As for the second question: Grosse Pointe High School graduates have always done well in Eastern colleges, and they are improving. A survey of their honor point averages in their first-semester college courses showed that the graduates had an average of 1.14 between 1934-11. In the last eight years (1942-49 inclusive) their honor point average has climbed to 1.27.

In computing honor point average, a three-point average is an A, a two-point a B, and a one-point a C. Therefore, a 1.27 average is a very strong C plus.

No recommended graduate of the High School has flunked out of first-semester college workat least not since 1934 (as far back as the check was made.)

Failures between 1934-41 were 4.6 per cent as compared to 1.7 per cent between 1942-49. In other words, the 72 Grosse Pointe High School students in this 1942-49 group have had less than 2 per cent failing marks in their first semester courses. The usual per cent of failures in colleges for that period of work is

5 per cent or more. The colleges checked were: Amherst, Annapolis, Brown, Bryn Mawr, Colgate, Cornell, Connecticut, Dartmouth, Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Mount Holyoke, Princeton, Randolph-Macon, Rutgers, Trinity, Vassar, Wellesley, William and Mary, and Yale.
