



#### PARENTS ON PROBATION TOO

It took a mass trial of 13 boys to bring home to parents the fact that their children are doing things which are wrong.

These lads were accused of disorderly conduct following a basketball game between Grosse Pointe and Highland Park. They were treated in all fairness by police officials who were acting in the line of duty when they quelled the disturbance.

When the time came for retribution it was felt that the parents should be made aware of the seriousness of the situation. For this reason the boys are not the only ones on probation. The parents, too, will share this positive effort recommended by civic officials. In this way it is hoped that the parents will wake up to the fact that the conduct of their children is part of their responsibility.

A Volunteer Probation Department has been set up in the City of Grosse Pointe Municipal Building where the boys and their parents will report semi-monthly. If the regular probation procedure had

been followed, the youths who were found guilty would have been forced to report to the Wayne County Probation Board. This step would have automatically entered their names on the police record.

Because the Highland Park students were exonerated, there should be no cause for dissention among the local youths. Police officials considered each case carefully. Their best judgment was used to work out a solution which would be most effective.

The probation period is designed neither to hurt nor punish the boy. It is a move to help rather than to hinder the individual.

Through this medium it is hoped that a better understanding will come between the parents, boys and police officers.

The time is ripe to consider the importance of the activities of our children in the community. By working together we can make them better citizens. Better citizens are an asset to any community.
