

A nationwide study of the teaching of current affairs in the elementary and sec-... ondary schools of the nation concludes that the schools do not give sufficient classroom time to an adequate program for teaching current affairs.

It is pointed out that, in most schools, there are one or two sessions a week, designated as "Current Events" .periods. but that contemporary happenings are not made a sufficient part of the total curriculum. Controversial issues are often barred in the classroom, both on account of community pressures and because

teachers-fear that they might be denounc-"ed as "red" or "radical."

While there is, no doubt, some place for current affairs in the curricula of the elementary and secondary schools, it may be questioned whether great emphasis should be placed upon contemporary events. After all, the business of the schools is to train pupils in certain fundamentals which we might call the tools of thought and thus leave them in a position to read, understand and evaluate controversial issues for
