S. Saperstein and other Grosse Pointers, most of whom are now deceased, was reflected in the continued progress of the system including the SHORE LINE.

Noted among the many stopping places along the Line were the early road houses famous for chicken, frog and fish dinners, including Dobsons at Fisher and Jefferson, John Neff's Hotel, the

### PTA To Support War Fund

Several forward steps were taken during the past week in preparation for Grosse Pointe's drive for a War Memorial Library which will be launched on Decoration Day and be carried through July 4 by the War Memorial Library Fund.

The overall plan for solicitation is fast taking form with a chairman being selected for each village who will be responsible for block leaders and workers, operating under the supervision of the Fund and Red Cross drives.

### Discuss Local Health Problem With County

Wayne County Health Commissioner Dr. David Littlejohn appeared before the Park Council Monday and explained just what service his department was able to offer to the village.

He appeared at the request of the Park Council which is not satisfied with the present Township Health Department.

Other officials present were Harry Furtan, Farms clerk; Murray Smith, Farms engineer and Thomas Jetties, Shores superintendent.

Carl Schweickart, Township Supervisor, and Dr. T. S. Davies, Township Health Commissioner, were not invited.

Dr. Littlejohn said that though his staff at the present time was inadequate to handle a complete sanitation service which includes all phases of proper sewage disposal, water tests, food handlers examination and regular inspection tours of business places.

Dr. Littlejohn pointed out that according to the reports he has received from Park officials, proper sanitation service is the major problem here.

He added that the present health program conducted in the school by Dr. T. S. Davies, was a very adequate and a complete one and should not be altered in the least.

Regarding his remarks made before the Farms Council recently, Dr. Littlejohn indicated that it would not be practical to establish County service here unless three or more of the Pointe communities accepted it.

At the present time the five Pointe communities are paying a little more than \$25,000 annually for the Township Health Service, or approximately 70 cents per person in the area.

The major cost of the County service would be included in the regular County taxes which would be \$1.50 per person.

All of the communities with the exception of the Woods have indicated an interest in the County service.

Dr. Littlejohn explained that local communities could join forces with Grosse Pointe which is currently using the County service, to the establishment of a County district office here.

## Council Asks For \$961,915

The Grosse Pointe Park Council after lengthy consideration determined the budget for the fiscal year of April 1 to March 31, 1949 at \$961,915.

The figure represents the highest budget in the history of the village. It is \$73,710 more than last year's appropriation of \$888,205.

However the increase will not offset last year's individual rate of \$18.50. Highly responsible for the same individual tax rate despite the steady climb of administration cost is the additional revenue needed from the many new buildings erected in the village during the past 10 months.

The budget includes a \$21,545 pay raise to Park employees. Everett B. Lane, Park manager announced that a public hearing will be held in the municipal building on Monday, May 10 at 5 p.m. to hear any objections to the budget.

Following the hearing the council hopes to add final approval to the appropriation.

## Mack Detour To Cut-Off DSR Service

The Mack Avenue and the Vernon Express DSR Bus Service will begin and end at Mack and Cass streets, according to a DSR report.

This action was necessitated by the Mack Avenue widening which will affect detours of all East-bound traffic at Cadillac and West-bound traffic at Outer Drive.

The DSR cut-off and the detours are expected to continue until at least June 1. DSR officials took this action at the request of Ralph B. Netting, Grosse Pointe City mayor. He felt that DSR buses detouring through the City would ruin the residential streets.

Mayor Netting was also opposed a lighter shuttle bus service as proposed during a conference last week.

Most directly effected by the cut-off of the Mack lines which will use this service for their daily journey to downtown Detroit. Lakeshore Coach Line officials stated that they would place additional buses in service in the affected area if necessary.

Lakeshore Coach lines can be contacted at Chateaufort, Fisher Road and Mack east of Moran Road.

Weaver House; Fritz Rohdes; Kramers and Lake Side Inn below Mount Clemens. The attraction of the Lake with varied opportunities in bathing, fishing, sailing in the warm months and the very thrilling ice boat races in winter brought a great deal of patronage to the line. The early postoffices here such as Lodewick's COTTAGE GROVE; PAGES; LOCKES and CLAIRVIEW, were served by the SHORE LINE and the iron ribbons of its rail route were literally the thread of life for the interconnected communities enjoying the transportation afforded by the cars.

About 1912 the automobiles turned out by the Chalmers; Packard; Hudson and other great concerns began to filter into the possession of the average citizen and their increasing number brought about a demand for good roads. Accordingly, the Lake Shore road was hard surfaced and shortly after the Jefferson stretches through to Mount Clemens were improved. It might be said with certainty that the advent of "Good Roads" the FORD "MODEL T" and numerous other popular priced automobiles spelled the doom of the interurbans.
