# Detroit Counsel Supports Pointe School Proposal

(Continued from Page 1)

The Board of Education is in the process of presenting facts and figures to the public, but is not in an independent position to inform the voters regarding the sound credit standards of municipal financing, with special emphasis on Michigan School District financing.

"In view of your wide experience and recognition as an expert in the fields of investment and municipal finance, we would appreciate receiving your comments regarding the various financial factors which you believe should be considered in relation to Michigan School bonds.

"We feel the people of the District will then be in a position to intelligently compare the terms of the proposed bond issue with those standards of sound finance with which your name and reputation have always been associated."

In answer to this letter Dr. Badger wrote:  
 Dear Mr. Wendin:  
 "In reply to your letter of January 25, in which you asked me to discuss specifically the requirements as to quality and standard which have been developed by our organization in reference to municipal bonds, and particularly in reference to Michigan School District Bonds, in order that such bonds be considered high-grade, I am pleased to give you the following comments:

"Needless to say our organization fully appreciates the requirements of Michigan communities for adequate school facilities and heartily endorses the use of municipal credit for this purpose.

"In general, we do not favor the restriction of taxing power for the purpose of meeting debt service, regardless of the purpose for which funds have been borrowed. We recognize, however, that the Michigan statutes, as they now stand, require certain limitations in respect to taxing power for the purpose of servicing School District issues. In view of the restriction, we feel that somewhat greater safeguards must surround the issuance of bonds of this type.

"In general, we have felt that a ratio of direct debt to assessed value should not exceed 5% and that the ratio of overlapping debt to assessed value should not exceed 8% for a high type of residential community in Michigan (6.74 in Grosse Pointe with proposed new bonds included). Some modification is required where the assessed value is below actual value.

"We have also generally felt that overlapping debt should not exceed a limit of \$125 per capita. Substantial upward variation in this limit can be made, however, in the case of communities which are typically high-class residential communities and where the average wealth is comparatively high. For example, in certain residential areas surrounding New York City, where there is relatively high average per capita wealth, per capita debt figures run as high as \$250 to \$400, and yet the credit is acceptable. Since the Grosse Pointe area is well above average, it compares favorably with these New York communities (with proposed bond issue Grosse Pointe per capita debt would be \$187.54).

"It is also our opinion that the community should have a good record of tax collection, i.e., under normal conditions the tax

collections should run between 95% to 100% during the year of levy (Grosse Pointe has an average of 96.12% during last five years).

"As a further safeguard, we prefer communities which have had a clear record of meeting debt service without default.

"In view of the limited tax features involved in Michigan School District Bonds, we believe that the issuing communities should afford all possible protection to the bondholder under the existing statutes. This, in our opinion, would require the community, as a part of the bond contract, to agree to a mandatory levy throughout the life of the bond, sufficient to meet bond interest with tax collections as low as 75% (the proposed new bond issue conforms to this).

"We believe that it is in the interest of the taxpayers of issuing communities to afford all of the protection possible in respect to the bonds which the community issues. Where these added elements of protection are provided for, the credit rating of the bond is enhanced and the interest cost substantially lowered. A fact, of course, which results in a material saving to the taxpayers of the community."
