Murray Sales Dies at 85

Murray W. Sales, banker, businessman, philanthropist and founder of the Murray W. Sales Co., died Saturday at his home, 17743 Jefferson avenue east, Grosse Pointe. He was 85 years old.

Mr. Sales started his business career with the old Allan Sheldon wholesale drygoods firm, from which he went as Chicago manager to the Detroit Copper & Brass Rolling Mills.

He returned to Detroit in 1891 to form a wholesale plumbing and engineering company with a brother. The company bears his name.

SUPPORTED HOSPITALS
Throughout his life, Mr. Sales was active in the support of hospitals and care of children. He was a member of the board of Grace Hospital, and it was a \$100,000 gift from him that aided erection of Grosse Pointe's Cottage Hospital.

The gift was a memorial to three children who died tragically, Leonard and Frances from eating adulterated olives at a family dinner, and Murray, Jr., in an automobile accident.

Mr. Sales served as a director of the Home for the Friendless, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and the Detroit branch of the Michigan Children's Home Society.

He was a director of Michigan Bell Telephone Co., Manufacturers National Bank, Grosse Pointe Bank, Walker & Co. and Detroit Steel Products Co., was a member of the Board of Commerce and various clubs.

Mr. Sales married Jessie June Carter in 1893, and she died Jan. 3, 1943. A son, Carter, survives.

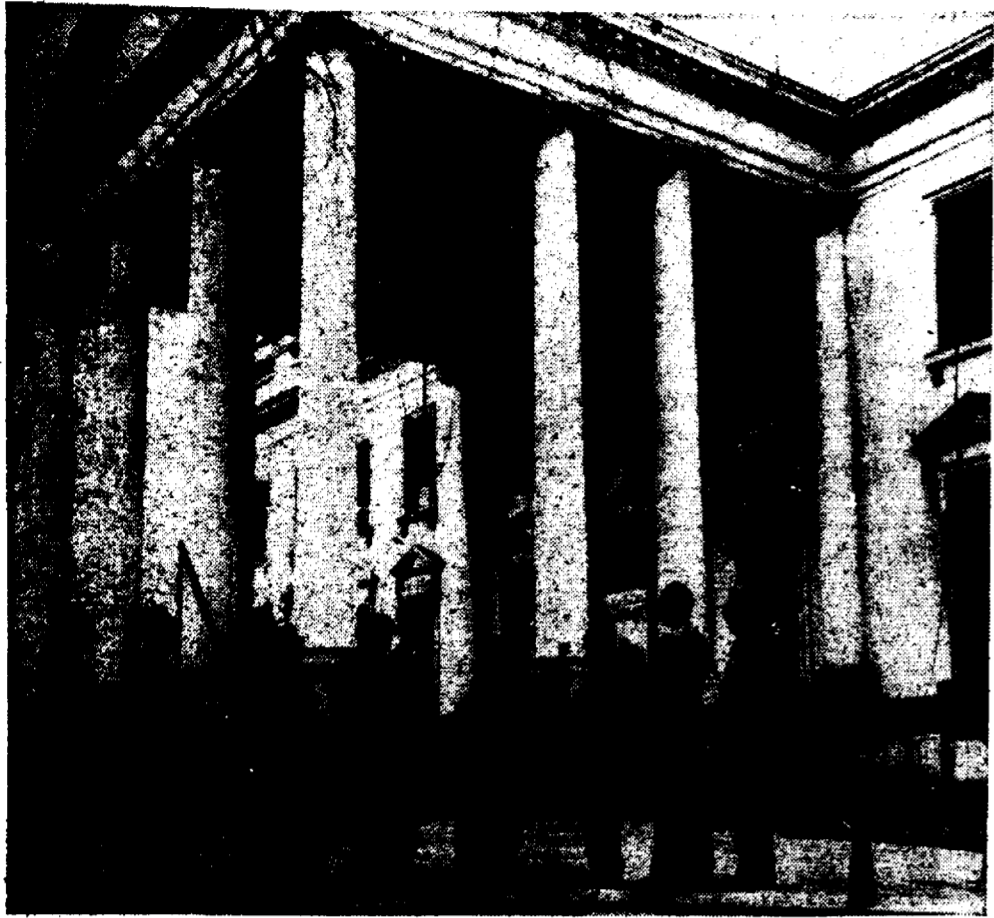

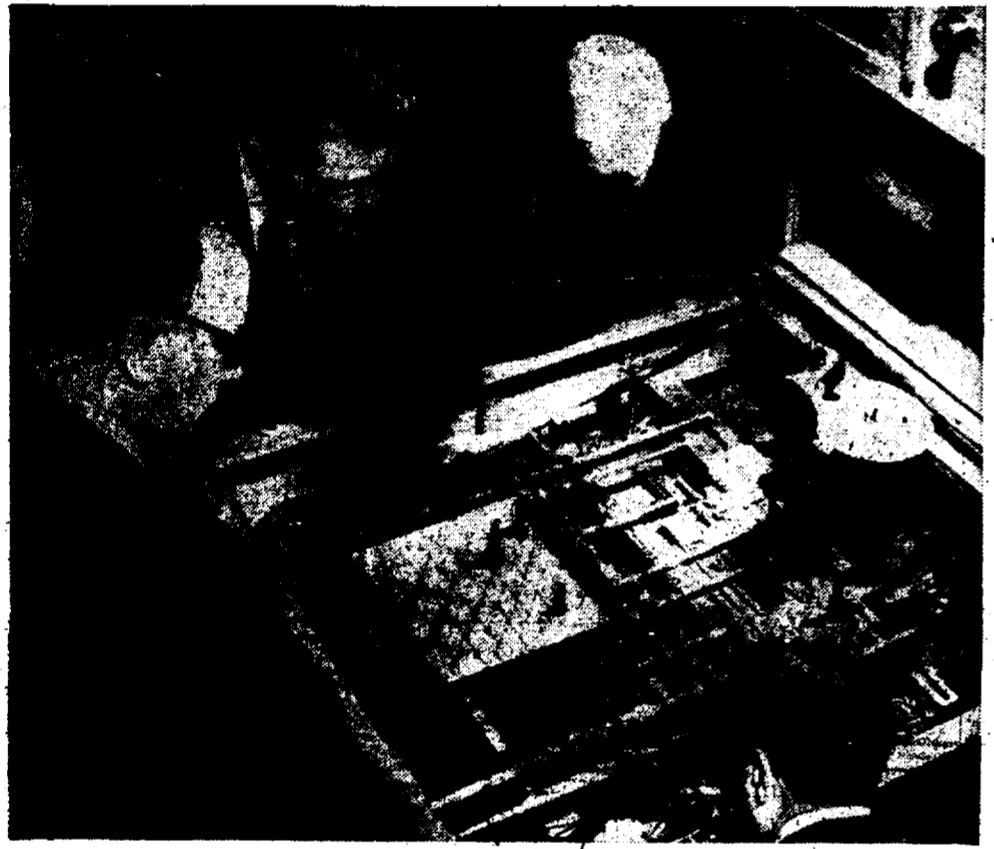

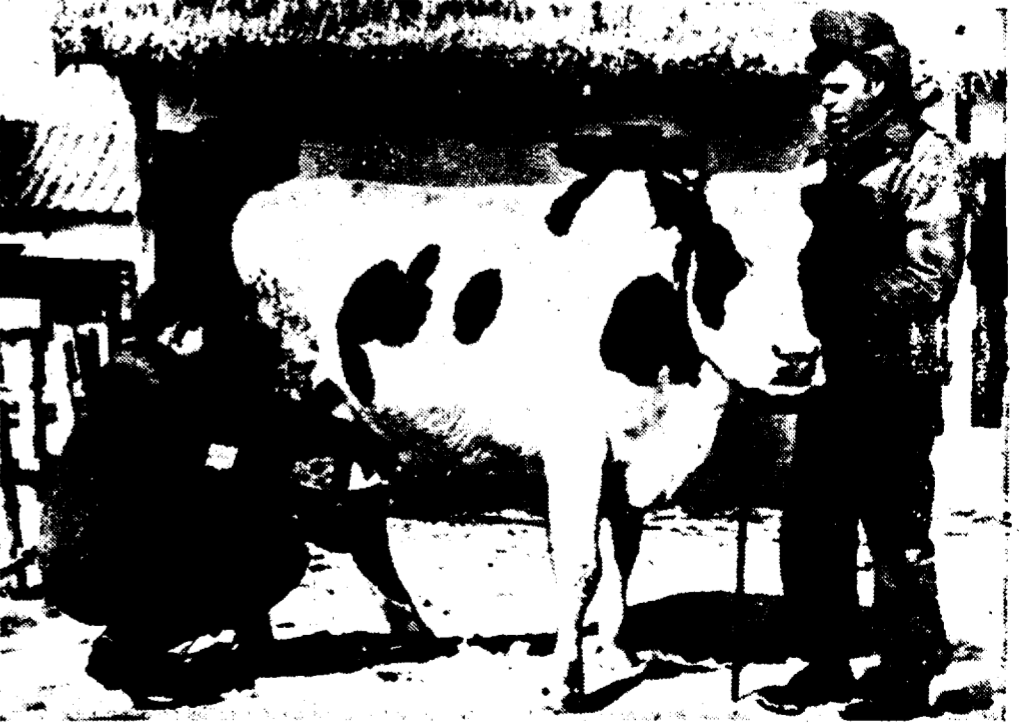
