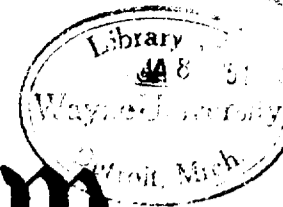

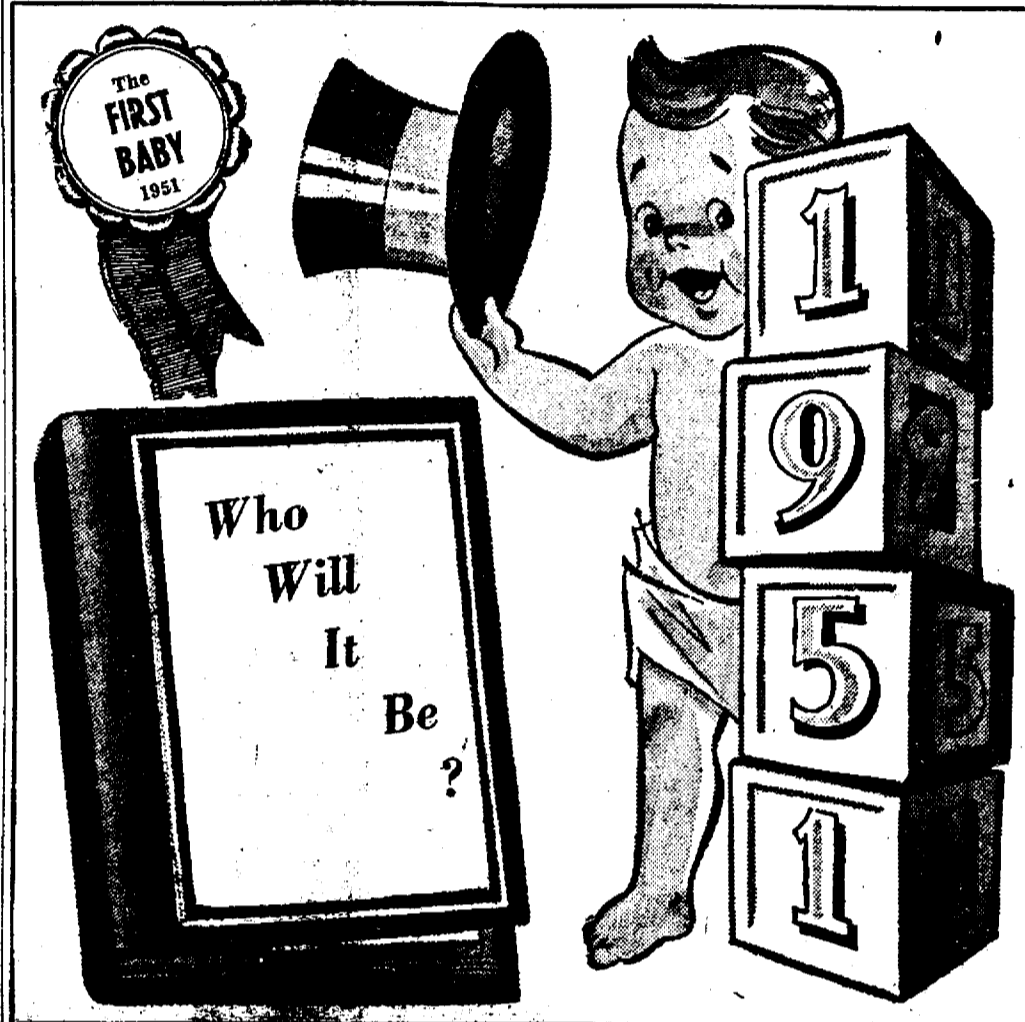

Last year at this time 19 seniors became members of the society.

Qualifications for membership in the National Honor Society require attendance in the high school for a minimum of two years, and at least a B average by the middle of the 12A semester.

Each eligible senior is also rated by the entire faculty in leadership, character and service. This rating plus the service point record of the senior affects election.

Membership is awarded by a faculty committee, and not more than the top 15 per cent of the graduating class may be elected to the society.

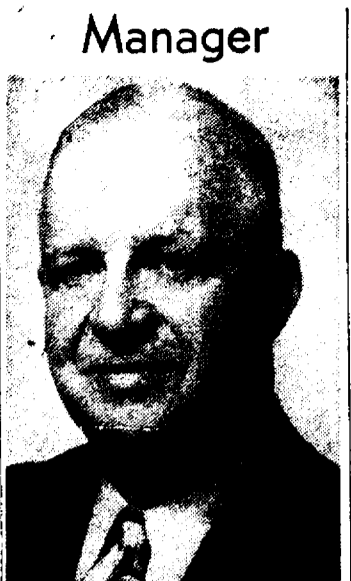

On January 10 the Grosse Pointe chapter of the American Association of University Women will have as guest speaker Miss Louise Cuyler, Associate Professor of Musicology at the University of Michigan.

She holds degrees in Musicology from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester and the University of Michigan.

Professor Cuyler has taught violin both in schools and in private classes and has done radio work. She was a member of the Hockett quartette in Rochester, N. Y.

During World War II, Dr. Cuyler was Club Director for the American Red Cross South Pacific area and worked in Caledonia, Fiji Islands, New Hebrides and Hawaii.

She acted as liaison between the Red Cross and special services for radio programs in the Pacific (Mosquito Network).

Recently Dr. Cuyler received a Rackham grant for research on the work of Isaac, Flemish composer of the 16th century. As a result the University will this year publish Book III of Isaac's Choralis Constantinus under this grant.
