Health Council Hears Physical Head of School

William V. Hicks, Physical Education Director of the Grosse Pointe Elementary School, was guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the Mother's Health Education Council held Tuesday, Nov. 10 at the home of Mrs. Lyndon Babcock on Ballou road.

The Council was formed at the request of Mr. Hicks and sanctioned by Dr. Paul Esner, former superintendent of public schools here. Mrs. Helene Lang, the school nurse, Mr. Forrest Geary, head of the Adult Education Department, and the P. T. A. Council. It was formed for the purpose of providing a link between the school and the home in carrying on a health education program, knowing that the work of the schools could not be effective without the cooperation of the parents.

The Council is composed of three delegates from each P.T.A. organization and the Grosse Pointe school clinic. Personnel from the Grosse Pointe health system or experts in other fields of health education are brought from them to assemble in a well and important information gained to the monthly Council meetings which is sent to the various schools for the pupils to take home to the parents.

In his talk, "Relationship of Physical Education to Health," Mr. Hicks defined the meaning of Physical Education, emphasizing on character education rather than the building of more muscle.

"Physical education can do a better job in social learning," said Mr. Hicks, "than any other subject because it is a doing program. In civics or social studies citizenship is discussed, however in adult life, for example, we know that we take turns only when it is to our advantage and not when it is to the advantage of the group as a whole. In physical education, it is organized games, etc., pupils do learn that goals can be accomplished only through cooperation and working together."

In conclusion Mr. Hicks said if the pupils enjoy an activity and it is not physical education, it is not physical education.

"Pointe on Parade" Marks Progress of Christ Church

Editor's Note: This is one of a series of illustrated articles entitled "Pointe on Parade" conducted by Leslie P. Young, a resident of Grosse Pointe. These feature stories and pictures of many of Grosse Pointe's first buildings and other centers marked with historical interest.

Christ Church in Detroit, located on Jefferson Avenue between Howard and Hastings Street. Under the direction of the Vestry, Rev. Francis B. Creamer started the church in this community with a Sunday School for thirty-five children who met in private homes in Grosse Pointe while the new church was being erected.

The building committee for the church consisted of the Hon. Charles B. Warren, Chairman, Sidney T. Miller, Charles Hedges, Julian H. Harris, Henry LeMay and Edgar B. Whitcomb.

The cornerstone of the new Christ Church, located at 61 Grosse Pointe Boulevard, was laid on September 30, 1928. Situated adjacent to the University of Michigan, it is widely acclaimed as an outstanding example of 16th Century Gothic architecture.

The exterior of the church is of Clearfield Stone of Indiana limestone. The interior of Indiana limestone. The Nave is copied from the Charter House of Wells Cathedral, Somerset, England and the Cloisters from the Canterbury Cathedral, England.

The church has a four man organ built by the famed Casavant Freres of Quebec, Canada. In the tower is installed a carillon of thirty-two bells, the largest of which weighs three thousand pounds and the smallest forty pounds. The bells were moulded in Croyden, England. On Sunday mornings, the clear tones of these magnificent bells give pleasure to listeners for miles around.

Because the church is built on two levels, an elevator has recently been installed to help the handicapped in their access to the church level without having to use the stairway. The church seats five hundred and fifty people, and a refectory in the undercroft and its adequate kitchen facilities, will comfortably accommodate and serve three hundred people for meals and entertainment.

Facing on the church yard, at the rear of the church, is the Rectory, of Elizabethan architecture, built in 1938, and the Sidney Miller Memorial Hall, constructed in 1938. The latter serves as a recreational hall for various parish groups and fills a vital community need. It houses Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Junior Club, Alcoholics
