A large number of Grosse Pointe City residents stormed the public hearing Monday evening held in the City Fire Department to vigorously oppose the council's plan to erect off-the-street parking areas in their neighborhoods.

The council proposes to establish these areas at Waterloo directly across from the Neighborhood Club and behind the business places on Kercheval between St. Clair and Cadieux. Both of the proposed areas will extend to approximately 300 feet from the curb.

It was the contention of the residents that came from St. Clair, Notre Dame and Neff roads that the proximity of the parking lots would not only decrease the value of their property but also create a day-long nuisance.

"Cars would be coming and going in and out all day long," asserted one gentleman. "We would seldom have any peace."
