Christopher Founder to Speak at Center

"If You Won't, Who Will?" is the provocative title of the lecture to be presented by Father Keller, founder of the Christopher Center, at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center, Tuesday, April 3rd, at 8:30 p.m.

Father Keller started the Christopher Center in 1945 with the aim of developing in another 1 per cent of sound-thinking men and women a deep sense of personal responsibility and initiative in bringing back into the marketplace the major truths which guarantee peace for all mankind.

For some 10 years prior to 1945 Father Keller had been working towards the present simple formula of getting "little" people to do "big things—of encouraging the average person to reach be-

yond his or her own small circle for the big world outside.

This formula stresses action by those who believe in individual responsibility for the common good of all. The Christopher thesis is that complaining and criticizing accomplish little. Their motto is well expressed in the words of the old Chinese proverb: "Better to light one candle than to curse the darkness."

Parents Hear About Value of Visual Aids

"When your child comes home from school and says, 'We saw a movie today,'" said Mrs. Wanda Daniel, curriculum assistant in the Grosse Pointe Public School, "be glad that he has had a real educational experience."

Mrs. Daniel, speaking to the Grosse Pointe Motion Picture Council about "Communication" continued, "Through the use of audio-visual material, the child sees as well as hears the materials being presented in the classroom. The 3Rs are being effectively supplemented."

To make her point, Mrs. Daniel showed flat pictures high-lighting the history of communication. The flat pictures were shown on the opaque projector.

At the same time, the explanation of the picture was being given over a recording. Next, Mrs. Daniel showed a film strip of similar material.

This time the sound effects were produced on a tape recorder. Next the curriculum assistant presented a sound film which showed more details in the history of communication.

Mrs. Daniel very graphically presented to the Grosse Pointe Picture Council the fact that educators no longer expect the child to learn from books alone. The radio, movies, television, recordings, and pictures—even the comics vie for his attention and can be most effective learning aids.

Bernard K. Walsh, of 377 Rivard, a commerce and finance student, said: "I enjoyed being before the camera. My nervousness left when I started to talk."

"Many of my friends enjoyed it immensely. They thought it a good idea for college students and an immeasurable influence."

AMENDMENT OF SECTION 6 OF "WATER CHARGES" ORDINANCE ADOPTED MARCH 20, 1950.

The City of Grosse Pointe ordains:

Section 1. That Section 6 of an ordinance entitled "Water Charges," adopted March 20, 1950, be changed to read as follows:

Section 6. (a) The Council of the City of Grosse Pointe shall from time to time, by resolution properly adopted, fix the charges therefor to be made by the City and to be payable to the Treasurer of the City for water connections, water tap permits, and water meter rentals, such charges to be dependent upon the cost to the City of the installation services and of the appliances, for parts, or renewal thereof, furnished.

(b) Any time required on the part of the City of Grosse Pointe to remove excessive dirt or debris from the sidewalk, road or vacant lot caused by the owner, builder or sub-contractor, and not removed by him, shall be deducted from the amount deposited with the City for the building permit at the rate of time and cost of the hourly rate paid by the City for such work.

(c) The charge for water meter rental must be paid when the water tap permit is issued.

This ordinance shall take effect ten days after publication.
