### Residents Approve Proposal

A vote of thanks was given to the Farms Charter Commission by Farms residents at the public hearing last Thursday in the Farms Municipal building for their time and effort in drafting the proposed city charter.

This note of appreciation was led by William F. Connolly, Jr., Farms president, and James K. Watkins, former Farms' chief executive.

The capacity crowd of Farms municipal officials, professional men, business men, housewives and students that attended the hearing before the charter commission voiced no opposition to the charter to be placed before the electorate on December 12.

However, several questions were asked about the proposed charter which basically follows the accepted administration procedures without losing the benefits of the successful experiences of the Farms as a village.

Drawing major attention was the provision that empowers the seven-man council to name the city mayor, clerk, treasurer and auditor under the village government, these positions were elective.

The assemblage felt that too much power was being given to the council body.

Mr. Daniel Goodenough, chairman of the commission, explained that in the proposed charter the mayor's office does not mean anything more than a presiding chairman at council meetings. He will not have any more authority than any man on the council.

"Besides, a mayorality race would draw our most able council members—one would be elected, the other, also a valuable

### Farms Parking Meters 'Open for Business'

Parking meter regulations became effective in the Kercheval business district of Grosse Pointe Farms Thursday morning, Nov. 10, it was announced by Farms Police Chief Walter Hoyt.

He said meter regulations will prevail from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily, Sundays and holidays excluded.

Ninety-one meters have been installed on Kercheval between Cadieux and McMillan.

The coin machines will take both pennies and nickles; the parking rate is five cents per hour or one cent for 12 minutes.

Chief Hoyt reminded motorists that the Farms' owned parking lot near Kercheval and McMillan, behind Tracy Motor Sales, is available for free parking.

The Farms meters are the first to ever be installed in Grosse Pointe.

Two committees were named to begin work on immediate projects, a Grosse Pointe Directory and a Grosse Pointe Calendar.

Mr. Armstrong said that the committees will be expected to report at the next meeting Wednesday, Nov. 13.

### Top Colleges Endorse GPH Consul Plan

A college Counseling plan designed to protect the impulsive youngster from too much ill-sought advice has been successfully established at Grosse Pointe High School.

Conceived by W. L. Cleminson, GPH principal, the plan is endorsed by many prominent colleges and universities.

The plan goes far in solving the problems of the student, the parent and the school.

Here is how it works: As college representatives write for their appointments with Grosse Pointe High School, announcements of the dates of their visits are made to the students. Any child who has a definite interest in the college thereupon fills out an information blank which requires him to do a minimum amount of investigation of the college's resources and charges. He also supplies a brief picture of his own academic achievement and plans. Then his parents sign his blank.

Thus before the arrival of the representative of Wellesley, or Duke, or Purdue, or any other of scores of institutions, the student has had to do a little serious cogitation about his own college needs, his family's financial investment in his college years, and his own preparatory record.

### Drunken Boys Prompt Rigid Police Action

"Minors found drunk and disorderly will face prison terms," Park Police Chief Louwers declared. "They will face the minimum penalty of our court. They will not be released to their parents for disciplinary action."

Chief Louwers made this statement shortly after five Grosse Pointe youths, 17-19, were arrested Saturday night at St. Paul and Devonshire.

Police said all five were in a drunken stupor.

Two of the boys could not stand up.

"These youngsters were in such an intolerable condition that the arresting officers, fearing serious physical consequences, even death, immediately called their parents," Louwers said.

"We released them to their parents in accord with our policy but hereafter we will have to lay the law down for their own protection."

The boys said that they purchased beer and liquor from a beer store in Grosse Pointe Farms and a bar in Detroit.

Police are investigating these establishments.

## CIVIL SERVICE PROBE

Grosse Pointe Park's Special Committee assigned to investigate the Village's Civil Service Board should leave no stone unturned to learn just what is going on behind closed office doors.

The apparent dissension which clouds over the three-man board affects the entire Village.

The present discord delays appointments of key men needed on the Fire Department. It also instigates ill-feeling within the department, and discourages loyalty and cooperation which are highly essential for a fast-working, efficient fire department.

Actually, the men most concerned—the candidates for the appointments—are innocent victims of this surprising controversy, which saw derogatory charges hurled at some of them.

Public allegations at the character of men on the Park payroll seeking promo-

tions is no credit to the Board or to the community they serve.

The Board's sole duty is to honestly recommend the man most qualified for the position after a study of each man's qualification and background. And this task is made comparatively simple by the facilities of the Michigan Municipal League.

Under the supervision of this body, the candidates took lengthy mental and physical tests. The results, without comment, were presented to the Board for action. But, by their own voice, it was brought to light that they failed to fulfill this responsibility.

It's the Special Committee's task to find out who is responsible for this and take the necessary measures to eliminate the possibility of it happening again.

If any member of the Board is guilty of discrimination, he should be replaced at once.

## Top Psychologist to Discuss "Junior" Before Pierce PTA

Wednesday evening, November 16, at 8 p.m., Dr. Fritz Redl of Wayne University, will be the speaker at the Pierce P.T.A. meeting in the auditorium of Pierce School. The subject of his address will be, "How to Survive With Junior."

Graduating from the University of Vienna in Austria, in 1925, Dr. Redl's first professional experience (1925-1936) consisted of teaching German and English Languages and Literature, Philosophy, Psychology, and Logics in various public educational schools in Vienna, with age ranges of 10 to 18 years.

During this period, in addition to teaching, he engaged in numerous lecturing activities, clinical counseling, experimental projects, and experiences in group work and camping. One project in which he experimented during this time was that of counseling and development of the P. T. A. of one group of children whose homeloom teacher he was, and which he carried through the ages of 10 to 18.

From 1928 to 1936 Dr. Redl added to his previous professional preparation by pursuing psychoanalytical training, including supervised practice with disturbed children.

Since coming to the United States in 1938, upon the invitation of the Rockefeller Foundation, Dr. Redl has been recognized as an authority and leader in the field of psychology concerning itself with the study of adolescents.

Dr. Redl's emphasis is always on the practical application of psychological theory to specific situations. In his writings and in speaking, he has the knack of presenting the problems of youth

and how adults can understand them, in such clear, simple terms and colored by his own humorous and sincerely affectionate philosophy toward youth—that anyone reacts with newer understandings and clearer pictures of how youth operates, and what it needs to function effectively in our society, from the adults with whom they work and live.

## Postmaster Warns of New Xmas Card Rate

The postage rate on Christmas and other greeting cards in unsealed envelopes containing no writing except a signature and the usual greeting such as, "Merry Christmas," "Happy Birthday," or other similar greeting, and weighing no more than 2 ounces, is 2 cents. Postmaster Roscoe B. Huston warned.

This new rate went into effect January 1, 1949 and means that Christmas greetings that were mailed for 1½ cents last Christmas will be 2 cents this Christmas.

Birth, shower, and other similar matter containing handwritten or typewritten dates, hours, or other matter, is first class and must be paid at the letter rate of 3 cents per ounce whether sealed or unsealed.

Postal patrons are warned that Christmas greeting cards deposited in the mails with only 1½ cents postage will be treated as short-paid third class matter and will result in congestion in the post office, and such short-paid matter will not be delivered until after Christmas.

### 'I'D RATHER SING' 'White House Wedding Impossible' Margaret Truman Tells Review Writer

Margaret Truman greeted members of the press with naturalness and charm Tuesday afternoon in the drawing room of her suite at the Book Cadillac Hotel. She is staying there until after her recital at Masonic Temple on Friday evening. The good-looking blond singer, who has the added glamour of being the President's daughter, shook hands with each one present, smilingly acknowledging introductions. She was wearing a navy blue afternoon dress of wool jersey, with a round blue velvet collar and buttons, and a narrow velvet belt hugging a shirred waist-line. Her velvet beret was turquoise blue, flaunting two tall feathers. She looked well groomed and much prettier than her pictures, fair complexioned and without rouge.

The occasion had about it an aura of quiet dignity which seems to be as much a part of this young woman's personality as her sudden wide smile which brings animation to her gray eyes. She was suave, entirely poised, yet friendly and informal in her attitude. A sense of humor and quick wit frequently were apparent during the hour long interview. At such times a strong resemblance to her father, in expression and mannerisms, became noticeable even to those of us who have only seen Harry Truman in the news reels.

Miss Truman answered the many questions about her father with quiet good will, accepting the fate that has, in her own words, helped her career in some ways, hindered it in others. She is proud of her talent which she works hard to perfect, and prefers to be known as a good concert singer rather than as the

President's daughter. Certainly she does not take advantage of her opportunities for party fun. She says that singing takes all her time and concentration, with no time left over even for serious romance. She follows a rigid regime while on tour, practicing two hours every day and avoiding fatigue. Though she arrived here in Detroit three days before her recital, her only planned activity is to attend a performance of Katherine Cornell's and to visit with her old acquaintance back stage. She would prefer that to be a quiet meeting, too, she announced pointedly, with no photographers snapping pictures, although she had just finished posing graciously before a bevy of flash bulbs.

Miss Truman enjoys "down-to-earth tramping," and usually travels by train. She does

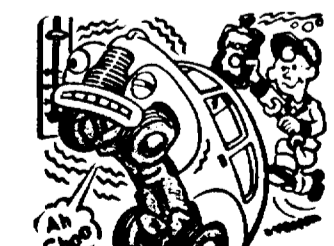
