## Showing Surprises **Officials**

The most surprising element of the first peace time presidential election since 1940, was not the results but the sharp decline of Grosse Pointe voters after early indications pointed to a record turnout.

Don Goodrow, Grosse Pointe Township Clerk reported late Tuesday that out of 20,000 qualified electors in Grosse Pointe Township only 15,204 reported to the area's 26 precincts to cast their bal-

Norbert Neff, City of Grosse Pointe clerk stated that 3,496 out of 4,340 visited the City's lone

Both officials said that the turnout was far below the last presidential election in 1944, when Franklin Delano Roosevelt defeated Thomas Dewey.

Shortly after the polls opened, Goodrow Neff and other officials sensed an all time high as residents crowded the polls. One precinct in Grosse Pointe

Woods had 850 of its 1,000 votes cast before noon. Neff disclosed that four hours after the first vote was in more than 1600 had visited the City's

special booths in the Fire Department's building. The veteran official paid compliments to his election board members that kept voters moving

along at five per minute throughout the entire day. Goodrow could not give any reason for the comparatively small response in view of the early turn
