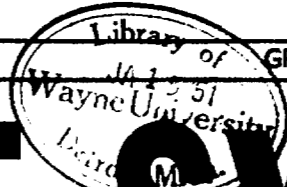

Council Approves Increases In Rents

Resolution Faces Sanction by Wayne Rent Advisory Board

In the face of numerous requests from landlords urging decontrol of rents in the City of Grosse Pointe Park, the Council took steps Monday to permit increases in rental properties.

The Council adopted a resolution recommending that the Wayne County Rent Advisory Board make adjustments ranging from one-third increases for properties renting under \$60 and \$20 increases for properties renting for more than \$60 a month.

In an effort to avoid complete decontrol, the Council favored action through the Wayne County Rent Control Board.

The resolution adopted by the Council stated that "some increase in rents is justified if controlled housing accommodations are to yield a fair net operating income in view of increases in operating maintenance expenses and in property taxes."

The resolution further stated that "increases be granted in the maximum rentals of all housing in the City of Grosse Pointe Park now under rent control."

Carl Schwewart, who appeared at the meeting on behalf of numerous landlords, urged immediate action of the rent adjustments for property owners in the Park.

If the resolution is approved by the Wayne County Rent Control Board, a Park official or Board representatives will be provided with the necessary applications which residents will use to apply for increases.

These applications will be available at the Municipal Building in the City of Grosse Pointe Park.

"If the Wayne Board does not approve the measure," Everitt Lane, Park City Manager, stated, "we will appeal to the Housing Expeditor, Tighe Woods, in Washington, D. C."

The members of the Special Gifts Committee who are raising funds for the purchase of equipment for Bon Secours Hospital met Monday evening to hear a progress report.

By the time the pledges had been tabulated this week, the sum of \$77,680 had been reached.

The good news was a pat on the back for the army of workers recruited from in and around Grosse Pointe. Their goal by February 15 is \$121,120.

"We should be encouraged by our progress so far, but determined to make the next few weeks the most progressive," Father Sweeney of St. Clare Church told members of the committee at the meeting.

Michael J. Kearins, chairman of the drive, congratulated workers on their concentrated efforts during the campaign and expressed confidence that the eventual goal would be achieved.

The next meeting of the Special Gifts committee will be held Friday, January 19.

The Grosse Pointe Rotary Club recently purchased a hospital bed which is available to residents of the community for temporary use.

The Rotarians have also made available four portable television sets for persons who are convalescing in the community.

Claim Provision In Charter to Be Void and Illegal

Before the ink on the new charter in the City of Grosse Pointe Park had a chance to dry a proceeding had been filed in Circuit Court to declare one of its main provisions invalid and void.

Two taxpayers, Norman T. Bohrer, of 1230 Lakepointe, and Marvin L. Visger, of 987 Nottingham, on relation of Gerald K. O'Brien, Wayne County Prosecuting Attorney, are contesting the validity of establishing a Merit System as provided in the charter.

The Merit System as established in the charter is used to govern the appointment, promotion, transfer, lay-off, discharge or disciplining of City employees.

Employees in the system have an opportunity for an impartial hearing before the Merit System Board, which consists of five appointed members.

The plaintiffs, Bohrer and Visger, claim the Merit System is "invalid, void, illegal and unconstitutional" since a Civil Service program was already in use and had been established through legislative channels by voters in 1937.

In 1935, the Michigan State Legislature set up a civil service program, which could be adopted, in cities, municipalities and villages having full-time firemen.

The first opposition to the Merit System was struck when a representative of the Firefighters Association appeared at the public hearing on the proposed City Charter held last November.

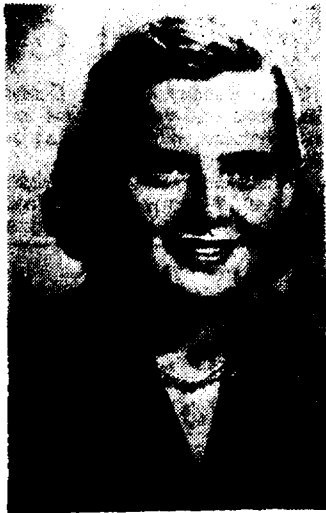
Jean Corey, one of the five senior members who will be graduated in January, will play the clarinet solo, "Concerto in B Flat Major," by Weber.

The Grosse Pointe Garden Club Council, under the auspices of the War Memorial Garden Center and the War Memorial Association, is firing the opening gun in the war against the Dutch elm disease on Monday, January 15, at 8 p.m. at the Memorial Center.

Dr. J. L. R. Chapman, noted horticulturist from Michigan State College, will introduce the principal speaker, Dr. Forrest C. Strong, foremost authority on the disease in this area.

Dr. Strong will show the only slides available in the country on the subject and will discuss the symptoms and diagnosis of the disease, as well as the best methods of control, concluding with suggestions for setting up a control program in a municipality.

The practical aspects for a control program in Grosse Pointe will be discussed by C. A. Boyer, of the State Department of Agriculture. He will stress the need for cooperation between Grosse Pointe and other communities on the east side where diseased trees have already been found.

Grosse Pointe Garden Club members are backing the battle on home front against the Dutch elm beetle and are urging residents to take an active part in protecting the thousands of elm trees which line the streets in the Pointe.

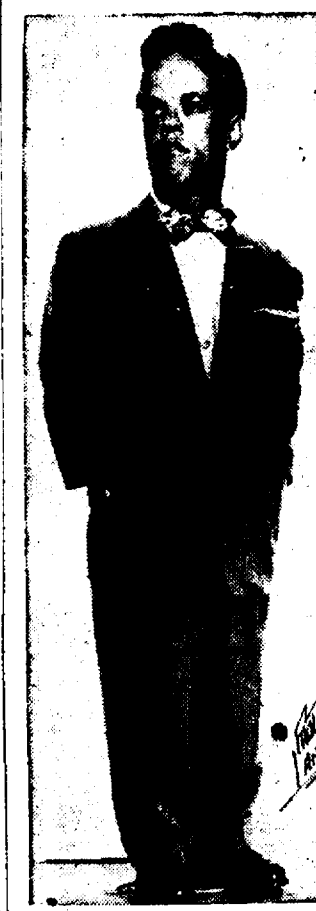

Midgets on Card at Chesterfield



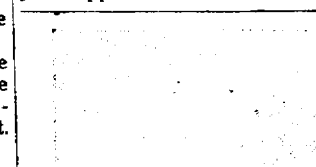

The selection of twelve series were considered and now have been narrowed down to three series. These series are now available for inspection in all the elementary school buildings.

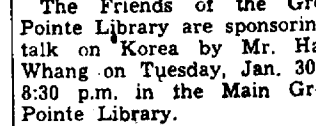

The Friends of the Grosse Pointe Library are sponsoring a talk on Korea by Mr. Harry Whang on Tuesday, Jan. 30, at 8:30 p.m. in the Main Grosse Pointe Library.

Mr. Whang was born in Pyonyang, Korea, and lived his early life there, coming to America 30 years ago. After being graduated from the University of Chicago he received his Masters degree from Columbia, majoring in education and finance. He came to Detroit in 1933.

During World War II Mr. Whang made a vital contribution teaching the Japanese language and history at Selfridge Field. In May 1950, just before the Korean outbreak he accompanied the Korean ambassador to Korea, consulting there with General MacArthur and President Sigmund Rhee. He will talk on his observations and experiences.

In one of his recent columns, W. K. Kelsey of the Detroit News commented, "Advice on how to deal with the world situation is easy to get. It is a drug on the market; it can be obtained for nothing on any street corner. And it is worth the price."

Certainly, first hand accurate information is difficult to come by. Mr. Harry Whang, an authority on Korea today, provides the opportunity to get such information.
