

With the motorist paying strict attention to nothing but driving, according to the National Bureau of Standards, it takes 67 feet to stop at 25 miles per hour. Twenty-four feet are covered during the time it takes the brain to analyze traffic, discover the York for a South American need for stopping and tell the cruise. right foot to put the brakes on. The remaining 43 feet are needed to actually stop the car. And this 43 feet is based upon brakes and tires in safe operating condition—and dry pavement.
