Urge Vote For 1 City

Action is underway to consolidate the five Grosse Pointe municipalities into one city to be known simply as Grosse Pointe.

Grosse Pointe Township Supervisor, Carl Schweikart, disclosed that a group of residents (he temporarily withheld their flames) have organized to place the issue on the ballot at the Township election, Feb. 27.

According to Schweikart, the men plan to circulate petitions next week to obtain 400 signatures as required by law urging such a referendum.

The petition will then be given to the Wayne County Board of Supervisors who have the power to authorize that the matter be decided by voters of Grosse Pointe Park, Farms, Shores, Woods and the City of Grosse Pointe, the only non-member of the Township.

Schweikart, who is also Board of Supervisors chairman, stated that in the event that plans cannot be completed for the regular election, a special referendum will

He said that the Township board highly favored the consolidation of the five municipalities into one city, completely eliminating multiple administrations and

Schweikart added that this unification would give the taxpayers far more economical and efficient administration than the present system or the proposed plan of establishing five different

The Farms plans to place the question of withdrawing from the Township and establishing its own Township communities which

Each one of these factors is of vital importance to the people of Grosse Pointe. Each one, with the exception of the radio plan, will be presented to you voters for final

Consequently, it is up to you to make every effort to study and be fully informed of each problem.

Be sure the men you have chosen to guide your govgernment eliminate politics and act only in the best interests of the community.

Remember, this is not the time to sit back and let the officials carry the burden alone. It's up to you as a taxpaying citizen to study the problems we face and enter into discussions and attend meetings on these vital subjects.

Particular thought should be given to the plan enginsecred by several citizens to place the merger of the five municipalities on the Township ballot next February.

Before any action is taken on such an all-important proposal—a great deal of study and planning is needed. The cooperation of every citizen is essential if we are

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

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



Village of Grosse Pointe Woods NOTICE PUBLIC HEARING

"NOTICE is hereby given, in accorddance with the provisions of Act No. 207 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan for the year of 1921, as amended, that a public hearing will be had at the Municipal Building in the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods, Wayne County, Michigan, on the 18th day of January, 1949 at 8:00 o'clock p.m. Eastern Standard Time, upon a proposed Amendment to Ordinance No. 34 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods, adopted June 18, 1940, which proposed Amendment is as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 34 OF THE VIL-LAGE OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS. MICHIGAN ADOPTED JUNE 18, 1940. ENTITLED:

"An Ordinance to regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected, to regulate and determine the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, to limit and restrict the maximum number of families which may be housed in dwellings hereafter erected or altered, and for said purposes, divide the Village into districts, to provide a method of administration and to prescribe the penalties for the violation of its provisions." "The VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE

WOODS ORDAINS: Section 1. That Section 12 of Ordinance No. 34 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods, adopted on June 18, 1940, be amended to read as follows:

Section 12. Building and Land Use Specifically excluded in District "B" The following building and land uses are specifically excluded in District B, to-wit: Light and/or heavy manufacturing or industries of any description, laundries of any description, dry cleaning establishments, except those which are so constructed and operated so as to use carbon tetro chloride or per-chlor-ethelene or other similar or like non-cumbustible and non-inflammable solvent, and in which business not more than five employees shall be engaged, lumber yards, establishments where the sale of spirituous liquors and beverages by the glass except where such sale is incidental to the sale and serving of meals, is permitted, provided that dancing and entertainment shall be prohibited, bowling alleys, pool rooms billiard parlors, breweries, distilleries, amusement parks, dairies where milk is processed, markets for housing and marketing of live poultry, gasoline storage tanks above ground, refineries, trailer campe, refuse disposal plants or yards, outside storage of automobiless not including public parking lots, building supply yards, milk stations, establishments where poultry is raised, establishments or structures where pigeons are raised and/or housed, slaughter houses, establishments where animals are raised, housed and marketed for public consumption, roadside stands other than those in permanent structures, junk yards, illuminating gas plants and yards, advertising billboards and posters boards, except those designed to advertise the sale or lease of property upon which such sign shall be located. provided that not more than one sign shall be permitted on any one parcel of property nor shall any such sign exceed 100 square feet in area, storage of contracting equipment of any description, riding stables, riding academies, golf driving ranges, archery courts, open air theaters, open air roller rinks, all outdoor amusement enterprises where the conduct of such enterprise shall result in large assemblage of patrons, causing traffic hazards and congestion, and all other trades.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are expressly repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force

and effect. Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the public health. peace and safety and are hereby given immediate effect.




