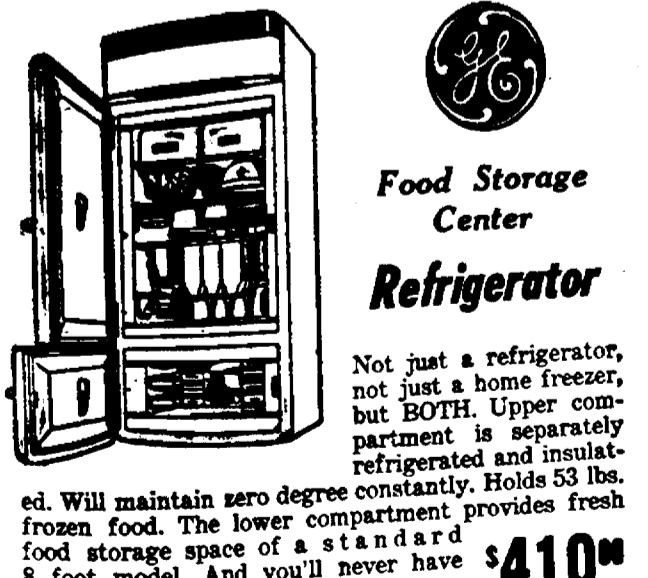

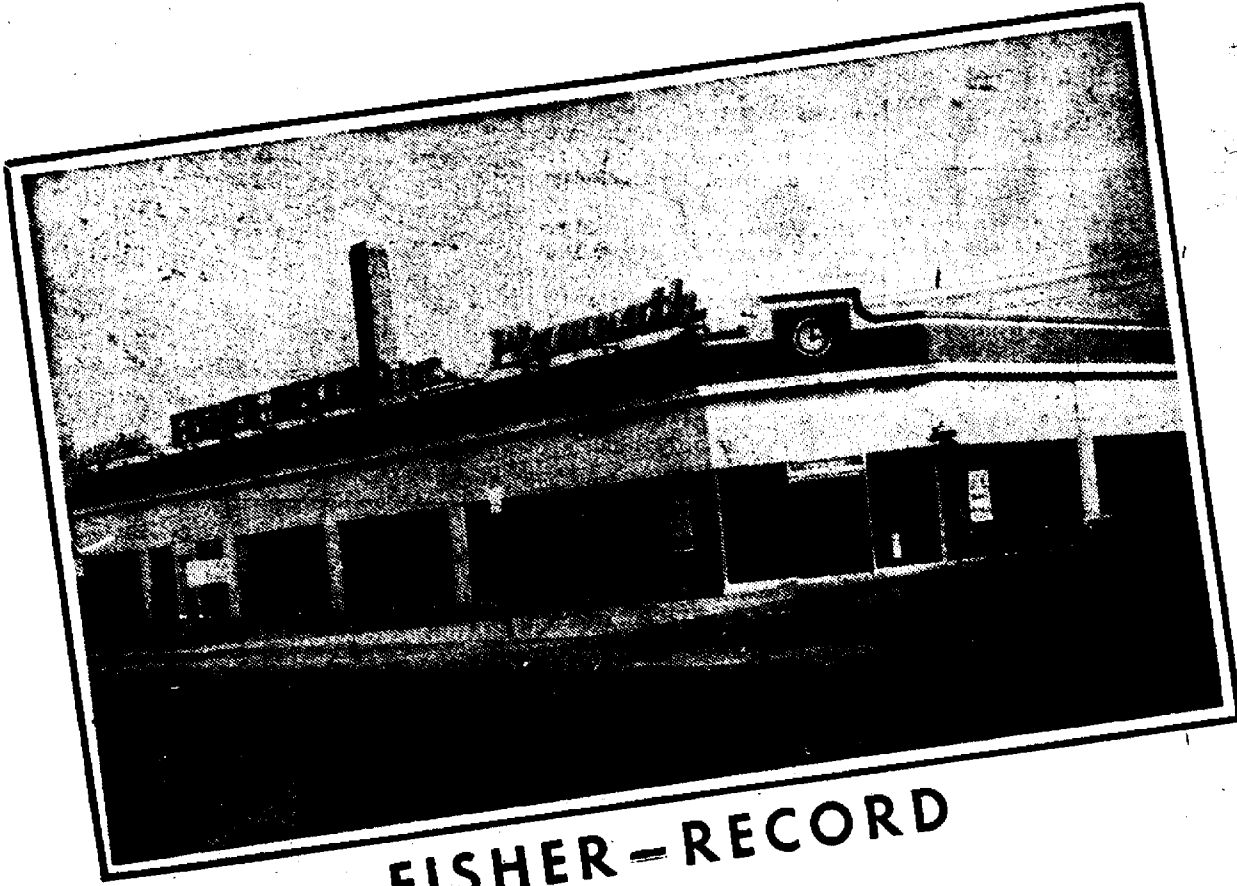

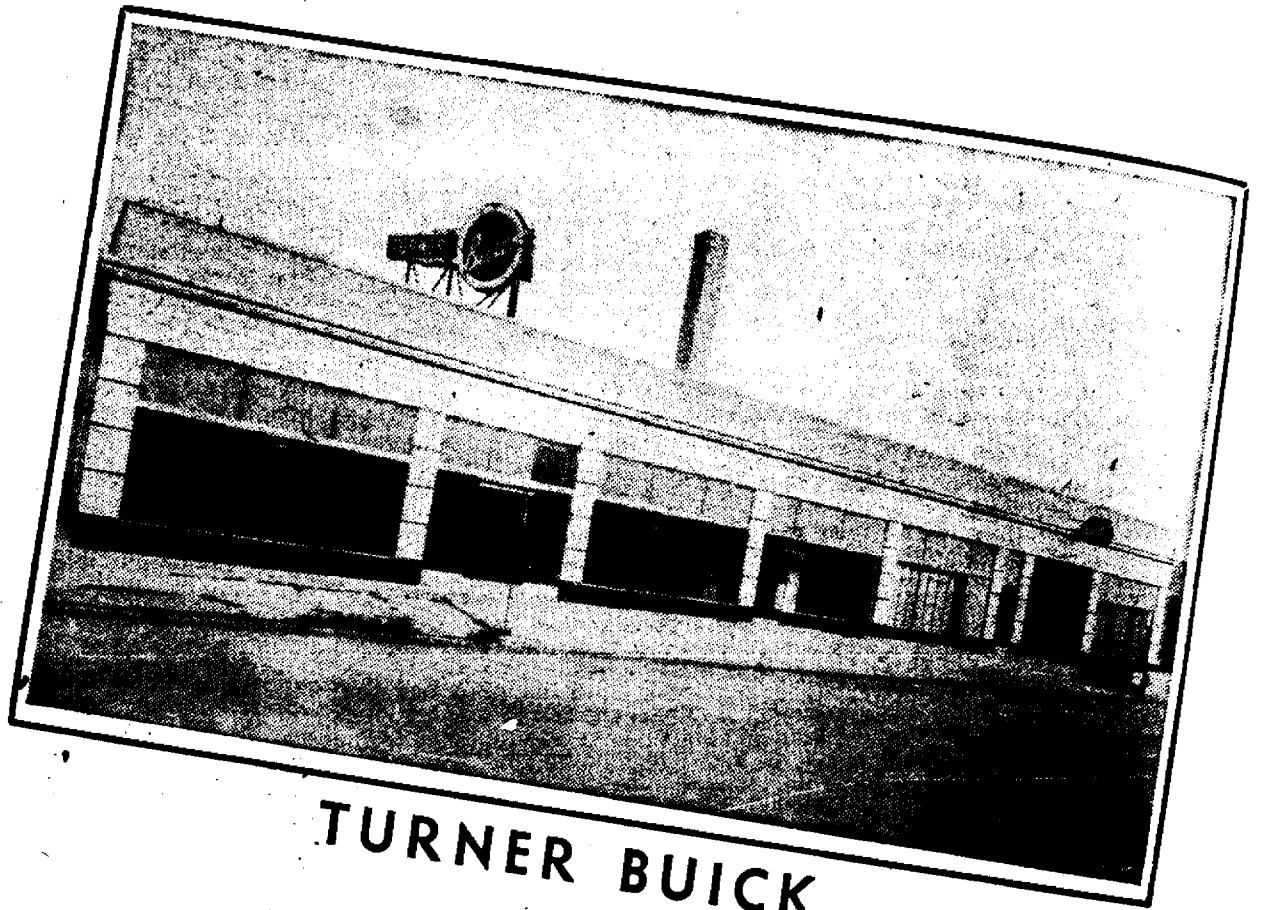

- Check transmission and differential lubricants—add if necessary.
- Drain and flush radiator—refill with correct amount anti-freeze.
