DECORATE THE SAFE WAY

CHICKENS

Certain rules have been set up by the Fire Departments for Christmas decorations, ornaments and Christmas tree installations in public places in the coming holiday season.

These simple rules may well mean the difference between a safe Yule season or a hazardous one for families and guests. -

1. No paper decorations to be used.

2. All decorations must be eight feet above floor.

3. All decorations must be flameproofed. 4. All decorations must be kept a safe distance from lights.

5. No natural decorations can be used except wreaths which must be spaced at least ten feet apart.

6. No Christmas trees will be permitted without special permission from the Fire Chief. Where permission is granted, trees must be treated to reduce flammability

The following formula for the reduction of flammability of Christmas trees is accepted by this office:

Combustion can be reduced by allowing the tree to absorb a solution of calcium chloride. This is done in the following manner: Use calcium chloride to onefourth (1/4) the weight of the tree in pounds and mix this in one and one-half pints of water to the pound of calcium chloride.

Then cut the tree at the bottom on a diagonal slant and place the tree in the solution for a few days so that it will absorb this chemical mixture. Also, use a Christmas tree stand with a container for water in which the base of the tree is placed. This keeps it moist during the time it is used for decorative purposes.
