



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PLANNING COMMISSION PLAUDITS

Last week the Park Planning Commistion called a public session to give a pro-**For the past two years, the Commission** s worked arduously toward their goal. to these men with vision and patience, the first hurdle in a long uphill climb is safely passed.

Five Michigan cities are among the 70 communities in the United States which are already adding fluorides to their public water supplies for the prevention of dental decay in their children.

Ten other Michigan cities, including Grosse Pointe Farms, have their plans approved. Requests for information and assistance in planning from additional areas are received almost daily by the Michigan Department of Health.

The Farms approved the measure several months ago and is preparing to install the necessary equipment. Her step might well be followed by other Pointe communities.

The fluoridation of public water supplies is a comparatively simple and inreduce which can reduce ental decay as much as 65 per cent, according to the Section of Public Health Dentistry. It does not change the taste or color of the water.

A child who drinks fluoridated water furing the years his teeth are formingam birth until about eight years of age gains protection which continues bound out his life. The cost of this pro-cetion varies, according to the city, from four to fourteen cents per person per year. The five Michigan communities now adding fluoride to their water supplies are: Grand Rapids, where a fluoridation experiment has been conducted by the Michigan Department of Health, the Public Health Service, the University of Michigan and the city for the past six years;

One of the chief objectives of the plan is to protect the property restrictions in the Windmill Pointe supdivision.

Plans have also been approved for Wyandotte, Saginaw, Jackson, South Haven, Grand Haven, Muskegon, Mt. Clemens, Marquette, and Norway. At least two other cities have plans ready to submit to the Division of Engineering for approval.

The need for better dental health protection is shown by the fact that the average 16-year-old in Michigan has ten teeth decayed and two teeth removed. It is quite possible that these teen-agers will have lost half their teeth by the time they are 40 years of age, according to Dr. Fred Wertheimer, Director of the Section of Public Health Dentistry. Fluoridation of public water supplies plus good home care of the teeth, low sugar diets and regular visits to the dentist can reduce dental decay to one-third its present level in one generation's time.

Fluoridation of public water supplies for the prevention of dental decay now has the approval of the American Dental Association, the American Association of Public Health Dentists, the State and Ter-ritorial Dental Health Directors, the United States Public Health Service, the American Water Water Works Association, the State and Territorial Health Officers Association and the American Public Health Association.

These endorsements are based on actual studies conducted in Grand Rapids and elsewhere during the past decade.
