

LOWER ODDS

When the sun goes down, down go the driver's odds on reaching home safely, the Street and Traffic Safety Lighting Bureau warns drivers and pedestrians.

In January, particularly, the driver is faced with the prospect of more night driving, less daylight driving. About 14 hours of the average January day are hours of darkness, and these hours include the peak hours of traffic.

Statistical studies by the Street and

Traffic Safety Lighting Bureau show that almost two out of three fatal accidents occur between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. In January, this time span is almost entirely hours of derkness.

In January 1949, 560 pedestrians lost their lives in our cities and towns. The driver's inability to see because of poor or inadequate street lighting was a major factor in these deaths, the Bureau says.

SMEARING THE F. B. I.

"Had the F.B.I. been made the victim of an ordinary smear artist the results would have been deplorable enough. The attack made by Max Lowenthal in his newly published book ("The Federal Bureau of Investigation") is, however—by reason of its method and circumstancesparticularly obnoxious. This lengthy vol ume, with its outward pretense to authoritativeness and objectivity, could easily be mistaken for a factual guide to the course of the F.B.I. during its forty-two years of existence. It is only when the text has been examined that the author's manner and aims become clear.

Mr. Lowenthal has strung together an exhausting series of quotations from publie records, inconclusive, tendentious and frequently out of context, designed to ties cumulative result of implying the F.B.I. has been ineffectual, prefudiced, concerned chiefly with notoriety for itself, and careless of the civil liberties of the citizens. The book's publication occurs at a time when the F.B.I.'s activities against Communist infiltration requireas indeed they merit—an unhesitating public confidence; and the whole venture is made the more disturbing by suggestions of White House encouragement.

"What is the truth? The F.B.I. under J. Edgar Hoover has been a vigilant and highly effective agency in the fields of doubt upon his work."

"Throughout there has been a sharp awareness on the part of the director of the need for a Federal policing agency to work within the rigid lines laid down by the Constitution, and within the frame of values of a free, liberty-loving people. The American Civil Liberties Union last summer wrote to Mr. Hoover, congratulating him on the 'fine balance' he had maintained in dealing with 'the serious and intricate problem of national security in relation to civil liberties.'

"This judgment finds no place in the pages of Mr. Lowenthal's book, but it is one that will be echoed by every impartial abserver who has watched national police agencies in other countries ride roughshod over individual rights.

"Americans have every reason to be proud of the F.B.I. and thankful for the record of the man who for more than twenty-five years has shaped and directed its activities. It would be nothing less than a calamity if, at this crucial moment in the nation's life, the insinuations and distortions of the Lowenthal book were to undermine Mr. Hoover's position or to cast





Center 'Island' Aid to Housewife





The distance between the range and counter on the food preparation side, or the dishwasher and counter on the opposite side, is only about 42 inches. For Door-planing

When edge-planing doors be-fore hanging, time can be saved



by holding them securely with a simple stop made of scrap lumber, suggests American Builder magazine. The door stop is made by cutting a V-shaped notch, three inches wide at the mouth and 12 inches long, in the piece of wood. Then it is tacked to the window sill as shown in the illustration. sill, as shown in the illustration, with two thin casing nails.

HOME OWNERS QUESTION BOX

Q-My kitchen sink edge is covered with aluminum, and when I stand against it my apron and dress front gets black. How can this be prevented?

A-Liquid wax, applied periodically, is recommended. If clothing still becomes discolored from contact with the sink edge, you might try roughing up the aluminum with steel wool and then applying shellac.

Q...I have been unable to find a small leak in my roof. How can I locate it?

A—Examine the under side of the roof in bright daylight. When you find the spot where light shows through, put a piece of wire or a sliver of wood through the hole so it can be located from outside. If your roof is worn, however, other leaks can be expected to develop shortly and it would be economical to put on a new roof rather than to attempt to patch the old one. Asphalt shingles usually can be applied right over the old roofing material.

Q—Some of the windows in my home are difficult to open and then, once opened, require con-siderable effort to close. What causes this, and how can the con-

dition be overcome? A-There are several causes of sticking windows. Hardened paint in the grooves in which the window slides may be responsible, and swelling of the sashes or parts of the grooves is another cause. The sash can be made to slide more easily, however, by rubbing paraffin on the grooves.






