President New Need

Prominent Grosse Pointe organizations and civic leaders have announced their support of the "School Building Proposal," according to Sigurd R. Wendin, president, Grosse Pointe Board of Education. The complete list appears at the end of this story. A special election will be held Friday, Feb. 24 for a bond issue to complete Parcells and Kerby Schools and erect two new elementary school buildings.

The cost would be \$4,345,000. Meanwhile the growing need for more schools was disclosed by Mr. Wendin.

He pointed out that last month public school enrollment reached an all time high of 5613, an increase of 274 pupils over last

The increase is concentrated on Parcells and Mason Schools where 221 of the 274 enrolled. The building program is geared to relieve congestion and trans-

This newspaper does not believe in sensationalizing reports of minors' trouble. But, when school students become ruffians and hoodlums, it's time for alarm.

It's time for parents, police and judicial authorities to clamp down on youths who feel it's "smart" to dissipate their minds and bodies with liquor and fights.

It's time for parents to replace pampering with strong "woodshed discipline."

Police were called at each one to quell the uprising.

At two of the instances, concerning boys from St. Ambrose, St. Paul, and Grosse Pointe High, respect for the police officers was missing.

However, no one was arrested.

The third fight occurred Friday at a Park restaurant. This one involved students and followers of St. Ambrose and St. Charles.

Eight were arrested.

Judge Potter placed the boys on probation for three months, took their driver's permits away and imposed a 10 p.m. cur-

"You go to jail next time," he warned. We agree they should.

REGISTRATION MUDDLE

Are you eligible to vote in the important elections approaching?

Due to the various regulations and changes for registering in village, township, state, national or school district elections, its best to take inventory of your registration status.

SCHOOL DISTRICT ELECTION

All persons who have voted at any one of the school district elections during the past years are eligible to vote. Feb. 24.

All persons who have registered or voted in a city, township, state or national election during the past four years are qualified to vote Feb. 24.

Residents who have only visited the polls in their own villages' referendums during the past four years may not be eligible to vote in the school election.

A call to their municipal office or school board is advised.

City of Grosse Pointe residents who have registered or voted in their own elections at any time within a four year period are qualified to vote Feb. 24.

Farms electorate who voted on the city charter election are also eligible for the school referendum.

VILLAGE ELECTIONS

Park, Woods and Shores citizens who have not registered or voted in their hometown elections are not qualified for 1950 community elections unless they register


