name is also included in a leaflet naming 386 other endorser. Now Mr. Parshall wants to withdraw his endorsement and we accept that although we cannot take his name off the leaflet because it is already printed, Mr. Parshall has been advised of the latter and accepts this fact.

I also regret this situation tremendously because I believe that Mr. Parshall has been misinformed about the proposals since we talked or he would not have withdrawn his endorsement at the last minute.

For instance, he seems to be under the misapprehension that \$1,160,000 already collected or to be collected can be used for any necessary new school buildings and therefore we do not need any new money right away. What he apparently does not realize is that this money was earmarked by the voters for Kerby and Parcels buildings only and cannot be used to alleviate the critical elementary school needs in the Cook Road and Gratiot area. We have pointed out publicly many times this situation and we need immediately not only the proposed Cook Road and Gratiot schools but also the completion of the Parcels and Kerby schools. The latter alone will require more than the \$1,160,000 which Mr. Parshall refers, and the necessary money to complete the program is the reason for the proposed bond issue.

In conclusion let me say that I believe Mr. Parshall and I are still in agreement as to the real school needs of the area but we now disagree as to the immediate necessity for the money. In my own mind I am convinced that if we don't undertake this minimum program which the Board proposes and issue bonds now, that we can't even take care of current needs—which I have already said cannot be done by using alone the \$1,160,000 which will be available in June 1951.
