At the conclusion of the morning worship on Sunday, November 14th, the congregation of Pointe Congregational Church, meeting in Richard School, adjourned to their new church site at Chalfonte and Lothrop for a ground breaking ceremony in preparation for the erection of its new edifice.

The Grosse Pointe Congregational Church started in 1939 with an adult membership of eight. It was incorporated in 1940 with a membership of 17 and called its first and present minister, the Reverend Charles W. Scheid. Under his leadership the membership has increased to 383 and the church school to an enrollment of 190 children.

The new church will have a seating capacity of 425 and will cost an estimated \$178,000.00 including furnishings. The building was designed by George D. Mason Co., represented by David H. Williams, Jr., architects. The contract has been let to the C. Contract Has Co.

# BREAK GROUND FOR NEW CHURCH SITE Of Tickets

Lines Company will raise its bus fares in the five Grosse Pointe communities as soon as a present contract is terminated on December 31.

Tentative plans call for a straight cash rate, abolishing bus tickets.

This informations was disclosed by Walter Schweikart company president in letters to the five local muncipalities.

He said that the action was necessitated to meet wage increases needed by Lake Shore em-

"If we are to maintain a staff of competent and courteous drivers we must provide them with an income to meet today's high cost of living," the official dis-

Schweikart stated in his letter that Lake Shore drivers are paid less than operators with Detroit and other neighboring transportation systems. He invited each municipality to

send a representative to a joint meeting to be held within the next The new rate will be 15 cents straight in Grosse Pointe Park,

City and Farms; Shores and Woods passengers will pay 20 cents straight. The cash rate will replace the present ticket plan which enables Park, City and Farms riders to purchase ten tickets for \$1.35;

to buy ten tickets for \$1.85. Everyday users of the Lake Shore transportation service are of course the ones most vitally affected by the proposed plan.

Present single fares, school fares and inter-Pointe fares will remain the same.

The proposed plan marks the second time within a year, the company requested fare hikes. Last November the present rate was effected after considerable controversy between company

and municipal officials. At their meetings Monday, the Farms Council named Commissioner William Connolly and the City appointed Commissioner Ger-

ald Miller, to attend the meeting. Alois A. Ghesquiere, Woods president, said that he would attend the session. Park and Shores officials also plan to be present.
