Rabaut Asks Observance of UN Day

October 24, 1950, will mark the fifth birthday of the United Nations, and throughout the United States special ceremonies and events will call the attention of the American people to the organization born in 1945 in San Francisco as the United Nations charter came into force as world law.

In the 14th District, Rep. Louis Rabaut, who headed a Congressional delegation to the San Francisco conference to set up United States-UN financial relations, brought the event to the notice of the people and asked that the day "be accorded special significance by all American citizens in this time of world crisis and anxiety."

Rabaut's statement follows: "The notable UN achievements in Palestine, Indonesia, Kashmir, and the former Italian colonies, which shaped a peaceful future for the people of those troubled lands should convince us that the UN can be a proper and effective organ for world peace."

"And if we consider for a moment that the 1950 episode in Korea was a replica of the Italian Fascist invasion of Ethiopia, we must conclude, from the vigorous reaction of the free people of the world, through the UN, that this world body is not and will not be doomed to the same sad fate which befell its predecessor, the League of Nations."

"The UN has been called upon for some tasks for which it was not designed, and because of the evil obstinacy of the Soviet Union and its satellites, rather than structural defects of the UN organization, these tasks have not been accomplished."

"But the UN action in Korea has immeasurably strengthened the organization in the eyes of the world and that strength will continue to grow as we render concrete evidence of our willingness to stave the tide of aggression whenever and wherever it begins to flow."

Grosse Pointe Farms' brand new fire engine, not yet scheduled for active duty, was in the parade flashing all its lights and sirens. Mr. and Mrs. Allison Monroe, George Ellworthy, and Norbert Neff, co-chairmen of entries for the parade, estimated that more than 200 vehicles participated, including trucks, station wagons, private cars, mobile army equipment, and floats.

Twelve floats which appeared Tuesday in the Detroit Torch Fund parade also appeared in the "Cavalcade of the Pointes." Many of the local community organizations, as well as individuals and business concerns entered the parade and added to its color and originality.

THE LINE of cars started passing the reviewing stand at Fisher and Kercheval at 7:00 p.m. at which time Grosse Pointe's own torch, 16 feet high and bright red and white with fresh paint, constructed by Eric Ramstrup, was lighted by a United Foundation official, Walter Laidlaw.

On the reviewing stand were many Grosse Pointe Committee Chairmen of Region I and other city officials and dignitaries, including the mayors of the five Grosse Pointes, Homer C. Fritsch, William F. Connolly, Jr., Ralph B. Netting, Alois A. Ghesquiere, and Ernest C. Putnam. After the lighting of the Torch, which will remain flaming as a symbol of the Torch Drive throughout the three weeks of the campaign, judges awarded prizes to the Neighborhood Club, Cottage Hospital and the Blue Hi-Y for the most original and colorful floats.

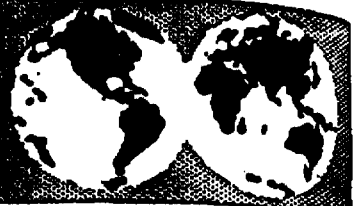

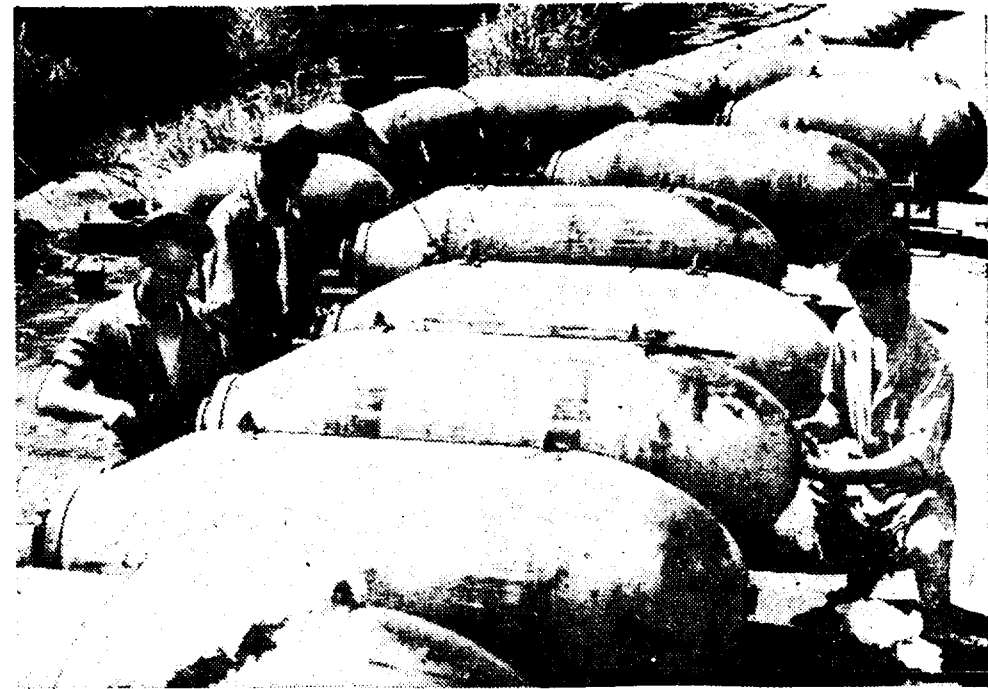

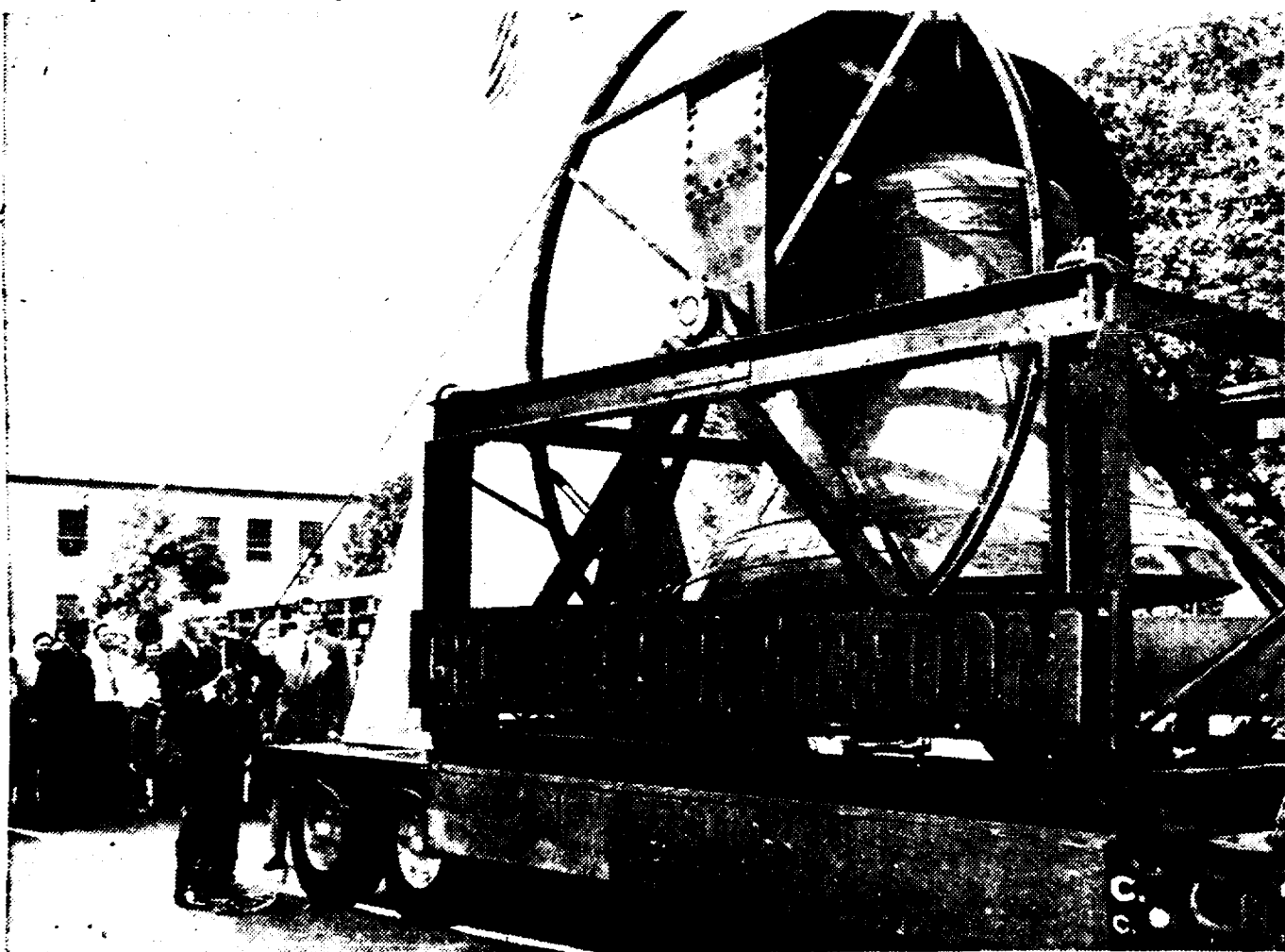


PLODDING PEACEFULLY along, thousands of sheep are herded back to their home ranch after summering on the range high in the Absaroka mountains of Montana.

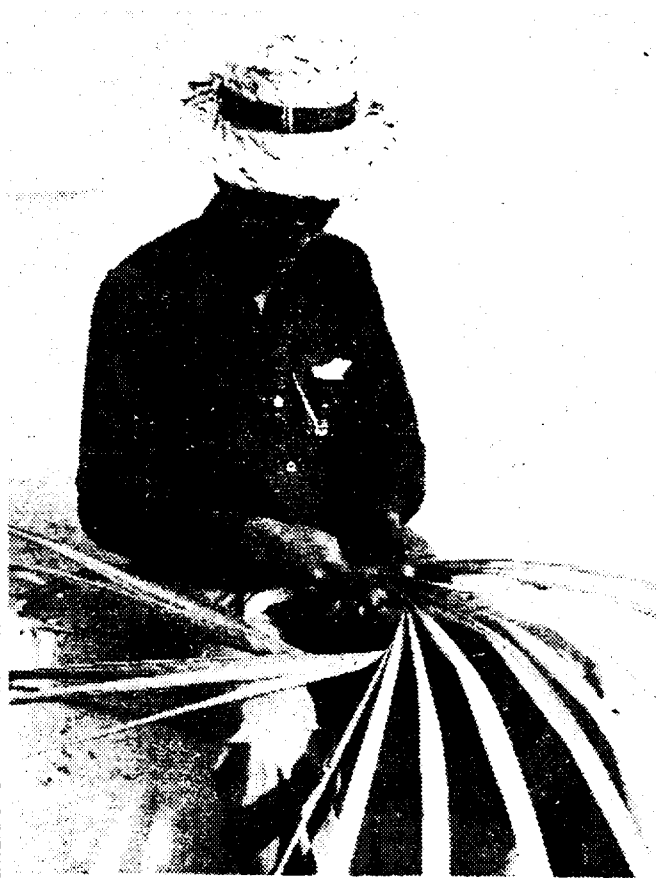

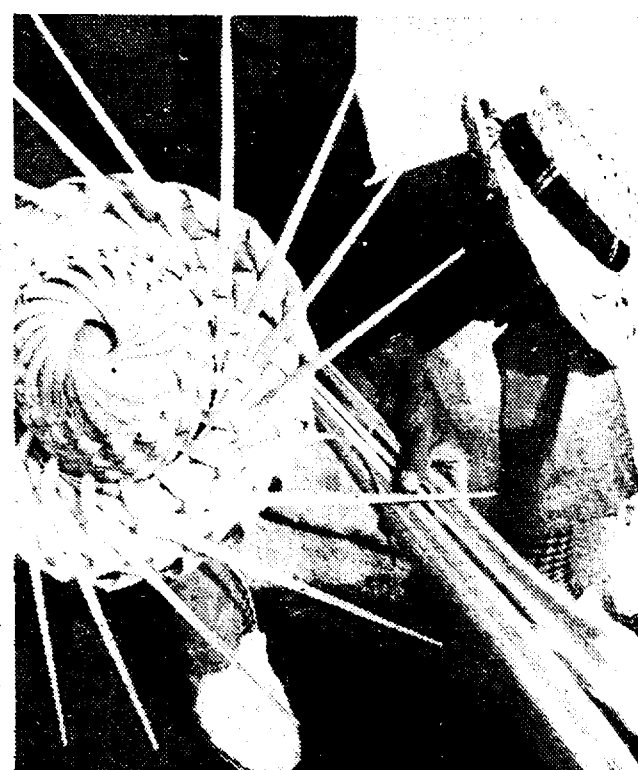

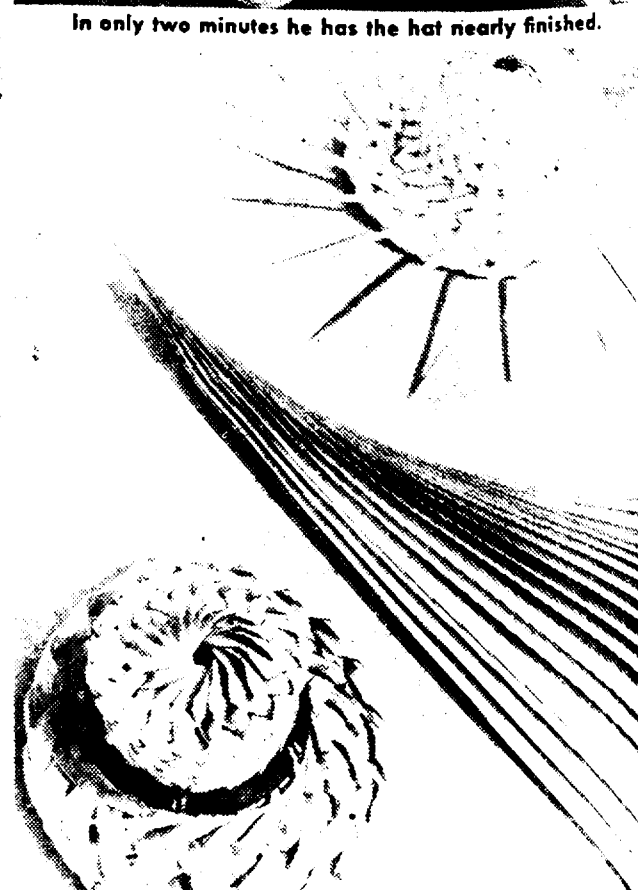
This is what the Hollywood hat-maker starts with.
