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MURRAY W. SALES

Murray W. Sales' death is a great personal loss to the Detroit and Grosse Pointe, communities in which he lived, labored and loved over almost a century's span.

Few members of society have given so much in quiet friendship and zealous love for his fellow man as this soft spoken industrialist. But charity and friendship were the two greatest attributes of Murray W. Sales and his life of Christian

Another man, of lesser philosophical perspective, might have broken and despaired under the onslaughts of family tragedy which fell upon him.

His daughter, Frances, 22, and his son. Leonard, 12, were the victims of a fatal food bacteria at a gay family party in 1920. Six years later another son was killed in an auto accident. And in 1943 his wife died and a year thereafter his son, Carter, was stricken with a fatal heart at-

Mr. Sales' brilliant accomplishments in industry and allied fields are catalogued in the successful histories of the companies of which he was a member. But it is as a man who gave generously of his time, energy and finanial support to benevoent civic and private organizations that he is to be remembered by the members of this community.

During his lifetime Mrs. Sales was her husband's energetic partner in all of his hariable undertakings. In 1926 they con-tributed \$100,00 which aided in the erecton of Grosse Pointe's Cottage Hospital as a memorial to their children.

Mr. Sales was a member of the board of the Grace Hospital, a director of the Home for the Friendless, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and the Detroit branch of the Michigan Children's Home Society.

Mr. Sales' family mansion at E. Jefferson and Lincoln, Grosse Pointe, has been bequeathed by him, in memory of Mrs. Sales, to the Grosse Pointe School District to serve as a public library.

This home, after the tragic departure of so many loved ones, was maintained by him as though his children and wife were still there. Lonliness and emptiness found no haven in his home and he lived his last years in the home in serene resignation to the will of a power over which he had no control. His spirit radiated happiness and friendship to all humans, especially to the young and the unbefriended .His life was always guided by his pronounced credo: "Love and friendship mean more than anything else on earth."


