### HIGH-POWERED PROPAGANDA

Should the United States go in for an aggressive "Marshall plan of ideas" to implement its material assistance to the Western world? Senator Benton of Connecticut, who has been urging this move in Congress, thinks so and his belief is shared by a great many people who are gravely disturbed by the success of Russia's high-powered propaganda.

The masters of the Kremlin are thorough. They have pressed ahead in the cold war with weapons, with what amounts to blackmail on a high international level, and they have been clever and efficient in using their satellites as instruments of conquest. They have developed well-trained undergrounds everywhere, including the United States, whose duty is to advance the cause of communism by every conceivable means including, in the event of all-out war, sabotage and destruction on a far broader scale than most Americans seem to be able to contemplate. The evidence in this regard which the FBI has painstakingly gathered over the years, some of which was recently made public, shows that the Politburo leaves no stone unturned. And, in addition, the Russians regard propaganda as one of the most important of all weapons, and are acting accordingly.

In one of his late columns, Marquis Childs described the pattern of Soviet propaganda in Germany. He wrote, "Basic elements in this pattern are the petitions for peace and against the atomic bomb being circulated by the millions in both zones of Germany. These same petitions were signed by several million north Koreans beginning in 1947 when they were first introduced on orders of Moscow.

"The objective is clear. It is to identify communism with peace and to put the United States in the role of aggressor, holding the terror weapon of the atomic bomb over the heads of peace-loving peoples everywhere. If and when the United States should resort to the atomic weapon . . . then the base would be prepared to foment a world-wide hatred of America and Americans."

It may seem absurd to Americans that the Russians can succeed with this propaganda line. But according to men who are in the best position to know they are succeeding. The Western nations, it is true, have beaten the communists in all postwar elections. But in many the communist vote has been heavy - and the communist minority is undoubtedly far better organized, and forms a far more cohesive whole, than its opposition.

In a recent speech, William C. Bullitt, who was an Ambassador to Russia under Franklin Roosevelt, said, "In Italy, more than 20 per cent of the workmen are unemployed, and the Communists, who gathered one-third of the votes at the last elections, are gaining in strength. In France, the government is far weaker than any French government before the Second World War, and its entire apparatus is riddled with communists. Even the head of French atomic research is a com-

Situations such as this are not, of course, the result of Soviet propaganda alone. But that propaganda has been and is a powerful factor. Hence the growing interest in a "Marshall plan of ideas" through which we would tell the world the truth as we see it.

### THE QUESTION IS ANSWERED

If any question remained in anyone's mind as to the need for the strictest possible economy in government, the grim march of recent events must have answered it.

This country is now committed to a policy of active resistance to communist aggression. It is a policy which has the full approval of the leaders of both political parties and of the nation at large. It is a policy whose cost no one can as yet estimate. At best, it seems inevitable that cour expenditures for military and related purposes will rise materially.

In the light of this, how can further waste and unnecessary domestic spending be countenanced? In a world struggle for survival, there is no room for the welfare state, for government pampering of the individual—or for the spending of our tax money for any purpose which can be accomplished by private enterprise.

Government has its hands full, and more, with desperately difficult tasks which only government can handle. At this time, of all times, it must keep to its proper constitutional duties.



### Too High a Drice Michigan Mirror ....

door Writers Association of America is a timely remainder that this region of approximately 16,000 square miles, larger in area than any New England state except Maine, is perhaps better appreciated by out-state travelers than by many native sons and daughters of Michigan.

This observation is prompted by an enthusiastic letter written by Clay Perry, author of Cheshire, Massachusetts, Perry, a native of Wisconsin and a longtime resident of Massachusetts, has made five trips to the "Fab-ulous Upper Peninsula." He wrote an article for the Saturday Evening Post in 1941 entitled, 'As Easy As Falling Off A Log," dealing with the log-birling event at Gladstone, held annually around the Fourth of July.

Perry writes: "I doubt that there is a similar sportsman's paradise in the middle of the United States that can compare with the Fabulous Upper Peninsula. Nowhere I ever have visited in this country and Canada is there so much to offer as Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

"There is fishing unequaled anywhere elese in its variety for inland waters. Trout, bass, lake trout, wall-eyed pike, pickerel, perch and etc.

"You can find more deer in the Upper Peninsula than almost anywhere else in the United States. As for scenery there are the seven wonders of the Upper Peninsula to see. Among them is the famous Big Spring, Kitchitikippi, near Manistique, the Pic-tured Rocks at Munising, all of the beautiful shores of Lake Superior and Michigan, Mackinac Island—historic, scenic, luxurious as to its Grand Hotel, no automobiles allowed, only horsedrawn carriages and bicycles."

Michigan's state laws require that all milk sold over the counter as well as the milk, skim their hosts, Mr. and Mrs. John F. milk, cream and other dairy products used in the commercial manufacture of butter, cheese, cottage cheese and ice cream be pasteurized. Thees laws, however, do not cover milk and dairy products sold or used at the farms where they are produced. (Unfortunately, too, the law requiring the pasteurization of milk is not effective in five communities of the state which have removed themselves from the protection of the law.)

The state pasteurization laws were passed to protect Michigan residents and vacationists, alike, from milk borne infections such as undulant fever, typhoid fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, septic sore throat and other illnesses.

To protect your heath, use only pasteurized milk products, where pasteurized products may not be available, they should prowide themselves with canned milk, and avoid buying homemade butter or cottage cheese.

If they must use milk directly teurized at the cottage or camp by bringing the milk just to the boiling point and then cooling it rapidly while stirring.
